Dear Sir:

I submit hereupon the operations of the Detective Bureau, during the year Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-one (1921).

Aggregate value of recovered property, \$681,400.05.

202 Fugitives from Justice were arrested and turned over to Outside officers.

5,385 complaints were received by this department.

2,606 Arrests were made.

828 Automobiles were stolen
795 " recovered
194 " are still missing.

There were forty-two homicides and murders during the year 1921 as compared to twenty-seven last year.

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The following is a Homicidal account of which this department rendered every effort in bringing to light the mysteries surrounding them, making several arrests and securing several convictions.

- January 8th, 1921, George Butler, 22, Akron, O.shot and killed by Patrolman James King on Erie St. near Jefferson. Butler attempted to pass a worthless check and in making his getaway killed Robert Kinkead of Berdan Ave.
- January 13th, 1921, Robert Kinkhead, Berdan Ave. died of bullet wound inflicted by George Butler, January 8th, 1921.
- January 15th, 1921, John Koperski, 55, Nebraska Ave. and University Blvd. died of shotgun wound inflicted by Carl Milligan, colored. Milligan was arrested in Kentucky but was exhonorated by jury.
 - January 17th, 1921, Louis Schroeder, Special Officer, N.Y.C.R.R. was shot and killed during a holdup at Wade and Williams Sts. The murderers, Ed. Foley is serving a life term, Royce Richardson died in electric chair, James Burke is awaiting execution and Frank Seward killed himself.
- January 17th, 1921, A. E. Long, Special Officer, N.Y.C.R.R. was also shot and killed during the holdup at Wade and Williams Sts.
- February 7th, 1921, Peter Fedechenia a prohibition informer was shot and killed by Thad Gardner, a watchman who mistook him for a tresspasse. Gardner was exhonorated.
- James O'Reilly, 29 Fourteenth St. shot to death by Pere Marquette R.R. Special Officers in Ottowa Yards near Summit st. Justifiable homicide.
 - April 2nd, 1921. Edward Smith, Saxon Park, Point Place Road was heldup and slugged to death near Toledo Yacht Club. His assailants are serving life terms.
- April 16th, 1921, Harry C. Tennyson, alias Cassidy, Broadway Hotel shot and killed by Detective Ehrhardt after Tennyson attempted to shoot him. Justifiable Homicide.

- May 1st, 1921, Mrs. Adeline Beach died from the effects of a criminal operation performed several days before.
- May 24th, 1921, P.J.Crowley, 32 shot and killed by Dep. Sheriff Walter Beebe at Sylvania when surprised burglarizing a garage. Justifiable homicide.
 - May 30th, 1921. James Keith, col., 36 South Michigan St. died from the effects of bullet wounds inflicted May 27th by James Davis after the two had quarreled over a woman. Is serving an intermediate term for Mans-laughter
- June 2nd, 1921, Orrin W. Allen, 319 Oliver St. beaten to death by Oscar W. Olson, 1616 Western Ave after the two had wuarreled over Allen's wife. Olson pleaded self defense and was exhonorated.
- June 6th, 1921, George Bowman, 1323 Myrtle St. died from the effects of a beating administered by unidentified men at Toledo Seed & Oil Co's plant. His assailants are still at large.
- June 9th, 1921, Patrolman Harold Mosbrugger shot to death by James Kelley a maniac at 613 Walnut St. Kelley finally shot himself after police maintained a barage of machine gun fire on his stronghold in the attic of above mentioned rooming house.
 - June 9th, 1921, Patrolman Harry A. Dowell shot and killed by a hullet from the gun of James Kelley.
 - June 25th, 1921, Albert Maier, 40 South St. Clair St. died of bullet wound inflicted June 22nd by Lawrence Sanford, 1428 Eleanor Ave. when Sanford caught Maier and pals stealing tires from his auto. Justifiable homicide.
- June 27th, 1921, Mrs.Reita Franch, 1804 North 12th St. shot to death by Robert McNair who was infatuated with her. McNair then killed himself.
- July 3rd, 1921, John Matuszewski alias Johnny Matz, 3120 Lagrange St. shot and killed by Alex Pavolo, 612 North St. Clair St whose gambling house he attempted to holdup. Justifiable homicide.
- July 16th, 1921, Thomas Johnson, col., 644 State St. died of bullet wound inflicted by Pinkie Johnson, his wife after a fight.
- August 1st, 1921, Patrolman W.H.Kress died of shotgun wound inflicted by Arthur Harding, colored whom Kress tried to place under arrest. Harding has been convicted and sentenced to the electric chair.
 - August 6th, 1921, Albert "Cat" Warren, colored shot and killed by Isaac Dobson, col., on Avondale near 15th St. in a street fight. Dobson is under arrest and case pending.
 - August 12th, 1921, Mason H. Bruensing, Davenport, Ia. died of bullet wound inflicted by Paul Ramsey, Spec. Officer, N.Y.C.R.R. on August 9th, while Bruensing was trying to escape from Ramsey at Union Depot. Justifiable homicide.
 - Sept. 6th, 1921, Ike Hudson, 351 Canal Ave. died after bring shot by his stepson, Harley Nash Sept. 4th, while Hudson was fighting with his wife.

- Sept. 12th, 1921, Frank Dupuis, 1537 Elmwood Ave. shot and killed by Levi Kilbury, motorman in Stickey Ave. car when Dupuis attempted to holdup the car crew. Justifiable homicide.
- Sept. 25th, 1921, Steven Rosenberg, 1103 Campbell St. shot by A.E. Randolph, night watchman at Geo. W. Jenning's lumber yard. Randolph claimed Rosenberg attacked him. Justifiable homicide.
- Sept. 28th, 1921, Mrs. George Kiss, 2417 Caledonia St. died of injuries inflicted by her husband on the preceding day when he beat her with an iron bar. Bound over to Grand Jury.
- Sept. 28th, 1921, Peter Patoff, 410 Front St. stabbed to death by Marion Cholokoff a cook during a quarrel at 410 Front St. Cholokoff was exhonorated.
- Oct. 16th, 1921, Thomas Nazigian, rooming house proprietor at 1004 Jefferson Ave. shot and killed in bed by Eva Crouch, 15 yrs. old, a servant. Eva claimed she did not know the gun was loaded.
- Oct. 19th, 1921, John McDonald, sailor of Saginaw, Mich. shot by Motor patrolman Taylor at Ash Street Dock when the sailor resisted arrest Justifiable homicide.
- Oct. 31st, 1921, William Reed, colored, 3625 Summit St. shot in his home during a quarrel over a woman by William McKinley also colored of 360 Wabash St. McKinley was bound over to grand jury.
- Nov. 7th, 1921, Otis Boyer, night watchman at Royster Fertilizer Plant and living at 230 Elgin Ave. died of injuries received when beated Oct. 22nd by unknown parties.
- Now. 30th, 1921, Mrs. Celia Cole, Weston, O. beaten to death by an unidentified man in Chicago Hotel, 6142 Monroe St.
- Dec. 34d, 1921, John Dovy, colored, 2315 Woodford St. killed by Special Officers Evans and Clark from Wheeling and Lake Erie R.R. It was presumed that Dovy was picking up coal in W. & L.E.R.R. yards near Paine St. The officers have been bound over to grand jury.
- Dec. 11th, 1921, Frank Rogala stabbed to death by Boleslaw Matusiak after card game in home of S. Rudnicki, 1149 Nebraska Ave. Matusiak is under arrest.
- Dec. 11th,q1921, Mrs. Raymond Fortner shot to death by her husband in their home, 113 Broadway. Raymond Fortern committed suicide.
 - Dec. 18th, 1921, Jack Day, bandit shot and killed by Officer Mayo on St. Clair near Orange. Way was the wheelsman of a bandit car carrying two other holdup men. Justifiable homicide.
- Dec. 18th, 1921, William Price, colored, shot and killed in Bud Barrett's poolroom, Canton St. by Ed Taylor alias Yellow Kid, also colored. Taylor is at large.
- Dec. 22, 1921, Patrolman C.W.McQuire shot and killed by one of two colored burglar suspects corner Divison and Indiana Aves. Murderer is at large.
- Dec. 26th, 1921, New born babe found dead lying in snow on Kenyon Drive. Had been lying there for two days.

Dec. 28th, 1921, Patrolman William A. Reed shot and killed by Arthur Binkley a colored check forger at Canton and Smith Sts. Binkley was shot in the leg and later captured. Case pending.

Dec. 29th, 1921. Joseph Manor, 115 Platt St. died from the effects of bullet wound inflicted by Charles Weaver a drunken watchman of the National Milling Co. Dec. 26th. Weaver under arrest.

Aso I would request that 12 new chairs, 6 desks and 10 lockers be installed as the conveniences now available are not sufficient to properly take care of the number of men now working in this department.

Report of Bureau Of Identification and Records.

Harry Jennings, Acting Chief of Police, Toledo, Ohio.

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit to you a report of the work done by the Bureau of Identification & Records during the year 1921:

1,192 new subjects passed through the Bureau during the year. All of these subjects were photographed, finger printed and measured under the rules of the Bertillon system.

ed and measured under the rules of the Bertillon system.

In addition to the above number of new subjects,

106 who were already on file were rephotographed, 623 were refinger printed, and 10 were remeasured.

There also passed through this Bureau 28 new subjects who were placed in the "Special" file.

973 bertillon photographs were furnished to other Police Departments and peace officers.

436 extra photographs were furnished our Detective Bureau for identification purposes and to assist in apprehending duspects.

1,192 extra finger prints were taken and firwarded to the Special Agent of the U.S. Department of Justice, at Leavenworth, Kans., where a clearing house for criminals is maintained by the Government.

1,192 extra prints, with photographs attached, were forwarded to the National Bureau of Criminal Identification at Washington, D. C.

Records on approximately 600 persons, handled by this office and bound over to the Grand Jury, were furnished the County Presecuting Attorney.

Approximately 3,700 photographs and circulars from other police departments and penal institutions were received during the year, all of which were indexed and filed.

485 criminal records were requested of other police departments, of which 475 were received.

484 criminal records were requested of penal institutions, of which 473 were received.

2,215 letters and telegrams were written pertaining to persons whose photographs and finger prints have been taken by this department.

2.140 letters were written on persons other than those contained in our own collection of persons photographed and finger printed.

1,580 letters were written on subjects other than criminal, such as missing relatives, friends, etc.

Approximately 3,300 long distance telephone calls were taken care of by this Bureau during the year.

2,500 entries were made on the property book, each entry covering from 1 to 300 articles and each entry pertaining to a

separate case.

180 slot machines, which were confiscated by members of the Department, were broken up and the money contained therein was turned into the Pension Fund.

Up to June 1st, 1921 there were 59 Bus Permits issued. After this date the licensing of busses was handled by the Finance Department.

179 permits to purchase firearms were issued.

244 cards were issued to taxicab drivers.

In each case of taxi and revolver permits, the finger prints of each subject were taken and the ir photographs placed on file. In addition a full description of the revolver was reported to this Bureau by the dealer who sold same, which description was entered on the record.

During the past year members of this Bureau have been called upon numerous times to investigate burglaries, safe jobs and murders in an effort to secure finger prints in order to determine who the culprits might be. Finger prints are now recognized as the most valuable aid in the identification and detention of criminals and we are greatly handicapped in our work by the lack of a finger print camera, the cost of which is greatly offset by its valuableness is many ways. I respectfully request that such a camera be added to the equipment of this Bureau as soon as possible.

At the present time our finger print filing case consists of but 16 of the necessary 32 drawers and to make the case complete and to avoid congestion, I respectfully recommend that this much needed equipe mtn be furnished at once.

I wish to take this opportunity to state the Bureau at the present time is in better condition than it has been for years. It is considered one of the most complete and progressive Bureaus in the Country. I believe no branch of the Police Department is more important than the Bureau of Identification and in order to maintain our present efficiency, our personnel and equipment must be kept up to a high standard. I trust that with your valued assistance in the future, the reputation of the Bureau will surpass all previous reports.



Safety Department Report for 1921

YEAR'S WORK IN POLICE, FIRE, BUILDING INSPECTION AND IN POLICE AND FIRE TELEGRAPH DIVISIONS

This departmental report has been condensed for the purpose of presenting only those salient facts that may be of interest to City Journal readers. The complete report is filed in the mayor's office.—Editor's note.

Last year saw the "humanization" of the Toledo police department in the eyes of the public.

The cold figures of the report give no hint as to this perceptible change in public sentiment but a review of posce activities for 1921 would not be complete without mentioning this fact.

Some may doubt this supposition of a change of **keling** towards the police department but anyone who mingles in crowds cannot fail to have observed this fact.

The average citizen is beginning to appreciate the human side of the "copper" where formerly he thought of him in the stage types—either the fat individual in blue who dazzles the nurse-maids in the parks or the Ivan the Terrible sort of person who is supposed to extract confessions from innocent persons.

Furthermore Mr. John W. Public has learned that his employee, the policeman, is willing to give his life for his job which is more than the butcher, baker or candle-stick maker is very likely to do.

The campaign of enlightenment about the police department was carried on before the public by former Safety Director Greenhalgh who was continually pleading for fairness towards the bluecoat.

He had five object lessons to emphasize his point. These are in the annual report under the heading, "five men killed in action," who in a manner of speaking gave their lives that the city might know.

General Features.

The report showed a 1,563 increase in the number of arrests made by the police and detectives last year over 1920. In view of the subsiding of the "crime wave" in 1921, it is fair to assume that this would indicate an increase in police efficiency.

The high morale of the personnel and the excellent condition of the apparatus, are the outstanding features of the fire department report. Coincident with this, a decrease in the fire loss for 1921 was shown.

The installation of 25 combination police and fire alarm pedestals at important street intersections, represented the most important work of the police and fire alarm telegraph system in 1921.

DIVISION OF POLICE

The period of business depression had an echo in an increase in burglary and larcency arrests. Robbery showed a slight falling off, for which the speed car patrol is largely responsible.

That the police sponge is still necessary to enforce prohibition laws may be seen in the three per cent increase in drunk and disorderly charges.

On the other hand, vagrancy has shown a marked decline which may be ascribed to the free lodging that the city gives to transients through the Social Service Federation.

Arrests for traffic violations increased about 20 per

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Velblic cent, indicating that the department is making a greater effort to protect pedestrians and regulate traffic in the congested portions of the city.

Police reports showed 2013 accidents during the year of which 1599 involved automobiles, 160 street cars, and six were drownings.

More than \$63,635 in property was recovered by the Police Department, compared with \$1,377,577 in 1920.

The city derived a considerable revenue in the fines of persons who were caught making alcoholic concoctions in the secrecy of their homes. These fines amounted to \$81,585 and costs.

These expeditions into cellars and attics were conducted by Officers Ray and Bach, detailed for this work, who made 545 arrests out of which 528 convictions were obtained. They searched 1,769 places and confiscated 193 stills. They destroyed or confiscated 17,763 gallons of liquor and mash.

The personnel of the police department consists of 372 persons as follows: chief, two inspectors, six captains, six lieutenants, 13 sergeants, 34 regular and detailed detectives, 289 patrolmen, 2 policewomen, superintendent of identification and records, assistant superintendent, five clerks, one secretary and others including matrons, janitors, etc. Thirty-seven former members of the force are on the pension payroll.

Bureau of Identification and Records

Last year showed an increase in the work of the Bureau of Identification and Records. Eleven hundred ninety-two subjects passed through this department to be photographed and have records taken compared with 953 in 1920. One hundred seventy-nine revolver permits were issued against 117 in the previous year.

Detective Bureau

Outstanding features in this departmental report are the decrease in the number of automobile thefts and a larger proportion of cars returned.

Forty-two homicide cases were handled by officers of this department compared to 27 in 1920.

The personnel includes 34 detailed and regular detectives.

Eight hundred sixty-six women were arrested by members of the vice squad on charges of soliciting, held for hospital, loitering and similar offenses. The year before 582 women were arrested.

Results of the numerous gambling raids conducted by this squad may be found elsewhere.

Bureau of Motors

This report showed that 42 motor vehicles including automobiles and motorcycles, were used by the department in 1921. Of the patrols and pursuit cars six are in good, four in fair and four in poor condition.

Of the 12 motorcycles two are labeled good, three fair, and three in poor condition. Three were in the shop and one is ruined.
