SLEUTH PLAYS ANGEL TO MAN HE 'KIDNAPED'

Officer Who Jailed Ravoi-Rochelle Gets His Victim a Job Here.

Wife of Imprisoned Man Works in Restaurant to Support Family While Guiltless Her Husband Is in Prison.

Confined in the county jail for soveral months, while his worked in a restaurant to support herself and children, Louis Ravol-Rochelle, accused of swindling A. Shamy, an Adams street fruit dealer, out of \$800, has been released on his own recognizance, pending the report of the grand jury. It is understood that no indictment will be found against him dictment will be found against him. Ravol-Rochelle, who was an

expert machinist, on Wednes-day took a job, which was found for him by Detective Cairl, who brought Ravoi-llochelle to Toledo from In-dianapolis, where he was arrested with Emil Lolenni. Cairl was accused of legally kidnaping Ravoi-Rochelle. Mrs. Ravol-Rochelle, who visited

her husband almost daily, is happy. She declares that she has the proof that her husband was in Indian-apolis, when Shamy lost his money.

"I had to work hard, but I don't ind that. Louis is out now, I know he is innocent," she told her friends. Mrs. Ravoi-Rochelle, with her children clinging to her skirts, was waiting for her husband when afterhe was released, Tuesday non.

RAVOI WAS GUILTLESS.

Police who have investigated the case say there is practically no evidence against Ravoi-Rochelle, though his companion, Lolenni, is though his still in jail.

When Ravoi-Rochelle and Lolenni were brought here by Detec-tive Cairl, the authorities at Indianapolis charged that the prisoners had been legally "kidnaped," and that it was a repetition of the

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Detective Wounded in Gun **Battle With Young Bandits** Is Recovering

While detectives were grilling two youthful gunmen suspects Friday, Emmert Cairl, veteran captain of

While detectives were grilling two youthful gunmen suspects Friday. Emmert Cairl, veteran captain of detectives, was recovering in St. Vincent's hospital from bullet wounds received late Wednesday night when he resisted the efforts of bandits to hold him up.

Capt. Cairl was said at the hospital to have had a comfortaele night and confidence in his recovery was expressed. One of the gunmen's bullets penetrated his left shoulder and lodged near the armpit. It is believed to have been a flesh wound. The bullet was to be removed Priday. A second nullet grazed the captain's right hand, in which he held his revolver.

'The two young suspects were captured in Mayfair park addition by Patrolmen Martin Stein and John McCarthy. As the policemen drew alongside the car in which the suspects were riding, one of the youths leaped out and attempted to escape afoot. He was caught by Patrolman Stein after a short chase. The other youth surrendered without resistance.

At their command to get out and throw up his hands, Cairl leaped from the car, drawing his weapon at the same time. He tore the mask from one of the gummen. As he did so, the bandit fired. This bullet is believed to have been the one that grazed Cairl's hand.

The captain then retreated to the back of his car, firing three shots at the bandits. The gummen returned the fire, one of their bullets taking effect.

Accompanying the victims were Sheriff Raymond Witte and Prosecutor Ray Ladd of Bowling Green. Immediately following the identificatio nof the pair, Witte and Ladd hurried back to Bowling Green and announced they would prepare warrants charging Poulin and Burke with the robberies.

Taking no chances on an underworld attempt to free the suspects en route to Bowling Green, Sheriff Witte recruited a force of special deputies to take the men to the Wood county seat. He said every precaution would be taken to guard the two men closely against an attempted delivery.

"IDENTIFICATION POSITIVE."

Burke has been held in the county jail for the county grand jury on charges of burglary and possession of burglar's tools.

Capt. Emmett Cairl said there was

no wavering in the identification of the two men. Bank clerks in each of the three towns were positive in their accusations against the men, the detective captain said.
