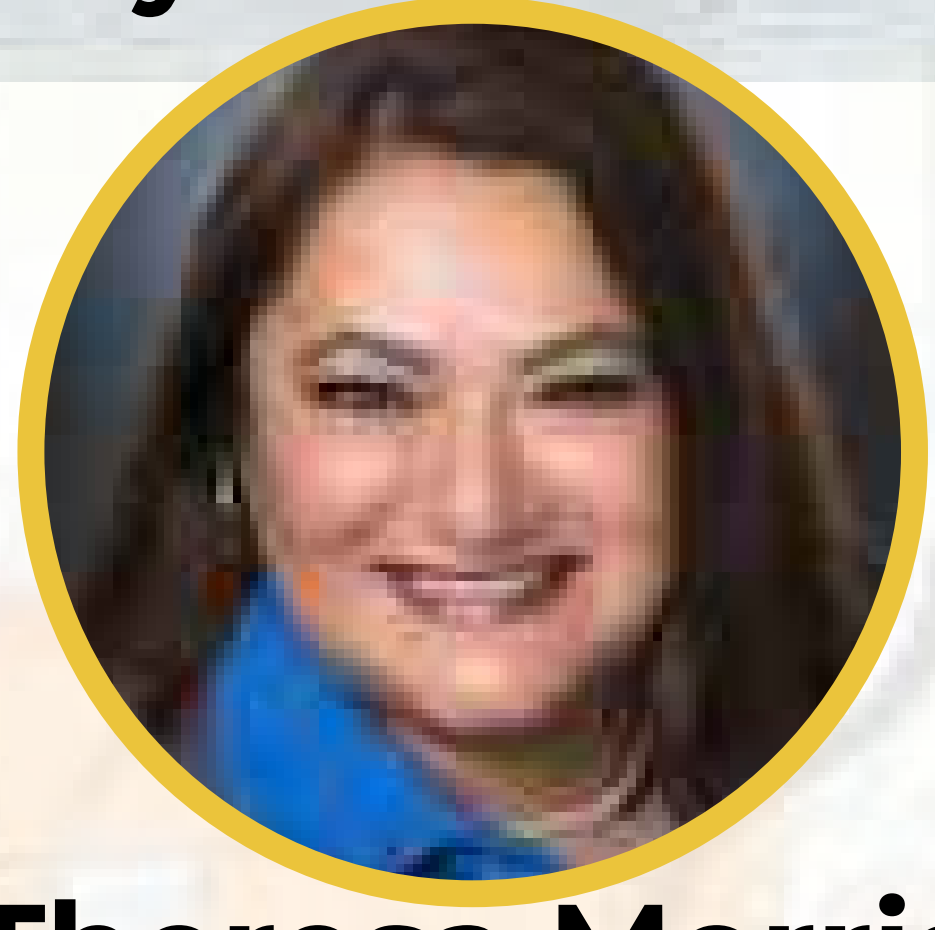

2022 Year in Review



January

On January 11, 2022 multiple officers responded to 1001 Starr Avenue for a structure fire. Officer Collins and Officer Johnson were among the first on scene. Realizing there were victims trapped on the second floor, both officers ran into the burning building to locate them. Once inside, the officers were able to direct TFRD personal to their location and successfully extract them from the building.

"Engine 6 arrived to a chaotic scene unfolding with the possibility of multiple people trapped in the upstairs apartments. Heavy black smoke was visible from both second story windows facing Starr Ave. As command rounded the front of the building, they could hear voices yelling down the stairwell. They met the officers at the top of the steps, in harm's way, doing everything they could to maintain verbal contact with the victim. Officers Collins and Johnson would prove to be a vital part of the overall rescue of the victim." -A Toledo Fire and Rescue Captain

Officer Brandon Stalker

Police Officer Brandon Stalker was shot and killed while working the outer perimeter during a barricade involving an arson suspect in the 2300 block of Fulton.

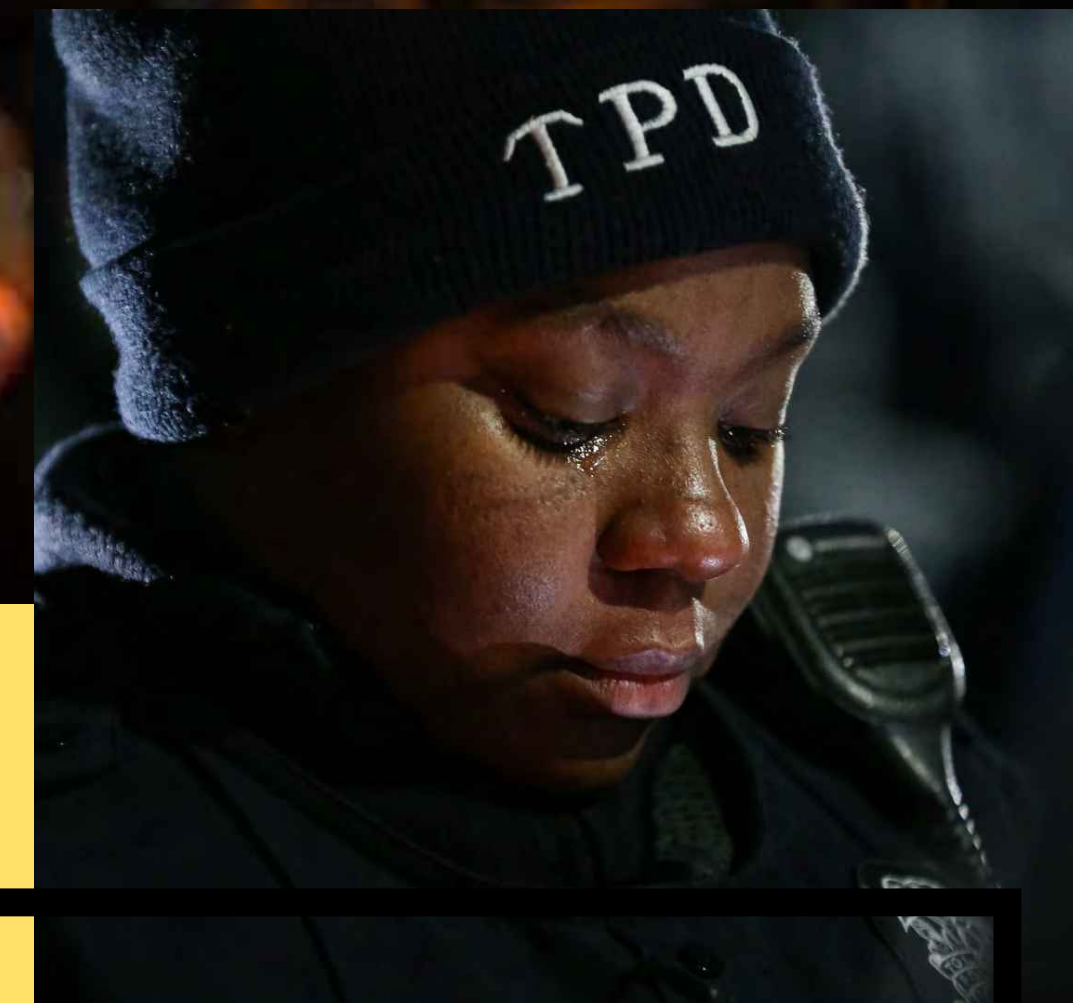
At approximately 0222 hours the front doors of the Our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral on Collingwood Blvd. was vandalized and set on fire. A witness flagged down a crew to report the incident. Toledo Fire and Rescue and Arson Investigators responded to the scene. A suspect was identified and warrants for Arson and Vandalism were issued. Around 1600 hours a Gang Task Force unit observed the suspect in the 2200 block of Fulton. The suspect was given commands to remove his hands from his pockets and walk towards them. He walks away while producing a firearm and runs into his home. The unit immediately sets up a perimeter and backup crews and negotiators arrive. Officer Stalker is working the outer perimeter, over 100 feet away from the home. After failed negotiation attempts, the scene is turned over to SWAT. SWAT deploys chemical munitions forcing the suspect out. As he emerges, the suspect has a handgun in each hand and fires at officers.

Officer Stalker is struck. He is transported to a local hospital by fellow officers where he succumbed to his wound. Police shoot the suspect, striking and killing him.

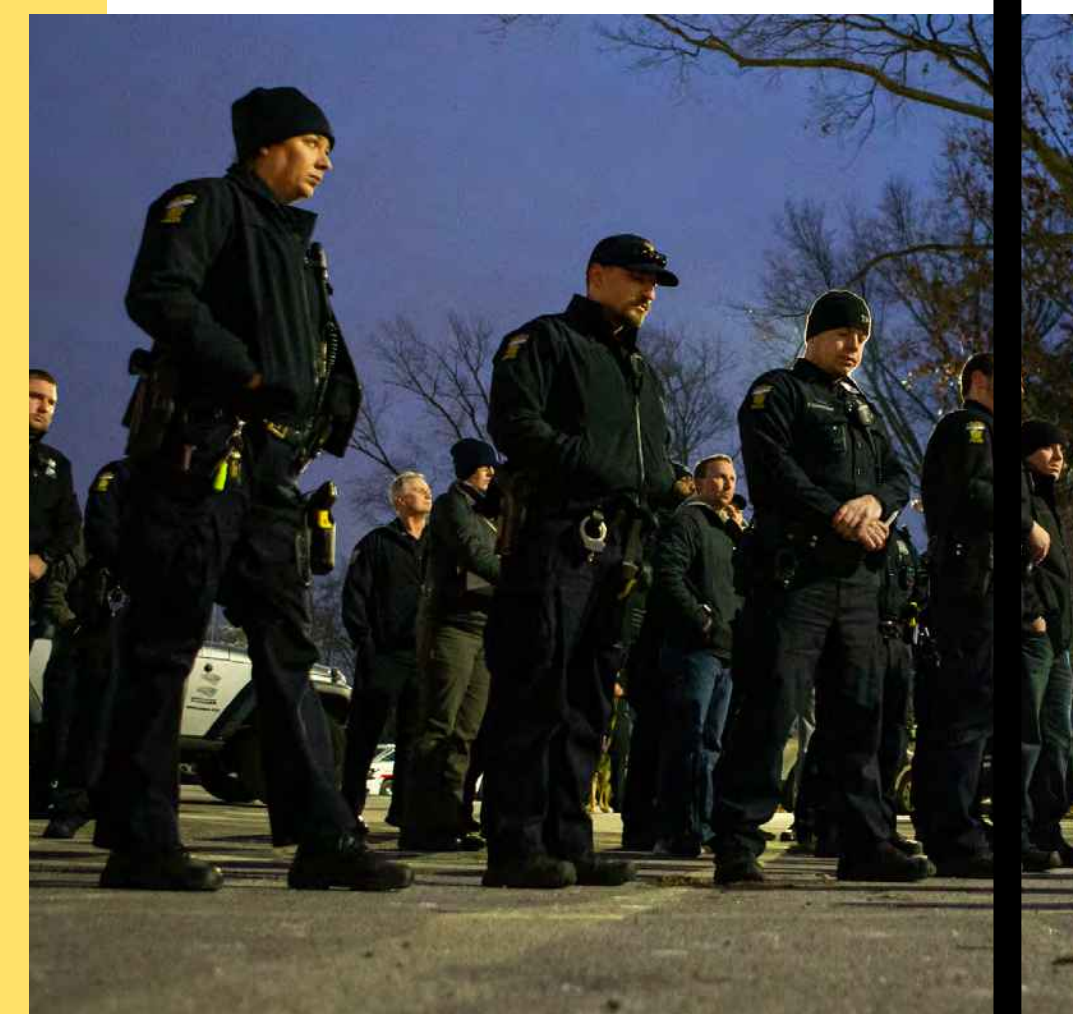
Officer Stalker had served with the Toledo Police Department for two years. He is survived by his fiancée, daughter, son and parents.

February 1, 2022

Over a period of several days, Deon Thompson was a victim of a package theft two times. In both instances, Mr. Thompson was able to capture the suspects on his doorbell camera. During the second theft, his wife confronted the suspects as they fled. Mr. Thompson traced the route the suspects ran and was able to find a cell phone. After doing some detective work of his own, he was able to identify the suspects and where they lived. A few days later officers were able to meet with him and obtain the evidence he had developed. After some coordination, officers were able to arrest the suspects in the same vehicle they had used in the thefts. Officers recovered some of the stolen property and returned it to the rightful owners.

On February 15, 2022 the McDonalds at 1225 Collingwood was robbed by an armed suspect. Witnesses told the arriving officers that the male suspect fled on an "old school" bike. Hours later, Officer Michael Ervin and Officer Lindsey Erhart spotted a male near Dorr and Smead matching the description of the suspect, who was also riding the described bike. Officer Erhart attempted to stop the suspect who then fled on the bike. Officer Ervin was able to catch the suspect and he was taken into custody after a foot chase. The suspect was then interviewed by detectives and charged with aggravated robbery and multiple misdemeanors.

On February 7, 2022 Officer Leon Cavanaugh and Officer Daniel Welch were tasked with preventing a series of robberies targeting pizza delivery drivers. While on patrol the officers observed a vehicle that was stolen in a recent robbery. The officers watched the vehicle park and observed the suspect exit the driver's seat and stand near the car. When the officers began to approach the suspect, the suspect jumped back into the vehicle. To prevent the suspect from fleeing, the officers approached the car and removed him from the vehicle and placed him in custody. After a search of the suspect, he was found to be in possession of a ski mask and loaded handgun. The suspect and items found all matched descriptions given in the previous six robberies. The officers then booked him at Lucas County Jail on multiple felony charges.

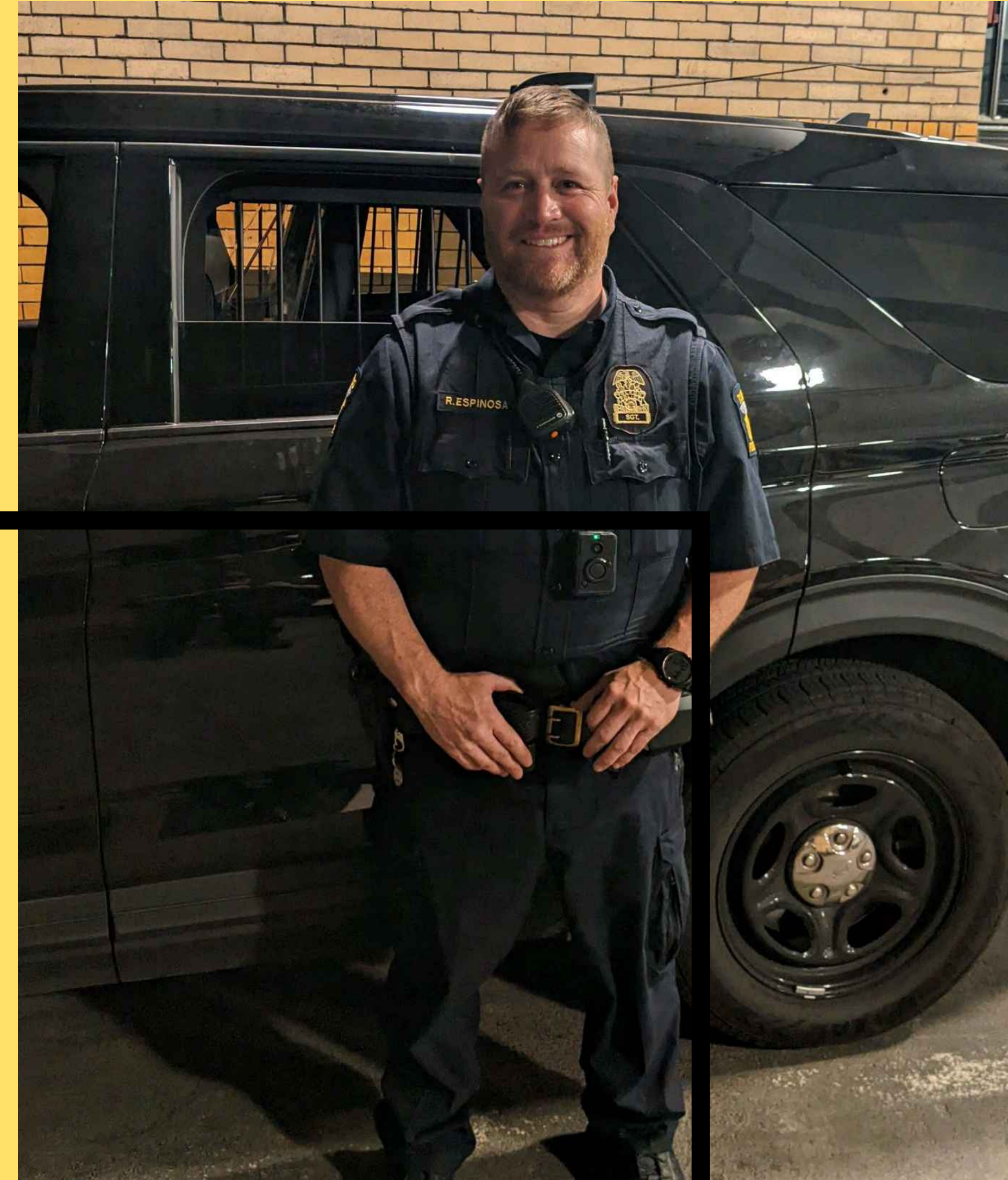

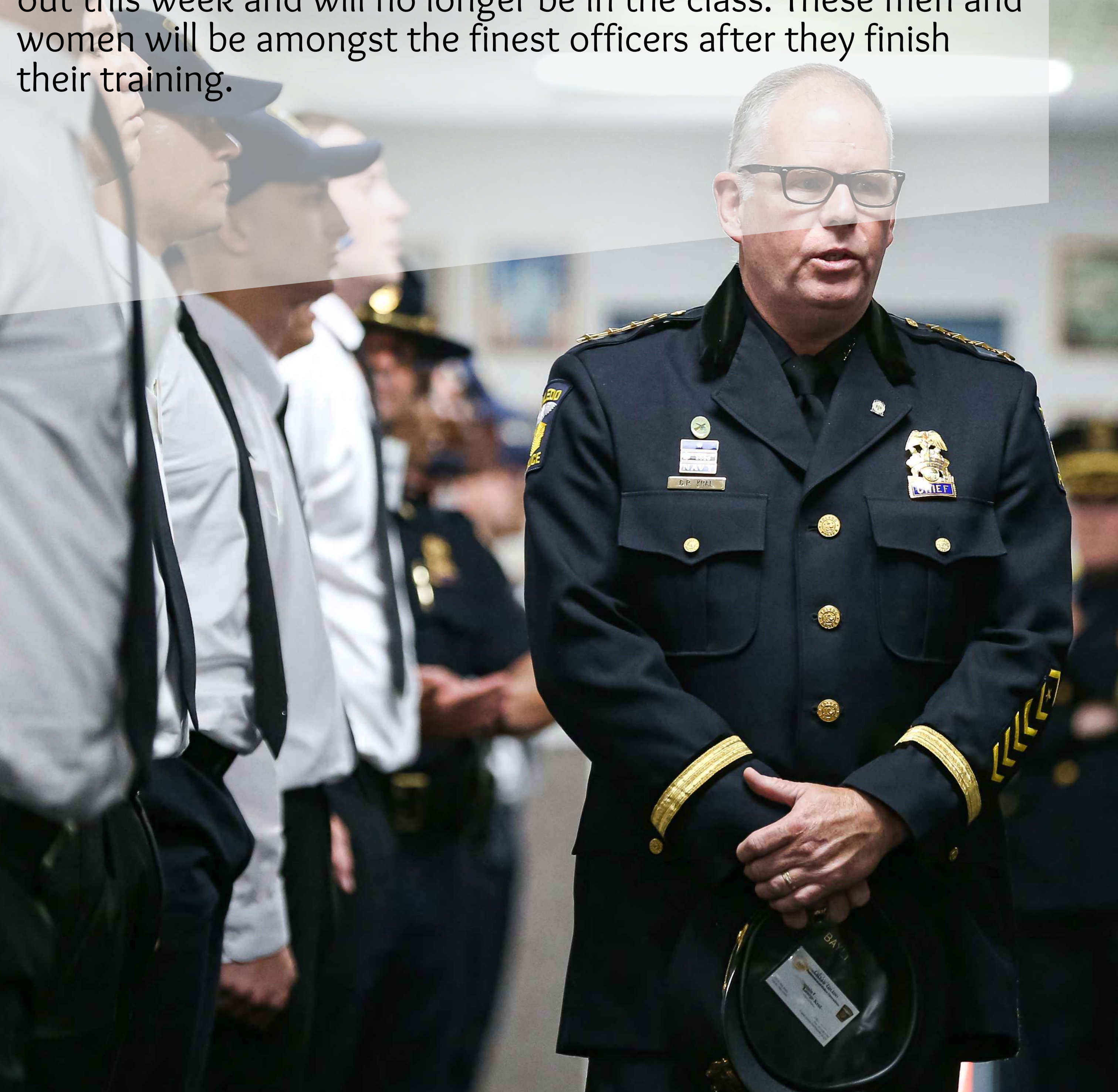


June

On June 4th, crews were dispatched to a weapons call in the 1200 block of N. Superior. The caller stated he had a gun and was going to harm an unknown female and any officers that responded to the incident. Sergeant Raymond Espinosa arrived on scene and took control of the scene. Officers set up a protective perimeter to contain the incident. The suspect began to advance towards officers and stretching out his arm into a shooter's stance. Sergeant Espinosa ordered the officer not to fire, to which he instead deployed several shots from his pepper ball gun. After the suspect was struck multiple times, the suspect stopped advancing and went to the ground. This gave officers and Sergeant Espinosa time to lead the arrest team to the suspect and take him safely into custody. After the scene was secure, the suspect was found to not have a firearm, but a silver package of cigarillos. Based on his actions and the suspects 911 calls, it was believed he was attempting suicide by cop. Sergeant Espinosa's leadership prevented a possible officer involved shooting situation.

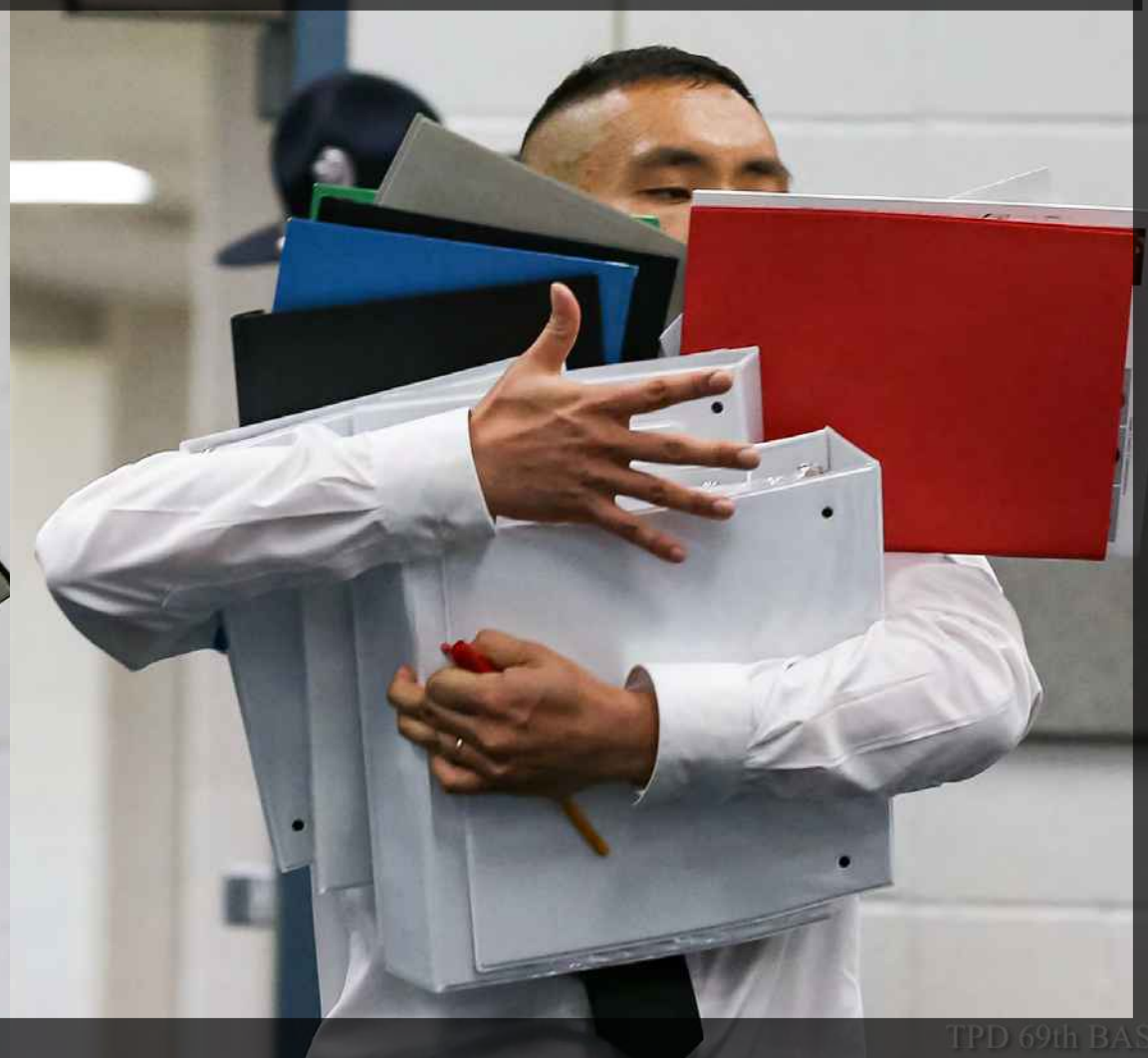
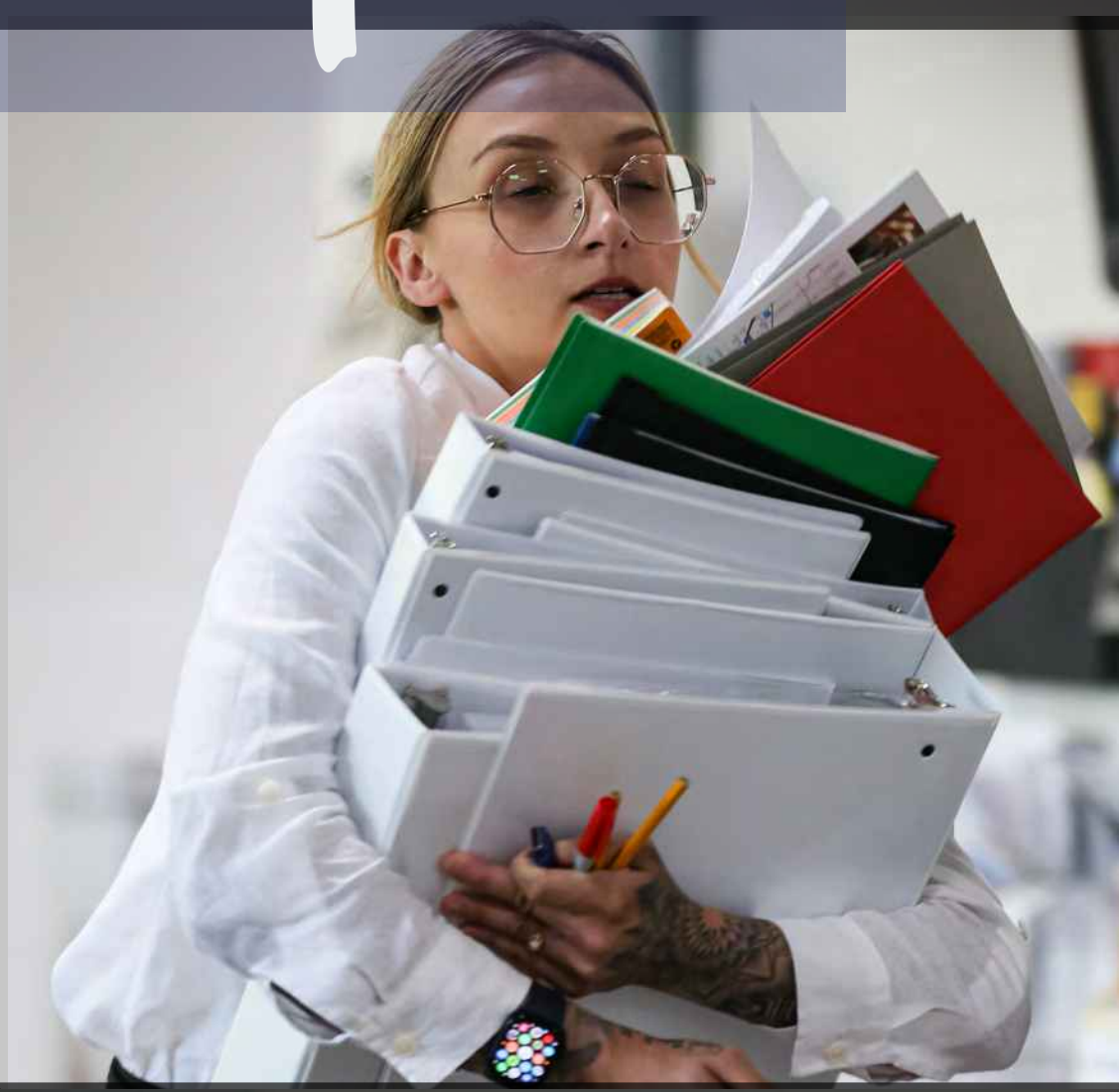
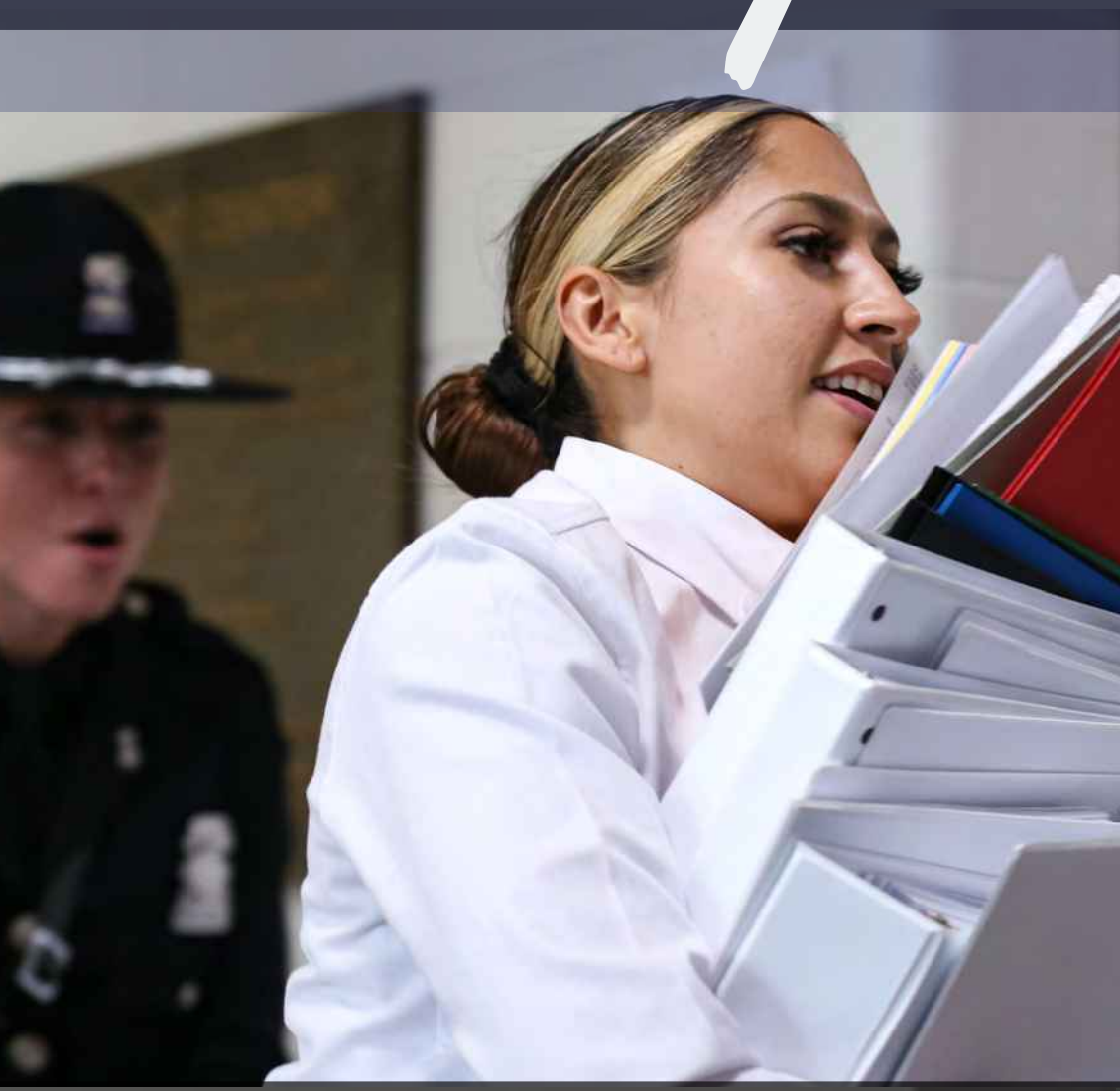

On June 29, 2022 Officer Ashley Reneau and Officer Anthony Vines II were taking a recent arrestee to Lucas County Jail when they observed three males attempting to take a refrigerator into a home in the 700 block of Walbridge.

After leaving the jail, the officers noticed a pending call for a break-in at the nearby Rent-A-Center. Once on scene, a witness told them he saw an unknown person steal a refrigerator from the rear of the store. Both officers remembered the men they saw taking a refrigerator in a home earlier so the officers went to that location and made contact with a resident. The resident admitted to stealing the appliance and the stolen refrigerator was recovered due to these officers diligent efforts.



On July 4, 2022 Officer Tyler Toska and Officer Mychael McAninch responded to a fire in the 800 block of North Superior. While speaking with the victim, it was determined that her child's father had intentionally set fire to her home. The victim told the officers the suspect was known to carry a gun. Both officers then started looking at past reports and were able to determine areas where the suspect was known to frequent. The suspect was then spotted and officers began a foot chase which led to taking the suspect in custody. A search of the suspect also produced a loaded firearm with a 30 round magazine.

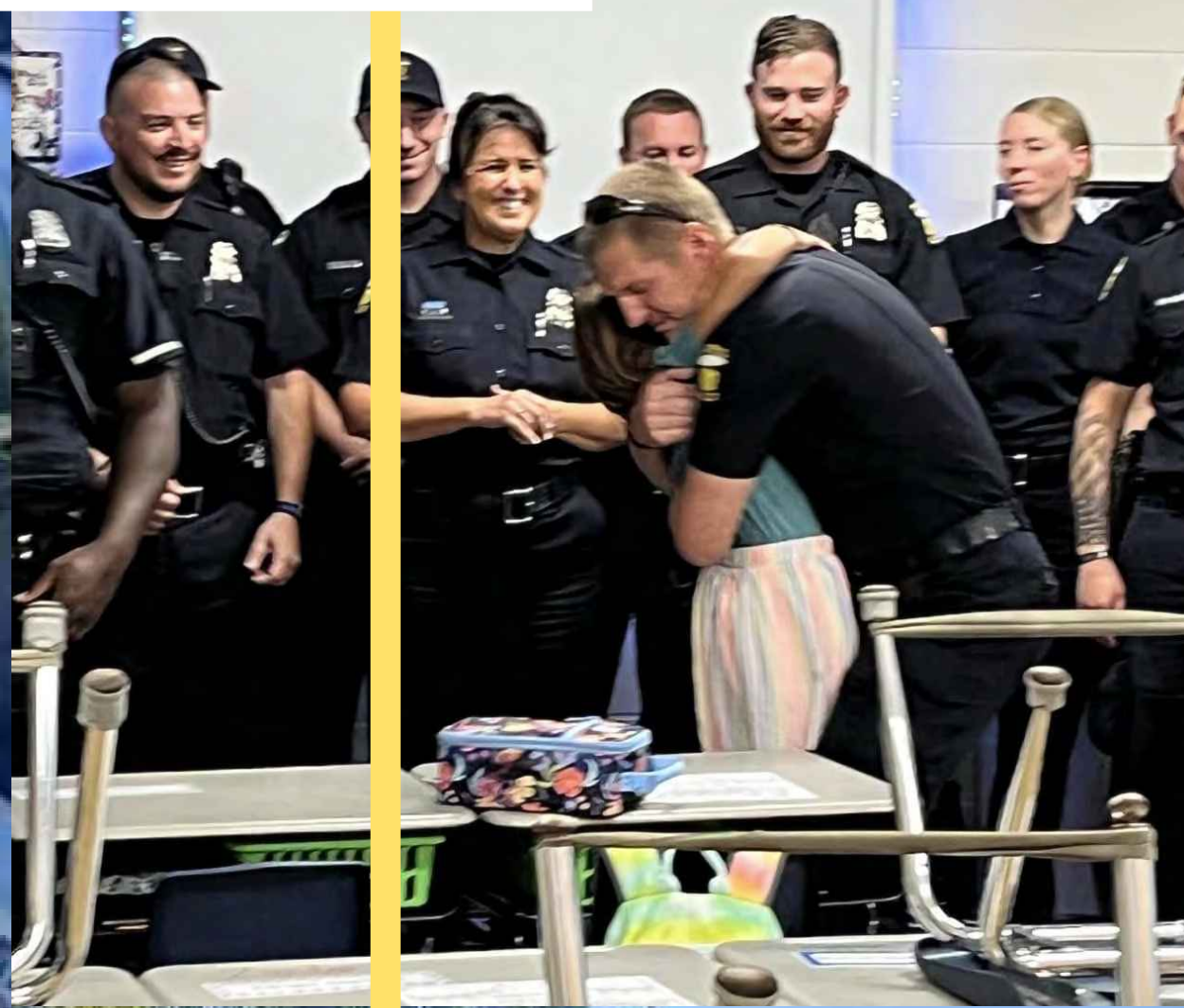

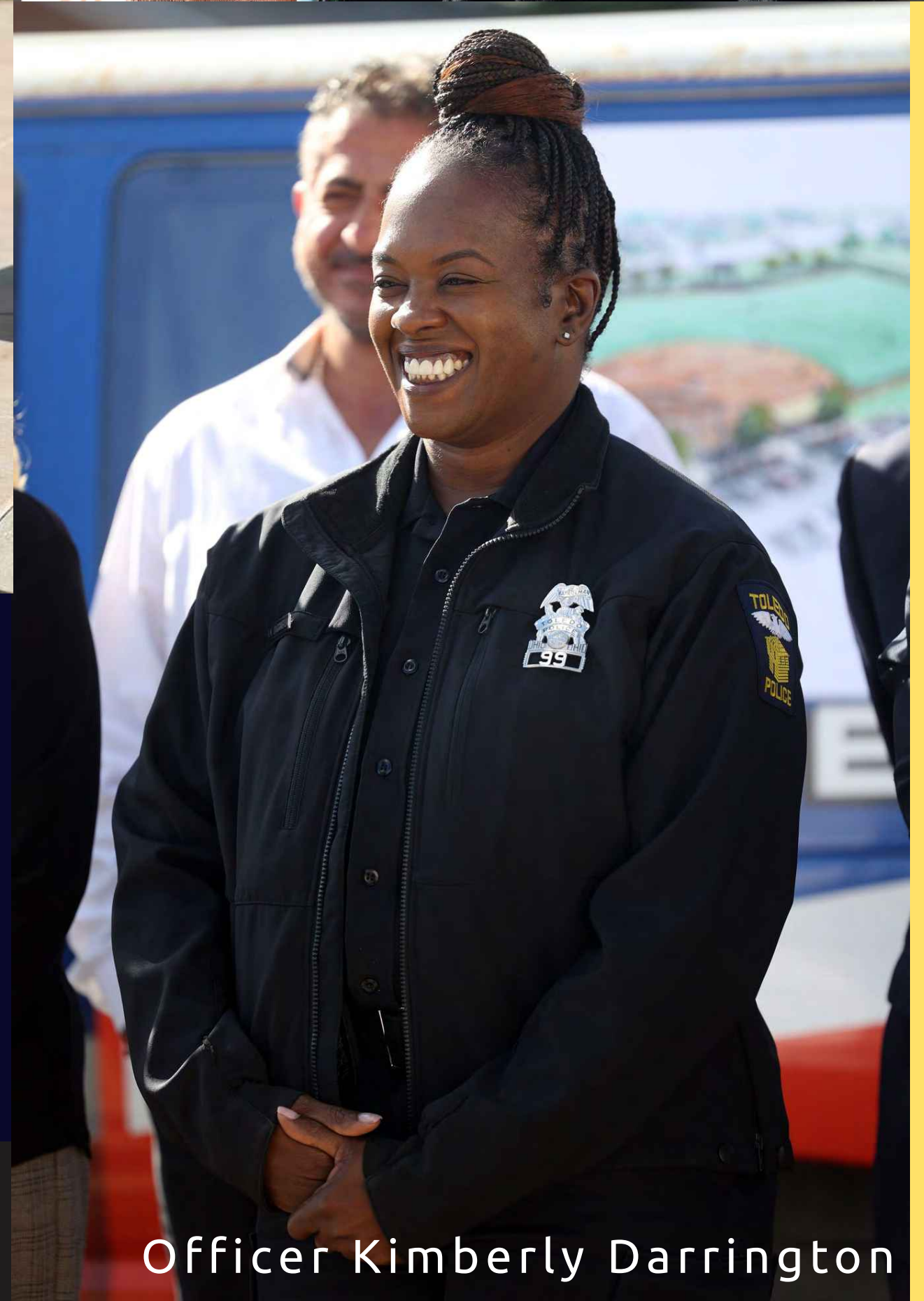
On September 6th, Toledo police officers walked the Dia Boys to school to make their day a memorable one.

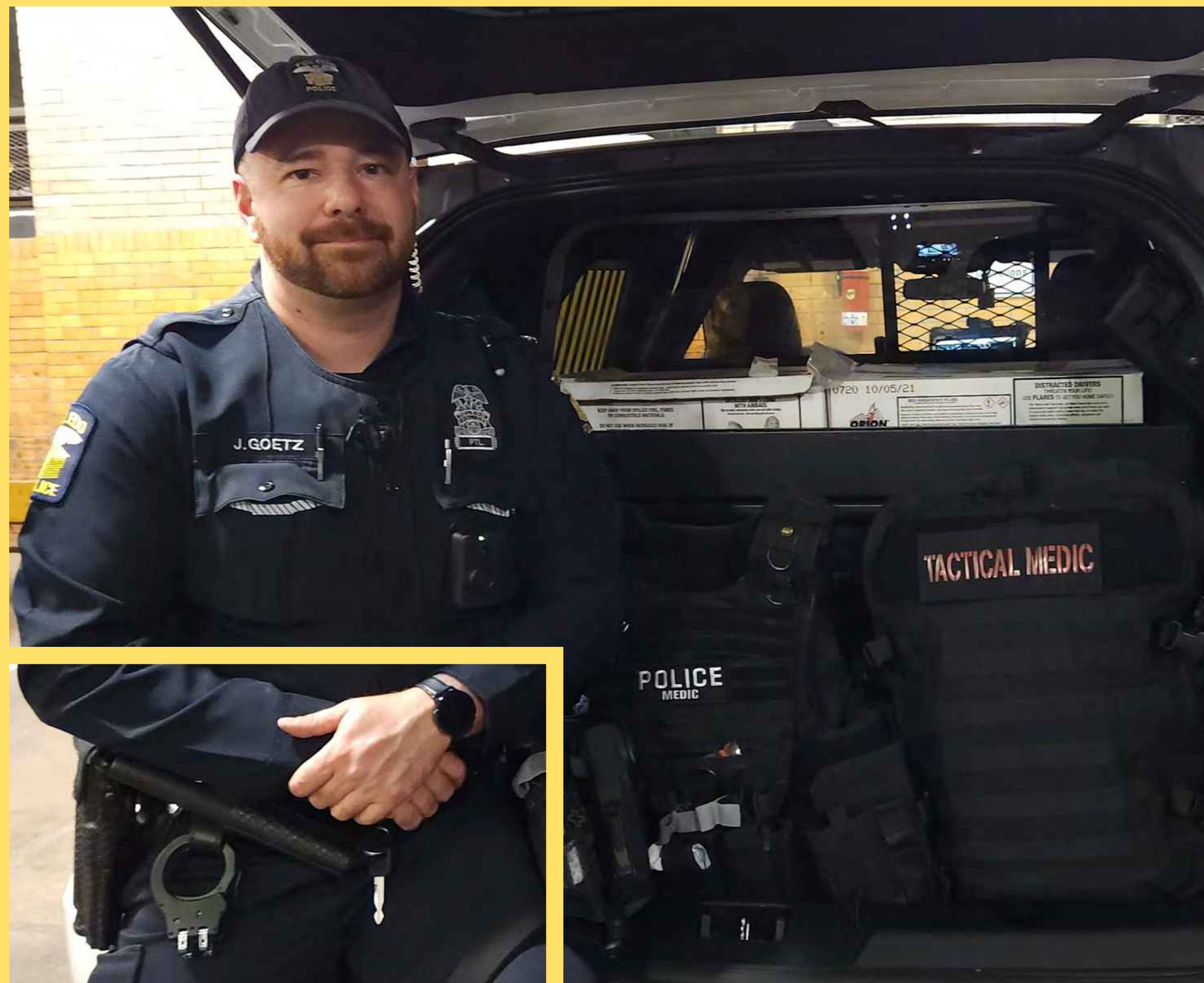
Angels Outreach

After locating two chest wounds, Officer Goetz was able to quickly dress them, drastically increasing the victim's chances of survival until Toledo Fire & Rescue Department arrived on the scene. The victim did survive and the suspect was caught.



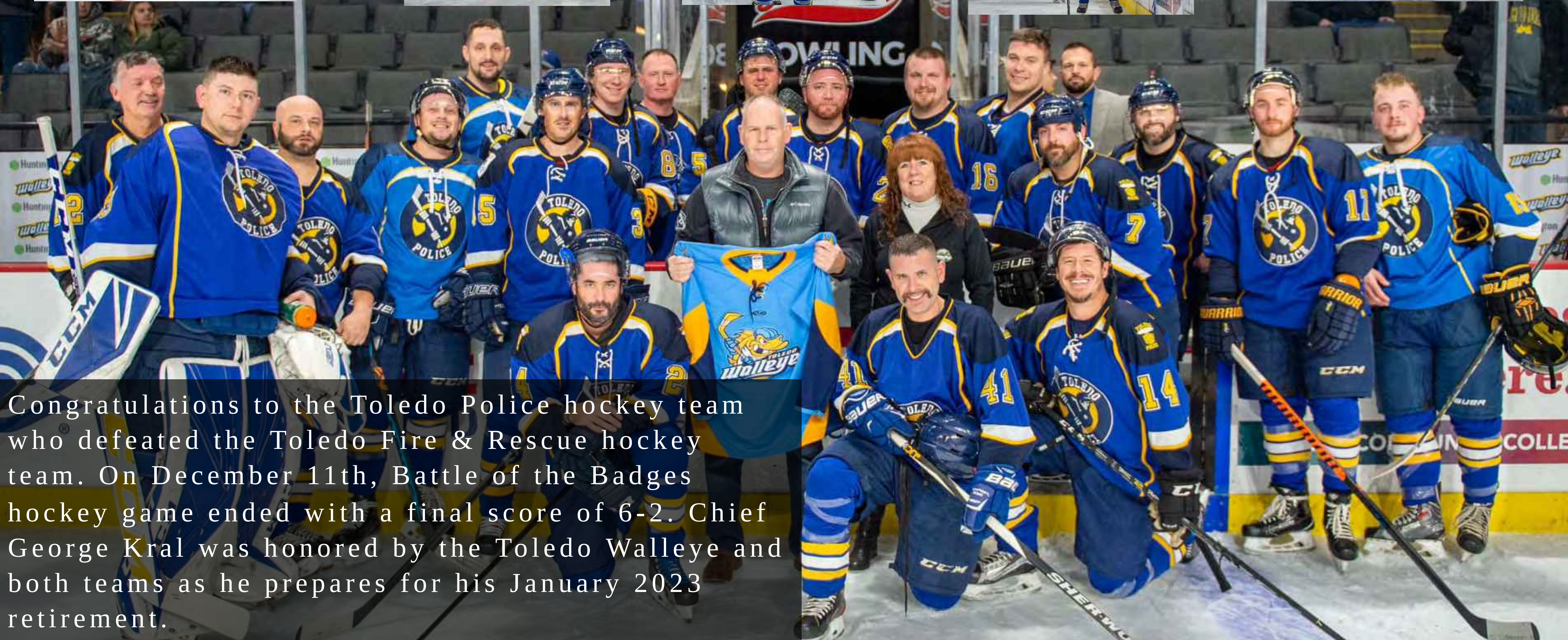

Officer Brandon Stalker

Officer Stalker joined the Toledo Police Department on July 31, 2018. He graduated the police academy on March 1, 2019 and began his field training program, rotating between working at Scott Park and the Central District Station. After successfully completing the field training program he began working the streets.

On January 18, 2021, Officer Brandon Stalker began the afternoon shift in the Central District Station's roll call room. He and his partner, McKenzie Schuster, loaded equipment into their cruiser and responded to the scene of a barricaded arson suspect at 2234 Fulton Street. They were assigned to the outer perimeter as the negotiators worked to get the suspect to exit peacefully. When negotiations failed the SWAT team was brought in. As SWAT approached, the suspect exited the house with a gun in each hand and immediately began firing, striking Brandon. Officers on scene rendered aid to Brandon and without delay he was transported to the hospital where he succumbed to his wound, paying the ultimate sacrifice protecting our city.

As officers instructed the suspect to drop the gun, the suspect fired at the officers. Officer Wilcox returned fire and the man fled. Officer Wilcox pursued him and they exchanged gunfire. The suspect was struck and was taken into custody.

On February 15, 2021, Officers responded to 2622 106th Street on a report of a female shot and an armed male suspect who would not let her leave. When officers arrived, they could hear the female telling them to open the door, however, the door was secured with a deadbolt. Officer Loehrke could see the male inside with a gun to his mouth and kicked the door open. Officers Thomas, Beck and Keplinger entered and the male shot himself. Two female victims were found inside and were escorted outside to get medical treatment while officers attempted CPR on the male suspect.

On July 4 2021, officers were dispatched to a report of people fighting at a large block party in the 2600 block of Lawrence. Shortly after being dispatched, the call was upgraded to a male shooting into the air. Officers Ebright and Hohenberger were the first to arrive, as shots were still being fired in a massive crowd of up to three hundred people. Both officers ran into the crowd and directed people to get down and take cover as shots continued to ring out. They kept moving towards the gun fire. As the officers closed in, several of the shooters fled. Officers Ebright and Hohenberger pursued the suspects to a nearby vehicle and were nearly struck as the suspects fled. Officers Ebright and Hohenberger provided the vehicle description to other responding police crews in the area and returned to the scene to check on the injured.

On January 18, 2021, officers went to 2234 Fulton Street looking for a suspect wanted on felony warrants for arson and vandalism. Officers located the suspect who produced a handgun and ran inside the residence creating a barricaded gunman situation. The SWAT team was notified to respond as officers created a perimeter and began attempting to negotiate with the suspect to exit peacefully. After negotiations with the suspect failed, the SWAT team deployed chemical agents to draw the suspect out of the house. Officers Linkous, Kiser, Knaggs and Marsh were standing by as the arrest team to take the suspect into custody while Officer Jackson manned the turret of the armored vehicle. The suspect exited the house with a weapon in each hand, firing continuously. Members of the arrest team and Officer Jackson engaged the suspect and ended the threat.

Letter of Recognition



On February 5, 2021, officers responded to a report of a person shot at 841 Byrneport. Prior to their arrival, the call was updated to three children shot and the armed suspect was still at the location. Officer Michael Ellerbrock and Officer Blake Wells arrived after several other crews and could see that the suspect was being taken into custody. They quickly ran into the apartment to look for the victims. Once upstairs, they found two children deceased on the floor and continued searching for the third child. Officer Ellerbrock found him hiding behind a bed, suffering from life threatening injuries. Realizing that it was imperative to get him medical treatment, Officer Ellerbrock swiftly picked up the injured child, carried him downstairs and outside to the Life Squad. Officer Wells assisted Officer Ellerbrock as they navigated icy pavement. Officer Ellerbrock then went with the child in the Life Squad to assist in his care while Officer Wells assisted at the scene.

On September 3, 2021, officers were dispatched to an injury accident at Greenbelt Parkway and Bush Street. Upon arrival, a witness informed Officer Christopher Guanilo that a vehicle had struck a light pole, veered into the oncoming lanes of traffic, through a fence and down into a creek. The witness believed the driver was unconscious after striking the light pole and directed Officer Guanilo to the entry point of the creek where the vehicle was last seen. Officer Guanilo went down into the creek and saw that the driver appeared to be unconscious. Officer Guanilo quickly acted to extract the driver through a window as she regained consciousness. Minutes after the driver was safely out of the vehicle, it began sinking deeper into the creek and the front end was submerged in water.

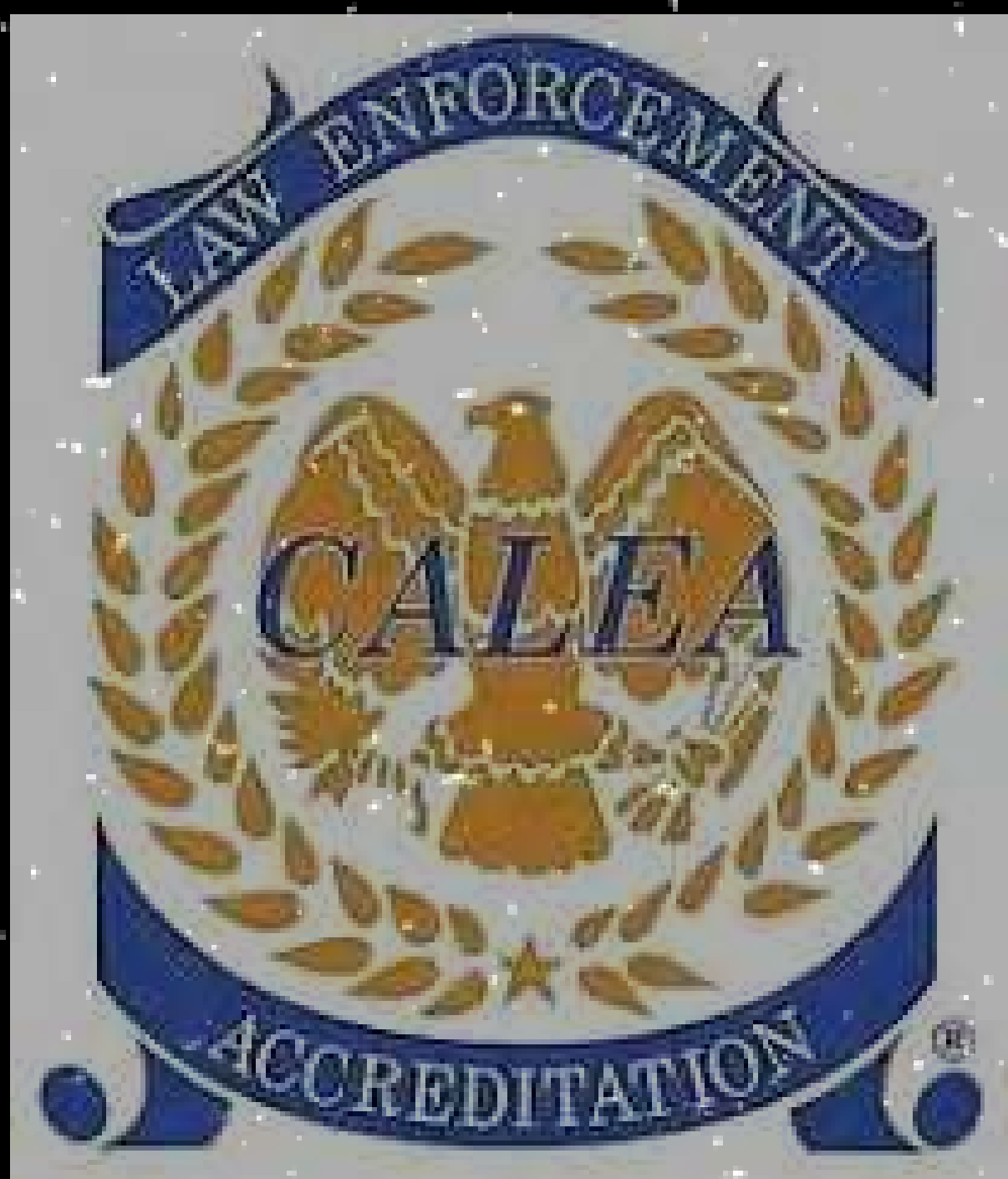

The Toledo Police Department has once again been awarded re-accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). This award was received on April 2nd during the 2022 Spring CALEA Conference. The Toledo Police Department has been an accredited law enforcement agency since 2003 and this marks the 7th award that the department has received.

The process of CALEA re-accreditation begins with a rigorous four year cycle, requiring annual assessments of policies, practices, and processes against internationally accepted public safety standards. These assessments are conducted each year by independent assessors with significant public safety experience. This four year process culminates with an on-site visit that includes structured interviews with department personnel and members of the community to assess the department's effectiveness and overall service delivery capabilities. During the on-site visit, public feedback is also received to promote community trust and engagement. The decision to accredit is then rendered by a governing body of twenty-one CALEA Commissioners following a public hearing and a review of all reporting documentation.

CALEA Accreditation is a mark of law enforcement excellence and recognizes state-of-the-art police practices and departmental professionalism. Furthermore, this continuous process serves as the foundation for a successful, transparent, and community focused public safety agency.





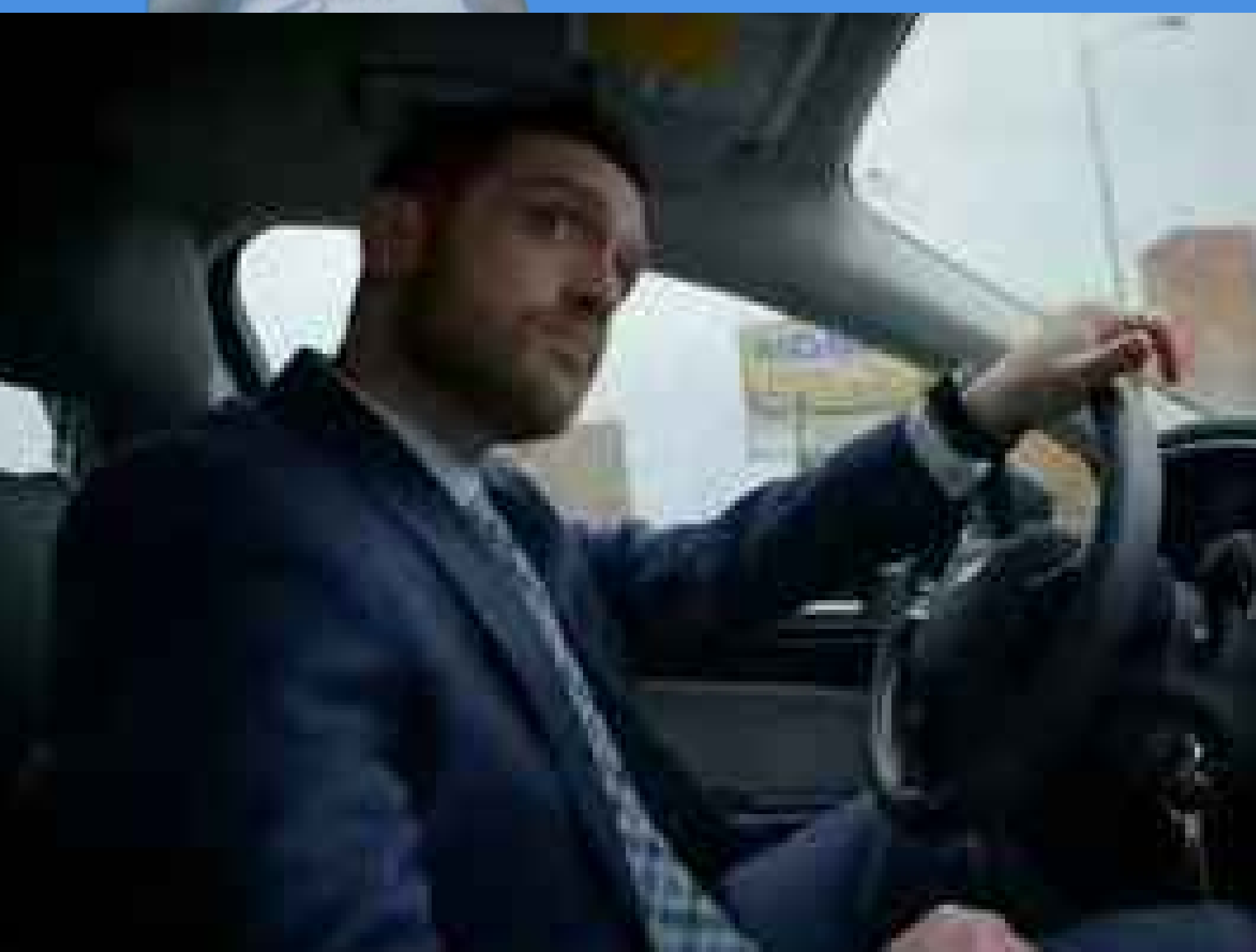

Justice for Malachi

On July 15, 2022, Real Time Crime television series comes to Toledo, Ohio to interview Detective Jeffrey Sharp and Detective William Goodlet. This documentary was based on Malachi Barnes' homicide case that occurred the evening of Thanksgiving day in the year of 2018. This case was Detective Sharp's first homicide case which involved an innocent 3 year old victim who was shot in the head during a drive by shooting on interstate 75. The detectives and the Toledo Police Criminal Intelligence Section work together to analyze surveillance video. The detectives diligently piece together the evidence to positively identify the suspects (Matthew Smith and K'veon Giles) involved in the shooting which lead to their conviction on March 24, 2020. After both suspects appealed their convictions, the State of Ohio, Sixth District Court of Appeals affirmed the judgment on August 20, 2021. The suspects were sentenced to 45 years to life in prison for the aggravated murder of little Malachi. Justice was served for Malachi with the impressive and collaborative efforts of the officers in the Toledo Police Department.
