Vetter Becomes Deputy Police Chief; 14 Others In Force Win Promotions

Duck Orders Bring Command Officers To Full Strength

Police Chief Robert Duck today promoted Capt. Raymond C. Vetter to the rank of deputy chief, and announced the promotions of two lieutenants to the rank of captain, four sergeants to lieutenant, and eight patrolmen to sergeant.

The promotions, all effective Jan. 1, bring the number of command officers on the force to full strength.

Chief Duck's announcement followed a week of interviews with policemen.

Captain Vetter, who observed his 48th birthday Thursday, will become Chief Duck's administrative assistant and will command the division's service units, the records and communications bureaus.

The records bureau now is supervised by Deputy Chief William Wiener, who will retire at the end of the month.

Appointed In 1952

Now captain in charge of felonies in the detective bureau, Captain Vetter was promoted to his present rank in January, 1968.

He was appointed a patrolman in January, 1952, graduating at the head of his police academy class. He became a sergeant in July, 1960, and a lieutenant in October, 1964.

Captain Vetter, his wife, and their six children live at 1266 Craigwood Rd.

Vetter Appoints Two To Be Acting Chiefs Of Detective, Felony Units

As one of his first orders as acting chief of police, Raymond Vetter Thursday afternoon appointed two men in acting capacities to run the detective bureau and the felony squad.

Captain John Weinandy was named acting head of the detective bureau after the retirement Thursday of Deputy Police Chief Marion Davey.

Captain James Navarre was named acting felony staff captain to replace Captain Weinandy.

Acting Chief Vetter was appointed to his post by City Manager Daken after the city's screening committee failed to find a replacement for Chief Duck, who also retired effective Thursday.

Manager Daken noted that 89 applications for Chief Duck's job

have been received by the city's personnel department and the six-man screening committee has narrowed the list to less than 20.

Some time between March 15 and March 30, the manager said, he will make the appointment.

He added that he does not expect to get involved in the screening process until the list has been further narrowed to no more than six candidates.

A retirement dinner honoring Chief Duck and Deputy Chief Davey was held Thursday evening at the Parkcrest and was attended by hundreds of well-wishers.

Chief Duck, an attorney, said he will practice law, and Deputy Chief Davey stated he will enter into a law-enforcement counseling service.

Vetter Named Acting Chief

Will Head Police When Duck Retires

Deputy Chief Raymond Vetter will be named acting police chief when Chief Robert Duck retires March 1, City Manager Daken said Thursday.

The manager had intended to name a permanent chief by then but the number of applicants for the position exceeded expectations, and the six-member screening committee has taken longer than intended to reach a list of finalists.

The screening committee is to arrive at a list of three to six finalists. Mr. Daken then will appoint one as chief.

Donald Bradley, city labor relations and personnel director, said the administration had received 86 applications as of Thursday for the job which will pay approximately \$23,000 annually.

Mr. Bradley said that more than two-thirds of the applicants are from outside the Toledo area and responded to advertisements in national magazines devoted to police affairs.

When asked about filling the slot of deputy chief-investigations, which will become vacant when Marion Davey retires March 1, Donald Shanteau, safety director, said that he would prefer that no key positions be filled until the new police chief is named.

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
