Thacher Leaps To Own Defense With Deluge of Fiery "Oratory"; Closed First Policy Condemned

Charges that the long-time manipulation of bills-of-ale covering trucks hired by the city is intended solely to conceal their actual ownership by city officials or close relatives are made by independent truck operators who are unable to obtain city jobs.

That the repeated practice of giving the trucking business to "favorite sons" or to large fleet operators in preference to business generally was charged recently at a protest meeting on the East Side.

Mayor Thacher, who presided at the meeting, defended his policy of awarding contracts to the lowest bidder. He said that the city is not in the business of trucking, but of maintaining a fleet of trucks for its own use.

Robert Fudge, brother-in-law of William Director (Wood Rowley), declared that two trucks were rented by the city but were purchased by himself at a forced sale recorded in Wood county and disposed of in a legitimate manner the same day.

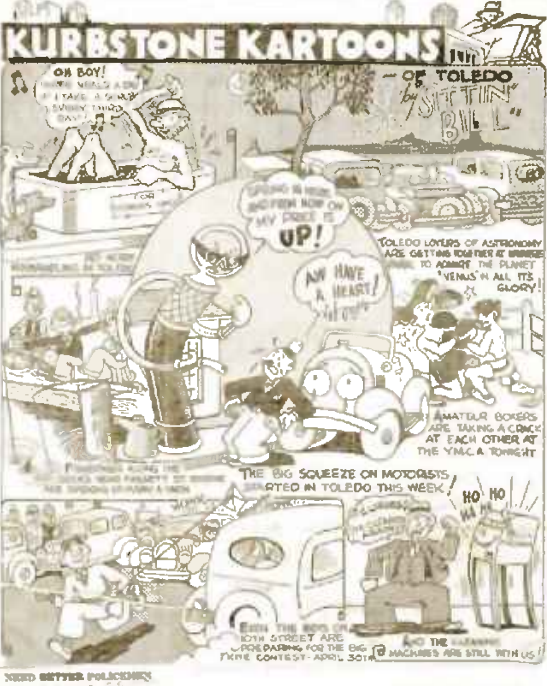

THE EFFECT OF THE DEPRESSION UPON VICE

The South Side News has been watching with interest the effect of the business depression upon the condition of our city and other cities, in respect to vice, and the publisher has drawn the conclusion that the combined depression and vice will be the cause of an increase in crime.

Unemployment has driven hundreds of men to lawlessness in their endeavor to acquire the necessities of life for themselves and their families. Times are going to change, and when people believe to seriously consider their self-government and select men of merit and ability and integrity is the solution. A government for, and by the people will bring back the prosperity which will enable men to support themselves and their families, thus laying less dependence upon foul means of survival.

The South Side of Toledo has two main entrances from other parts of the city, namely the Summit street extension to Broadway and South St. Clair Street. For many years we of this part have tried to protect those entrances from trash which we believed would be detrimental to the best interests of this section.

When former Mayor Jackson was service director, it was the plan of his department to construct an incinerator plant on So. St. Clair Street near the bridge. We protested vigorously, and the city councilmen sided in the defeat of the project.

We objected, like-wise, to this movement, reminding them of our belief that the two main arteries to the South Side must at all times remain in like-of any obstruction or construction destined to further hold back the proper development of our South Side.

Now comes the city of Toledo, unmindful or otherwise, and contemplates the proper, a disgraceful looking board fence to enclose a field of gathered junk and other materials from other parts of the city and haul it to the door of the South Side. What must the out-of-town traveler think when going from the Union Depot to the center of the city and his eyes fall upon the junk pile located there?

We appeal to our city councilmen, from the South Side, to stop the growth of this nuisance. No other section of the city with as much at stake as this section, would condone such a monstrosity. The city could not construct or establish such a disgraceful mess at the entrance to the city, nor will we of this part accept so-called "big shots" refuse. Why must we put up with it when that property was originally laid out for a park since the construction of the auditorium.

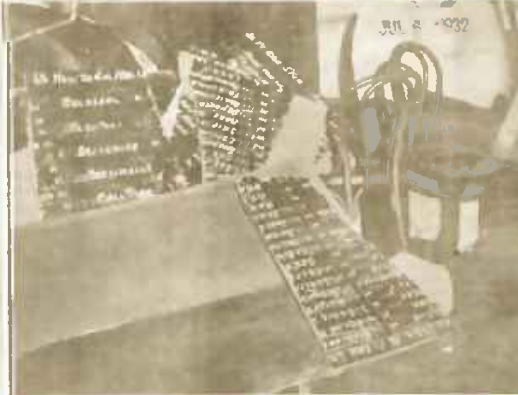

AGAIN, THE PAY CUT

Pay cuts and layoffs bring more strange occurrences. Two patrolmen trying to get along on \$23 a week are for attempting extortion. A third faces discharge because he solicited and obtained a check for \$5 from a motorist.

Speaking of these cases, Supt. John F. Smith asks what else can be expected when pay has been cut so much: when officers have homes to keep up and children to feed. Pay cuts and periodic tax cuts, he asserts, are bound to be a temptation to some officers.

Wives of policemen write to The Mirror to tell why their families can't get along on \$23 a week. One of them gave one good reason when she listed the cost of a patrolman's outfit.

John F. Smith

Little or nothing has been done so far to remedy the pay situation, though Mayor Murphy's five-year would help restore things to normal again. More has done about laid-off policemen and firemen.

The mayor, striving to keep his promise to maintain the first line of defense at top efficiency, has found a way out of the lay-off situation. He has announced factories, notably the Ford Motor company, will hire firemen and policemen, and keep them at work the city is ready to recall them.

If the city can't at one re-hire these men, the mayor's is undoubtedly the best way out of a bad situation. One of all these men were to have been laid to rest. It is the implied promise of council when it adopted the budget. If this promise now has to be broken, then must be kept in some other way. The mayor has chosen correct one.

It is needless to repeat that pay cutting should not be stopped; that laid-off men should and must be put to work. Until things are balanced once and for all, friction and difficulty in both police and fire departments. The morale of the men can't hold up indefinitely in a time of starvation pay or no pay at all.

Until the time when normalcy is restored, the mayor should continue to do as he has been doing—work to get the city so these two vital departments, and others equally vital in their way, can be returned to normal. And he should cooperate from every possible source.

The state now has a chance to extend a helping hand. Unless Gov. Brucker authorizes the purchase of \$1,500,000 emergency bonds 25,000 families are going to be entirely out from food within ten days. Grocery firms, which have willing to the city on credit since April, feel their cash can't run any longer than nine days.

Unless the state comes through, all the families of Toledo are going to be tossed head-first into starvation. The state should come through, however, as Controller Brownell reminds, Brucker promised once before to see that emergency bonds find a market.

Welfare, police and fire are all distressing problems. They've got to be solved, and everyone must help to solve them—city, state and nation, if necessary.

WAR 'BLOOD PROFITS' Uncle Sam Plans To Lay Strong Hand on the "Profiteers" PRICES FIXED FOR THE U.S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The government is about to lay a strong hand on "war profiteering."
Prices on steel and copper are to be fixed to insure a "reasonable profit" to producers and a "fair bargain" for the government and its allies, it is officially announced.
President Wilson has informed the new War Industries Board that the allies are to buy war materials in this country on the same terms as the United States. "Blood profits" are not to be tolerated.
The Federal Trade Commission announced today its report on copper prices will be before the president in two weeks.
The cost of steel prices will be from \$100 a ton to \$120 more than paid by the allies to about \$30 a ton. All purchases will thus be in the hands of B. M. Harsh, an official representative of the

allies. He was buying over 400,000 tons of steel in this country to insure against "blood profits."
President Wilson today urged "speed up" on the Federal Trade Commission in determining costs upon which the government is to fix prices for raw materials.
The allies are pressing for supplies. The president has directed they shall not be gouged in war purchases. Pricing fixing on coal, steel, iron, coke, oil, zinc, copper, aluminum, lead, tin, rubber, cement and petroleum awaits completion of investigations by the commission.
The president today broke into a meeting of the board. He was told the work was going on rapidly—that the copper report would be ready in two weeks. He then went to the Department of Justice where he conferred with Atty. Gen. Clegg. It is understood steel prices, studied by the department, will be presented to the steel trust, water discussed.

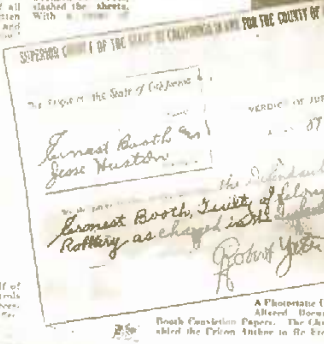

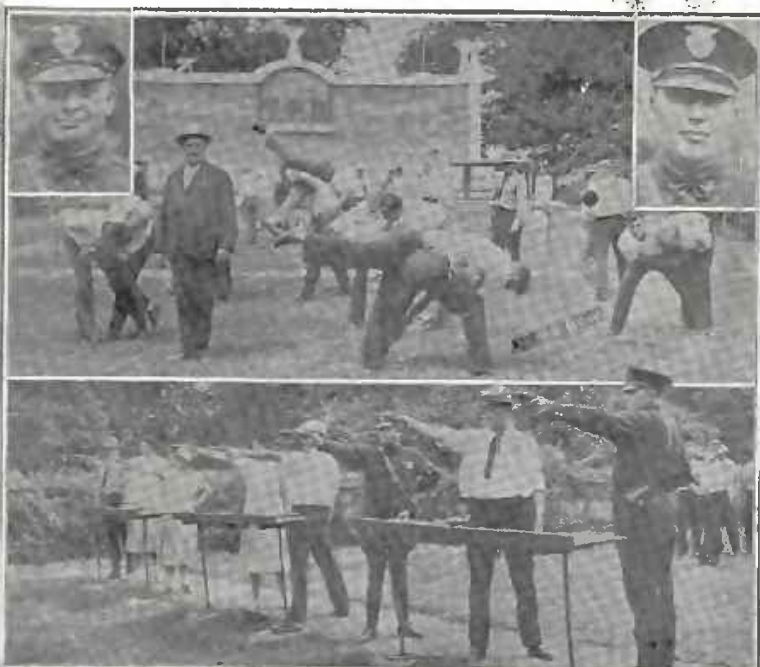

A Guide For Policemen

A REAL advance in police methods is marked in publication today of a police guide for the local force, written by Inspector Joseph Delehaunty. Frequently The News-Bee has been required by circumstances to criticize the lack of adequate instruction for the new patrolman. It is cheering to see the various steps of our program for police reforms adopted one by one.

First came the police radio, which has proved its worth time and again. The police school, still in the nebulous stage, is brought a step nearer by publication of Inspector Delehaunty's excellent guide.

Installation of the standard uniform crime record system, third major reform, is now in process. There remain the modernization of crime detection methods, equipment of an adequate police laboratory and strengthening of discipline. We have seen in recent days indications that the last-named of these is being given some attention. SEP 15 1937

When the complete program as outlined is an established fact, police efficiency will have been immeasurably increased. Toward its accomplishment, Inspector Delehaunty has made a distinct contribution.

'Know Your Profession'

Under the above title, Inspector Joseph Delehaunty of the Toledo police division, has prepared a comprehensive guide in police officers which should fill a long-felt want.

Inspector Delehaunty, in a foreword, lays out originality of the contents. The inspector's modesty is admirable. But we give him great credit for his efforts. He is not only a conscientious police officer, with a splendid record, but he is a man of recognized intellectual gifts which are enhanced by good, common sense.

The booklet he has prepared will of course be put in the hands of every member of the police division from the newest rookie to the oldest and highest in the service. It is a primer which if followed will improve the work of every officer.

For years Inspector Delehaunty at assemblies has emphasized to patrolmen the need for knowing the laws of arrest. It is quite as important because often a grave injustice is done in arresting citizens. The outcome of many false arrests has been suits for damages for illegal imprisonment or charges of assault pressed against the arresting officers.

As the inspector points out, there is an arrest where a person is not deprived of his or her liberty. The officer effects arrest by the laying of a hand upon the suspect.

"More words do not constitute an arrest, although manual seizure is not always necessary."

"Since it is the duty of every citizen to submit peacefully to a lawful arrest, he is under no obligation to submit to an arrest unless he knows or is notified of the facts that justify his arrest." This is a phrase of police work that may well be learned thoroughly by every uniformed man and detective.

Patrolmen must know when they have the right to knock down a door to gain entrance to a place in order to effect an arrest. They must know when they have a right to kill. This is probably the most important of all.

Police officers must be grounded in their rights and their limitations. A careful study of Inspector Delehaunty's primer will greatly aid the police officer to avoid those errors of commission which bring down censure on the whole police establishment.

CANT REPLEVIN 'SLOTS'
To Reclaim Alton Property, Who Fields They're Gambling Devices

AKRON, D. May 28.—Municipal Judge Owen M. Rodgers today denied a replevin action for large slot machines seized by police who seized readers on grounds that "slots" are gambling devices and therefore replevin is not subject to recovery.

COST OF JAIL FOOD IS CUT

Prisoners Soon To Get Same Rations as Unemployed of Toledo

Prisoners in the city jail block in the Safety building will eat the same food as the city's poor, if a plan under consideration by Safety Director Albert P. Fall is put into effect.

Mr. Fall said today he is considering a move whereby food for city prisoners will be bought at the city's central relief warehouse, effecting a drastic reduction in cost.

The safety director's announcement was made as he accepted the resignation of Mrs. Bertha Aldrich, who for many years has been in charge of feeding city prisoners and who resigned today because she was unable to operate as a profit and comply with Mr. Fall's demand that the cost of feeding the prisoners be cut from 40 to 25 cents a day for each prisoner.

"I believe that by buying our food at the central relief station, we can cut the cost even below 25 cents a day," Mr. Fall said.

Mrs. Aldrich operated as a concessionaire under an agreement by which the jail kitchens were placed at her disposal, providing her own food, she fed prisoners at the rate of 40 cents a day and also operated a restaurant on the fifth floor of the Safety building for city employees and officials.

Clear Up Double Parking

ANOTHER Toledo police drive against double parking has been ordered. Such have been given before. If this traffic nuisance had been eliminated by strict enforcement of any former order, it is apparent there would be no need for its repetition now. Any one who walks or drives in downtown streets during busy hours knows there is a general disregard of the double parking rule. This has grown up because drivers know they can escape yellow tags or fines. If autoists ever discovered they cannot "get away with it" these double parking violations will cease suddenly. Certainly there are enough traffic officers on duty to bring about regard for this important city regulation if the officers are backed properly by city officials. If patrolmen do not have this support, the law will continue in flagrant violation.

The ban against double standing of cars in the streets is one of the most important of the traffic regulations. When it is disregarded by selfish motorists who think of nothing but their own convenience, the driving by other persons is impeded. Traffic is slowed. Peril to life and property is increased when fire trucks and ambulances must be driven through blocked streets. This nuisance and menace should be corrected immediately and permanently.

NOT so many years ago in 1925 in the exact, Ann Helbrant was a Detroit newspaper woman.

Then her husband, Maurice Helbrant, passed a silly civil service examination and received a long-obtained ambition to become affiliated with the United States bureau of narcotics.

During this time Mrs. Helbrant has witnessed scores of purchases of narcotics made by her husband from wholesale peddlers, some of whom have had international connections with the underworld. She has been a partner at countless night club parties and has seen the confidence of dope dealers, and in innumerable ways she aided the cause of the government in detecting the profitable dope syndicates.

FOR instance—
One night a few years ago a raiding party of agents accompanied by city police, descended upon seven peddlers, hauled simultaneously to make arrests which would break up for a period of years, at least, one of the largest bands of dope dispensers ever operated here.

But as the group reached the street, three of the peddlers suddenly turned back and ran. They were concealed in the streets of their neighborhood and things looked bad for the agents.

In Baltimore recently Mrs. Helbrant posed as the wife of a bootlegger who planned to enter the dope racket and offered as home as several parties at which evidence of extreme value to the case was obtained. She will testify at the trial of ten persons arrested in connection with the case.

In Louisiana Mrs. Helbrant succeeded in taking in a motion picture of her husband in the act of purchasing drugs. The film was introduced as evidence in the case, which was prosecuted successfully by the government.

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O. HENRY'S PRISON CHIEF RECALLS PEN HOSPITAL JOB

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 21.—Sitting at his desk, tapping a cadaverous-looking staff contemplatively, Dr. John Thomas looked up, at the timid knock on his door, and smiled, peering in his droll way over the top of his glasses.

"Come in," he said. There entered one of the most interesting hours it has been the pleasure of this reporter to spend.

From 1900 to 1908, Dr. Thomas was one of the physicians at the Ohio penitentiary. His experiences are recalled and told in "The Prison Chief," which is one of the best of the "Prison Chief" series.

"We had tough birds in those days," he declared.

Dr. Thomas was penitentiary physician during the years that O. Henry spent in the institution serving an imprisonment term of five years, having been admitted March 23, 1900, and released July 29, 1901. His term of confinement having been reduced from the years to three years and three months on account of good behavior.

Dr. Thomas' contributions to biographies of the great story writer have been many. It is the time of his imprisonment, O. Henry had been content with "small stuff," according to his first biographer, Prof. G. Alphonso Smith of the University of Virginia. While it was improved, he expanded and developed the talent which never has been equalled.

"I never have seen anyone more honest or more upright," Dr. Thomas said of William Henry Porter, the real name of O. Henry.

"He was quiet and kept entirely to himself, with the exception of the friends he made among the western desperadoes and bandits."

"For these men he took a great liking, always swapping stories with them and collecting material from them for his stories."

"Among these famous highwaymen, Al Jennings was a particularly good friend of his. These two

often fell better stories than anybody I ever knew."

"The stories which Al Jennings told in his 'Thru the Shadow' with O. Henry are for the most part absolutely untrue. He never set foot on a good story teller. They were inventions of his work imagination."

HARVEY KLAIBER HEARING STARTS

Alleged Divorce Paper Enters Case of Former Police Lieutenant.

A document described by Safety Director Albert P. Fall as a faked divorce decree and explained by Harvey Klaiber, former police lieutenant, to have been a mock journal entry for use in a mock divorce trial at a New Year's eve party, occupied a prominent place Tuesday in the hearing of Klaiber before the civil service commission for reinstatement.

Klaiber was questioned by Director Fall following the disappearance in June of 1931 from the safe in the East Side police station which had been placed there for safekeeping, the property of an East Toledo merchant.

Director Fall explained at the hearing that the document which bore Klaiber's name had been brought into the case merely to determine whether Klaiber was "a truth teller" and declared that Klaiber had denied knowledge of the paper at the time of his previous hearing.

The director said that by comparing writing the names signed to the document appeared to have been written by Klaiber, and that a handwriting expert verified this opinion.

Explained as Joke

Klaiber explained the existence of the paper entry by saying that two young attorneys in 1927 had planned a New Year's Eve party at Toledo Beach, the primary situation of which was to be a mock divorce trial. A year previous such a party had been held, he said, with a mock murder trial as the principal fun.

Klaiber testified that he knew a man who owned a cottage and that he was asked to obtain the use of this cottage for the party. One of the young attorneys made the mock journal entry for the divorce and gave it to Klaiber, the latter said. Klaiber was unable to procure the cottage and the party was abandoned, the former lieutenant explained.

Klaiber said he then placed the document in a desk at the old Longway street police station. Later it developed that the entry was found by Sergt. Lynn Matthews, Klaiber said, and still later Klaiber heard from another source that Harry Jennings, then chief of police, had the paper.

Questioned by Judge

Klaiber declared that he never was called upon by Chief Jennings to explain the entry, but that when appearing in another case Judge Charles M. Murray asked him about it and the judge declared that it was not a divorce since his own (the judge's) correct name had not been appended to the document, but that if it had been done it would have constituted a serious offense.

Director Fall asked why Klaiber had not told him this version of the story at the time of his hearing. Klaiber replied that Director Fall called Jennings on the telephone and told Klaiber how Jennings to be an enemy of his and that the director had asked Klaiber to leave the room. The director denied he had asked the lieutenant to leave the room while the telephone conversation was in progress.

Asked by the director why he had denied knowledge of the paper at the previous hearing, Klaiber answered that he knew Jennings was in the picture and that he desired he should get a lawyer to represent him.

Defense Witnesses Called

Attorney Nicholas Wladski, who represented Klaiber, called the following character witnesses, all of whom testified to the integrity of the lieutenant: A. J. Eggleston, Dr. H. K. Beckwith, Inspector W. J. Delahanty, Inspector Thomas O'Rilly, Captain Clarence Meade and Dr. J. E. Hunter.

Chief Louis Haas also testified that Klaiber always had been a good officer.

When Attorney Wladski brought out the fact that the contents of Klaiber's testimony at his first hearing before the safety director concerning the false journal entry had not been made under oath and that no stenographer had been present, Director Fall explained that this was because he had no desire to hurt Klaiber or anyone else implicated in the matter, but merely desired to test Klaiber's veracity.

The case of Harvey Klaiber, former police lieutenant, who was dismissed by Safety Director Albert P. Fall, will be considered by the civil service commission Nov. 10. It was decided yesterday after a number of witnesses were heard.

Safety Director Fall, in explaining his dismissal of Klaiber, explained a "faked divorce decree," which was brought into the hearing of Klaiber in connection with the disappearance of \$300 from the East Side police station safe, was "very introduced to determine whether Klaiber was a 'truth teller'." He said Klaiber denied knowledge of the document at his previous hearing.

Klaiber, at yesterday's hearing, said the divorce document was prepared by two Toledo attorneys to provide fun at a New Year's Eve party and that it was a "fake" document. A number of witnesses testified Klaiber always had been a good officer. Among the witnesses were A. J. Eggleston, Dr. H. K. Beckwith, Police Inspector Joseph Delahanty, Inspector Thomas O'Rilly, Captain Clarence Meade, Dr. J. E. Hunter and Chief Louis J. Haas.

Klaiber was dismissed following the hearing staged by Director Fall in connection with the disappearance of \$300 from the East Side police station safe last June. Other officers involved in the investigation were reduced in rank.
