REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT, }
TOLEDO, O., January 1st, 1886. }

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to herewith present this, my report of the work performed by the Police Department, of the City of Toledo, for the year ending December 31st, 1885.

By appointment from your Honorable Board, I assumed command of the department on the 10th day of September, 1885, and by strict discipline have endeavored to enforce the laws of the United States, State of Ohio, and ordinances of the city, in the suppression of crime and punishment of criminals. To you and the citizens of Toledo, I leave to judge how well I have succeeded in my efforts.

The force, at present, consists of sixty-two men, graded as follows: Captain and Acting Superintendent, 1; Lieutenant, 1; Sergeants 4; Detectives, 3; Patrolmen, 51; Patrol Drivers, 2. One patrolman is detailed as Market Superintendent, one as Court Officer, two on patrol wagon, and one serving papers, leaving forty-six for regular patrol duty, which is divided into two details, thirteen for day and thirty-three for night duty.

I most respectfully recommend that your board request the Common Council to authorize the purchase of another patrol wagon, to be stationed somewhere in the vicinity of corner of Cherry and Huron streets, and divide the city into two patrol districts, making Adams street the dividing line. The necessity of this can readily be seen, as the wagon now in ser-

vice made 1,420 runs during the year; and it frequently occurs that, while the wagon is responding to a call, a second, and sometimes a third call comes in from some other part of the city.

I would again call your attention to a matter that I have recommended in my monthly reports—the necessity of increasing the force. The law allows one patrolman for every one thousand inhabitants, and Toledo, having a population of at least 75,000, is entitled to twenty-four more patrolmen. There is scarcely a day but complaints are received from the residence portion of the city asking for police protection; but with our limited number of men, it is impossible to comply. It is in these portions of the city that most of the petty crimes are committed. I would, therefore, suggest that you request the Council to grant said increase, and if they refuse to comply, to appoint ten additional sanitary policemen and detail them to do regular patrol duty.

There have been no large burglaries reported during the year, and the city has been more free from thieves and burglars than any city of its population in the country.

No serious disturbance took place during the year, with the exception of the Polish riot, on June 28th, resulting in the killing of two men. Immediately after word of the riot was received, a detachment of police was dispatched to the scene, the riot quelled and forty-two of the participants arrested, thirty-six of whom were bound over to the Court of Common Pleas, and are now in jail awaiting trial.

The health of the force for the past year has been poor, several of the members being unable to do duty for months at a time. There are at present three confined to their homes on account of sickness of a serious nature, and it will be some time before they are able for duty.

In closing I desire to return my grateful feeling to the officers and members of the department under my command, for their prompt obedience and faithful performance of duty; and to the members of your honorable board, my thanks for your support.

FINANCE.

Balance to credit of fund January 1st, 1885, \$16,283.81; amount paid into fund, \$35,686.17; total, \$51,969.98. Disbursements, pay rolls police department for year ending December 1st, 1885, \$46,862.61, less \$2,577.33 paid by corporation, prison and general funds, and \$48.87 unpaid on November roll; light, telephone, fuel and supplies, \$4,177.47; patrol barn expenses, \$833.58; total, \$51,960.83; balance in fund December 31st, 1885, \$9.15.

CENTRAL STATION.

The Central Station, located on Superior street, between Washington and Monroe streets, is a four-story building, 60 by 100 feet. The first floor is built of stone, and the upper ones of brick with stone trimmings. On the first floor is located the city prison, turnkey's room, lodgers' room, engine room and room for the care of the sick and injured persons. In connection with this room is the padded cell, in which are confined insane and persons suffering from the effects of strong drinks. It is so constructed that it is impossible for them to do injury to themselves, and is greatly admired by officers from abroad, where they have no such facilities. Second floor, captain's office, sergeant's office, detectives' office, clerk's office, court room, and store room. Third floor, patrolmen's room, bath room and sleeping rooms. Fourth floor, drill room and sleeping rooms. The building was erected in 1871. It is well adapted for the purpose intended.

OUTSIDE STATIONS.

In connection with engine houses 5, 7 and 8 is a prison attached with a dozen cells in each, but as yet have never been used.

EAST SIDE STATION.

During the year 1884, a station house was erected on the East Side, but it is practically worthless on account of the weakness of the structure, and has never been put into service. I would recommend that your board call the attention of the Common Council to said building and request them to repair the same. With the rolling mill soon to be put in operation, and the number of railroads centering on that side, it will soon be necessary to use the same.

CENSUS.

I most respectfully recommend to your honorable board the advisability of taking a census of the city, and that you authorize the Chief of Police to detail patrolmen to take said census. It is a matter that will be of interest to the citizens, as well as a favorable showing of the rapid growth of Toledo. It is done in other cities. Cleveland has a census taken each year by the police.

I would suggest that the Council be requested to purchase the lot adjoining the station house, on Superior street, and the erection of a building suitable for the patrol department. The building used at present as a patrol barn, being located in the alley, at the rear of the station, makes it inconvenient, at times when other vehicles are in said alley, to promptly respond to a call.

Hereto appended are the various tables showing the work performed by the department.

In closing my report, I desire to thank the members of your honorable board for the courtesy received both personally and as secretary of the board.
