We desire only to take the necessary space to call the attention of your honorable body and the public to the necessity for an increase of the force.

The creditable record made by the department is shown in this report.

We submit eighty-three men for regular night and day duty; the amount is much too small a number to guard and protect the city. The service of the balance of the force is required for various special duties. It is hoped your early attention will be given to the matter of providing means for enlarging the force.

Your attention is called to the accompanying report of the Chief of Police, in which we heartily concur.

Annual Report of Chief of Police.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT,
TOLEDO, OHIO, January 1, 1893.

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1892.

The numerical strength of the force at the present time is 96.

When the Board shall appoint the ten additional patrolmen, as authorized by law, a number of the patrol beats which are now much too large can be reduced in size, and this, together with an addition to the force which is contemplated, will insure better patrol service in sections of the city at present exposed.

The year just closed has been a credit to the department.

The absence of crimes of the graver sort has been remarkable. Burglars and pickpockets have found it neither profitable nor safe to ply their vocations here.

The conduct of the officers and patrolmen as a rule has been most excellent.

It has been the constant aim of the officers in control to discharge the duties devolving upon them without undue officiousness or the assumption of arbitrary power, at the same time having due regard for the maintenance of good order and the fair enforcement of laws and ordinances. The press of the city, as a rule, and our citizens generally, testify to the truth of this claim. It cannot be expected that a police force can escape a certain amount of criticism, but quite often harsh criti-

cism is made when, if the true facts had been fully known, commendation would have been bestowed. This is more particularly true in regard to the enforcement of city ordinances.

While performing the duties which are entailed by ordinances of the city, the officer who does his duty is too often regarded by many as a common nuisance, and frequently meets with treatment which sorely tries his patience.

The department has done a vast amount of work for outside cities. On a telegram or telephone we have always been ready to aid them in any way we could.

We have also recovered a number of horses stolen from other cities and arrested the guilty party.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 4,364.

Total number of runs made by the patrol wagon was 2,224.

Total amount of stolen property recovered, \$4,329.00.

Total number taken in charge by the matron, 450.

This department has also helped the humane society in many ways.

The purchase of the engine house on Lagrange street for a substation is a step in the right direction, and when in operation will benefit the department to a great extent. As it is now, one wagon takes all calls in the city limits.

The central station has been repaired and is in good condition. We would respectfully call our citizens' attention to the fact that we would be pleased to have them call and inspect the same.

It would be unjust to submit this report without calling your attention to the able and efficient work of the regular and detailed detective force of our city; also the lieutenant and sergeants.

Thanking the Board for the courtesy and kindness extended to me.

POLICE PRECINCTS.

The City of Toledo is divided into five police precincts, as follows, to-wit:

1st Precinct—All territory bounded by river front, Cherry and Lagrange streets and city limits, and includes the following beats: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9.

2d Precinct—All territory of East Toledo and all territory bounded by Maumee River, Monroe, Huron, Adams, Eleventh, Union and North streets, Canton avenue, old canal bed and Beach street, and includes the following beats: 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 22, 23, 41, 42, 43 and 44.

3d Precinct—All territory bounded by Monroe, Erie, Madison, Eleventh, Adams, Twelfth, Wakeman, Bancroft and city limits, and includes the following beats: 10, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 29 and 45.

4th Precinct—All territory bounded by Swan Creek, Wayne street, Brown avenue, Clinton and Frazier streets, Detroit avenue, Lincoln street, Collingwood avenue, Frazier, Nettie, Washington, Ontario, Monroe and Superior streets, and includes the following beats: 26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34.

5th Precinct—All territory bounded by Superior and Monroe streets, Maumee River and Swan creek, and includes the following beats: 24, 25, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39 and 40.

Each of the above precincts is in charge of a sergeant during the night, according to assignments from headquarters.

- No. 12. All territory bounded by Swan creek, South Erie, North Railroad avenue and Oliver street.

- No. 14. All territory bounded by Ottawa street and Broadway, from Bridge to Lake Shore R. R., and territory between Ottawa street and Dayton & Michigan R. R.
