FINANCE.

Balance in fund January 1st, 1884, \$23,057.12; amount paid into fund, \$48,936.13; total to the credit fund, \$71,993.13. Disbursements—Pay-roll Police Department, from December 1st, 1883, to December 1st, 1884, \$45,435.91; *Station House rolls, for September, October and November, 1884*, \$1,549.97; Health Department rolls, October and November, \$899.98; building 6th Ward Station, 1,765.94; incidental expenses, \$2,951.59; Patrol Barn expenses—re-building barn, purchase of wagon, horses, harness, and the necessary equipments for the maintenance of Patrol System, \$3,105.93—total Disbursements, \$55,709.32. Balance to credit of fund, Dec. 31st, 1884, \$16,283.81. Police Court fines deposited in City cases, \$5,162.12, in State cases, \$,3093,81 — total, \$8,255.93.

OBITUARY.

Patrolman Charles J. Stricker died at his residence on the 29th of January, 1884. Mr. Stricker was appointed patrolman October 4th, 1876, and served as such to the entire satisfaction of his superior officers, by whom he was considered a faithful and fearless officer. His death was mourned by the Department, who attended his funeral as a body.

PATROL WAGON SYSTEM.

On the 16th day of January, 1884, the Patrol Wagon was put into service, with two patrolmen, detailed from the force, and two drivers, appointed by your Board, to take charge of the same; one of the officers, John Bradley, was detailed to act as Sergeant of the Department, whose duty it is to see that everything connected with said Department is properly cared for, and to report any violation of rules for the government of same to the Chief of Police; one patrolman and driver to do duty in the day time, and one patrolman and driver for night duty. One year's experience has clearly demonstrated the fact that the system is a permanent improvement, the benefits of which are acknowledged by the citizens as well as the police. The Alarm System, furnished by the American District Telegraph Company, is a most important factor in perfecting the same; in less than one minute after the alarm has been turned in the wagon is on its way to the place called for. There are at present 102 boxes located in different parts of the city, and any responsible citizen can secure a key by calling at the office of the Chief of Police.
