# REPORT

OF

# CHIEF OF POLICE.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT,

TOLEDO, OHIO, January 1st, 1884. }

*To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners:*

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to make this, my report, of the transactions of the force since I assumed command, on the 8th day of November, 1883.

The health of the force, with a few exceptions, has been most excellent. The efficiency has not been lowered, and the acts of your Honorable Board has had a tendency to increase, rather than diminish, the thoroughness of the workings of it. The Patrol wagon and the service which it renders is deserving of my warmest commendation. I can hardly see at this time how we did without it. The promptness and thorough efficiency which has characterized the working of said system, call for a favorable endorsement of the business men of the city.

Since my taking charge of the force there has been two deaths, viz.: Patrolmen Thomas Smith and Charles J. Stricker. Your Honorable Body are familiar of the services which both have rendered and of the standing they occupied on the force. I must add my tribute to the memory of both of those officers. I always found them faithful, courageous and prompt to discharge their duty, and the force has suffered a loss that will not be easily replaced.

I have the honor to refer you to the report of your Secretary, John J. Hayden, which will give you a full account of the transactions and work performed by the Police force for the year 1883.

## FINANCE.

Levy for 1883, \$34,914.24; amount in fund December 31st, 1882, \$4,553.33; amount paid into fund from liquor license assessment, \$28,420.04; total to the credit of fund, \$67,887.61. Disbursements—Pay-roll Police Department from December 1st, 1882 to December 1st, 1883, amounted to \$42,013.19; pay-rolls Health Department for three months, \$1,353.72. Incidental expenses of Police and Health Departments, \$1,492.95—total disbursements, \$44,830.49. Balance to credit of fund December 31st, 1883, \$23,057.12. Police Court fines deposited in city cases, \$4,043.84, in State cases, \$2,35.49—total \$6,079.33, against \$12,883.13 in 1882. This decrease is on account of the difference in the number of arrests, the arrests in 1882 being 934 greater than those made in 1883, which speaks well for the vigilance of the police in preventing the commission of crime.

## OBITUARY

Chief of Detectives James P. Bulger died at his residence on Wilson avenue on the 27th day of August, 1883. Mr. Bulger was appointed Patrolman April 17th, 1879, and, after serving as such about one year, he was detailed as Special Detective, serving until the time of his appointment as Chief of Detectives, May 4th, 1882, which position he held at the time of his death. By the death of Detective Bulger the force lost one of its most valuable Officers and the City an exemplary citizen.

On the afternoon of the 18th of October the sad intelligence reached the Central Station that their beloved Chief, Major-General James B. Steedman, had died at his residence on Missouri street, at 3:45 P. M., after a painful illness of three weeks. General Steedman was appointed Chief on the 4th day of May, 1882, and immediately assumed charge of the force, which position he filled to the entire satisfaction of the law-abiding citizens, and through his efforts the city was rid of thieves and crooks and some of the most disreputable places in the City broken up. By his death the force lost its most valuable Officer, and the City one of its most distinguished and prominent men.

Patrolman Thomas Smith was appointed June 15th, 1881, and was considered, by his superiors, one of the most fearless and brave men on the force. After a sickness of four days, he died at his residence on Indiana avenue, on the 28th day of December, 1883. "Tom," as he was called by his associates, was one of the best natured men on the force, and his death was mourned by his brother officers.

#### PATROL WAGON SYSTEM.

About the 1st of August, the Common Council authorized your Board to purchase a Patrol Wagon and the necessary equipments and rent a barn for the accommodation of the same. In obedience to said resolution, the Committee on Discipline visited Chicago for the purpose of investigating the working of the system, as the system in Chicago is the most perfect of any now in use. After a careful examination the Committee reported that it would be the greatest improvement that could be introduced for the perfection of the Police Department. The report of the Committee was adopted, and the Committee instructed to make the necessary purchases. They rented the frame house in the rear of the Central Station for a term of five years, at an annual rental of one hundred dollars, and had it fitted up to be used as a Patrol barn, procured the wagon, horses, harness and the necessary equipments for the use of the same, and will be ready to be put in service in a few days. From the reports received from other cities where said service is in use, there is no doubt but what it will meet the approval of the citizens.



## GENERAL STATISTICS.

The total number of arrests made during the year were 3,559, against 4,493 in 1882; decrease, 934. Native born, 2,532; foreign born, 1,027. Arrests in city Cases, 2,750; State cases, 809. Disposition of cases—Bail forfeited, 90; banished, 162; bound over to Court of Common Pleas, 90; charges withdrawn, 49; delivered to foreign officers, 40; discharged, 481; dismissed for want of prosecution, 250; nolle prosequi, 107; not disposed of, 240; released on payment of costs, 371; released on payment of fines and costs, 459; sentenced to city prison, 36; sentenced to work house, 1,026; sentenced to retreat, 2; sent to house of refuge, 25; sentence suspended, 151; total, 3,559. Nativity of prisoners—Austria, 4; Belgium, 1; Bohemia, 1; Canada, 115; Denmark, 8; England, 80; France, 18; Germany, 348; Holland, 7; Ireland, 316; Italy, 7; Jerusalem, 8; Norway, 8; Poland, 43; Russia, 6; Scotland, 18; Spain, 1; Sweden, 5; Switzerland, 23; United States, 2,532. Lodgers—Male, 2,366; female, 80; white, 2,415; colored, 31; total, 2,446.
