

Project OFF Official Fencing Force

Early in 1977 the Toledo Police Division became aware of the need to do something about the ever declining amount of stolen property that was being recovered. As an example: in 1976, over \$5,500,000.00 of property was reported stolen to the Toledo Police Division. Of that amount, only \$185,000.00 worth of stolen property was recovered, a very disappointing 3.26%.

This writer heard about and contacted Lt. Robert Arscott of the Washington Metropolitan Police Department who had successfully operated Sting One and Sting Two in that city. Lt. Arscott was secretly brought into Toledo where he showed a select group of City officials and Police Officers how Sting One and Two were set up and the result of those operations. As a result of that meeting connections

were made with L.E.A.A. (Law Enforcement Assistance Administration) on the feasibility of a federal grant to operate a sting operation by the Toledo Police Division. Preliminary negotiations were begun with the F.B.I., as the Federal Grant required that a federal law enforcement agency must be a full partner in any such grant.



Members of the property recovery unit traveled to: Atlanta, Georgia...Norfolk, Virginia...Dade County, Florida...and Washington D.C. where they observed undercover operations operating successfully in those cities at that time.

In August of 1977, negotiations with the F.B.I. were completed and a federal grant application was sent to Washington D.C. The grant was approved for a period of one year, effective September 1, 1977.

One of the first things that had to be done was to select an administrative site outside of the city limits where both property recovery officers and F.B.I. agents could work together secretly and use this site to store equipment and property that was going to be recovered. A building was selected in Northwood, Ohio under the phony name of H.O.F.F. and Associates. (Hoff stood for Headquarters Official Fencing Force.) Remodeling then took place. Several offices were installed and all work was done by project personnel.

The next step consisted of obtaining 2 undercover counter men who would be the up-front people of H.O.F.F. and Assoc. group. O.F.F. could not take a chance that anyone entering the buy site would recognize any Toledo police officer or any local F.B.I. agent. 2 men were selected from the east coast to come to Toledo and become the buy men.

Next, O.F.F. started to look for a buy-site in which to operate. This took a few weeks and finally a

I.C.P.A. Disbands — I.U.P.A. Votes to Affiliate With AFL-CIO

In a surprise move the International Conference of Police Associations (I.C.P.A.) officers, staff, and a majority of the member associations voted to resign from the beleagured I.C.P.A. and formed a new national union, The International Union of Police Associations (I.U.P.A.). Immediately following the formation of the I.U.P.A. the members voted to affiliate with the AFL-CIO. A letter from AFL-CIO president George Meany was then read to the delegates stating that if the organization could show itself financially sound then an AFL-CIO charter would be extended to the organization.

Prior to the Phoenix meeting the I.C.P.A. was embattled by disputes over the AFL-CIO affiliation. In Toronto at a regular yearly meeting of the I.C.P.A. a vote to affiliate was taken and passed. The member organizations voting against the affiliation then went to the N.Y. district federal court and sought an injunction against any move by the I.C.P.A. to join the AFL-CIO.


Due to the financial status of the I.C.P.A. and the court cases pending, Big Ed Kiernan, President of the I.C.P.A. decided that the best move would be to allow those members who sought to tie up the I.C.P.A. to run the I.C.P.A. as they saw fit, so he resigned. Along with his resignation, 22 of the 26 area vice-presidents resigned as well as the entire I.C.P.A. staff.

Ed Kiernan then announced that he was forming a new police association and the delegates present then had an option, the I.C.P.A. or the I.U.P.A. who was seeking affiliation with the AFL-CIO.

Consequently, delegates representing every state present except one, accepted his invitation



building located at 1915 North 12th Street in downtown Toledo was rented and remodeling began at once. At this location O.F.F. needed to hide equipment and men and yet make it look like the new arrangements had always been there. It had to look to the criminal like there were only 1 or 2 people present when he was dealing, while in fact there were 3 or 4 people watching and listening...all armed. The name of the business was selected: S.T.A.R. which stood for Stinging Theives and Robbers.

S.T.A.R.'s cover story was that they were buying items and shipping them throughout the United States.

A total of 74 persons entered On March 9, 1978, S.T.A.R. opened its doors but only to persons wishing to sell stolen property. S.T.A.R. operated for a period of about 6 months and made over 200 buys.

S.T.A.R. during its 6 month operation. Of the 74 persons, 68 were indicted on 264 felony charges. 8 of these were federal charges. As the investigations stemming from this operation continue there will be more indictments.

A total of approximately \$1,000,000.00 worth of stolen property was bought by S.T.A.R. and consisted of everything from credit cards and semi-tractors to semis containing toilet bowls.

During the week prior to the close down date of September 16, 1978, S.T.A.R. contacted several of its key customers and informed them that S.T.A.R. needed drivers to take some stolen autos from S.T.A.R. to other cities. S.T.A.R. would pay \$150.00 plus expenses. They (the key customers) were to

report at different times on Saturday, the 16th of September,

On Saturday, just as the first group of thieves were due in, a call was received from a person who stated that he had a stolen car that he wanted to sell to S.T.A.R. He was invited in and as he got out of the car he got the shock of his life. Several uniformed Toledo police officers jumped out of bathrooms, boxes, and hidden rooms and arrested him. A short time later other former customers of S.T.A.R. arrived to drive the hot cars out of town. As one of the arrested subjects later stated, "I just don't believe it." Of the 68 indicted, 46 have been arrested and the other 22 are still running.

Even though the property recovery unit spent 80 to 90 per cent of their time on project O.F.F., they still found time to make their presence felt by investigating other fences who were in competition with S.T.A.R. The property recovery unit recovered an additional \$331,000.00 worth of stolen property from fences in the Toledo area. This property was in addition to the \$1,000,000.00 recovered by project O.F.F.

every woman can handle this. Not every man can handle this. They must also learn that almost no one will take them seriously - not their families, not the public, not even their fellow officers. They must fight every day the urge to over react in order to be accepted. Sometimes they win. Sometimes they lose. Sometimes they even quit. Others, though, will take the challenge.

The woman on today's police force does the same job her male counterpart does. She is given no quarter and wants none. She takes her turn driving, she follows through in court for herself, she even gets her share of injuries. If she has the support and acceptance of those around her, her job can be made much easier. If she lacks that support she can become the wrong kind of cop one who is bitter, defensive and hard. And that kind of attitude can spill over into her private life and make for a very unhappy human

male. But no one ever said it would be. The women that went before have made it easier for those today and so it will go until the day when it will not seem unusual to see a female in a police uniform. So the next time you come in contact with one of the "new breed" of officers, remember that they are just people working hard at their job. They don't wish to be singled out. They'll do their best for you if you give them a chance. And if you'll give them a chance, you'll gain their gratitude — and mine.
