SWEET VOICE USED AS LURE FOR SUSPECT

Cops Wait for an Alleged Counterfeiter, Who Hastens to Meet a Woman.

Probe by Secret Service Men of Flood of Bad Quarters Leads to Arrest of Brothers -Seek False Mint in Vain.

Answering what he supposed was the telephone call of a woman to meet him for a minute at Adams and Michigan streets, Lawrence Ellis, 22, 602 Ontario street, is in the hands of the government, charged with counterfeiting.

"Can I come with my working clothes on?" asked Ellis over the phone in reply to the soft, feminine voice that requested the meeting.

"Certainly, Lawrence; come any old way. It's an old friend with a great surprise in store for you," came back the voice.

Ellis hurriedly left the plumbing shop of his brother-in-law. Louis Orbitz, 1215 Jackson street. He had been at the appointed place but a minute when he was arrested by Elmer Gormon, United States secret service officer, and Detective Rock of the city force.

The woman who phoned was not in sight. Her part in the arrest was finished when she hung up the receiver.

The accused is a brother of Burt Ellis arrested at Bellevue a month ago on the charge of circulating spurious coin. Burt Ellis is now in the county jail under a bond of \$3,000, awaiting the action of the federal grand jury.

CLUE LEADS TO DESHLER

For the past ten days the govern-

ment officers, including Postoffice Inspector J. W. Perkins, Secret Service Officer Gormon, Deputy United States Marshals Owens and Brown, have been working on the case. The tip that led to the arrest of Lawrence Ellis came from Deshler, Ohio, where he was recently employed in a machine shop. A number of spurious quarters were circulated in Deshler.

All night Tuesday the federal officers, assisted by Detectives Rock, Brossia and Ten Eyck searched houses in the vicinity of Lawrence Ellis' room for a "plant" where the spurious 25 cent pieces are supposed to have been made here. Nothing of the kind was found.

Arraigned before United States Commissioner Gaines on Wednesday morning Ellis asked for postponement of his preliminary hearing. It will be held on next Tuesday morning. The prisoner was committed to the county jail in default of \$3,000 bail.
