REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT, }
TOLEDO, O., January 1st, 1887. }

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to herewith present this, my second annual report of the work performed by the Police Department of the City of Toledo, for the year ending December 31st, 1886; together with such recommendations and suggestions as in my judgment will be beneficial to the department and the city generally.

The force, at present, consists of sixty-three men, graded as follows: Captain and Acting Superintendent, 1; Lieutenant, 1; Sergeants, 4; Detectives, 3; Patrolmen, 52; Patrol Drivers, 2. One patrolman is detailed as Market Superintendent, one as Court officer, two on patrol wagon and one serving papers, leaving forty-seven for regular patrol duty, which is divided into two details, thirteen for day and thirty-four for night duty.

The arrests in State cases for the year was 702, and city cases 2,605, total 3,307; showing as compared with the previous year, a decrease of 98 arrests in State cases, and an increase of 154 in city cases. The nature as well as the number of arrests made is about the same as those of last year, except cases for keeping, residing and visiting houses of ill-fame, which show a considerable increase.

It is a source of much pleasure to me to be able to report that the

year just closed has been, throughout, a most remarkably quiet one in police matters, being singularly free from the serious burglaries and disturbances so characteristic of other large cities throughout the country.

When we consider the large extent of territory within our city limits, the number of railroads centering here, and the frequent attractions that have brought thousands of visitors to our city, it will be seen that the department, with its too limited number of officers, has performed efficient and honest work.

I would again respectfully repeat my request for an increase of the force. That this city is entitled to an increase of, at least, twenty more patrolmen under the law, no one can successfully dispute, and as the Council has failed to comply with your frequent requests in this respect (with no reasonable excuse), I would earnestly recommend that your Board immediately appoint at least ten patrolmen. I am satisfied that the law and the finances of the department will fully warrant such action.

I would further request that the Board prevail upon the Council to authorize the purchase of another patrol wagon to be stationed on Cherry street in the neighborhood of the Wheeling & Lake Erie depot, and thereby enable us to divide the city into two patrol districts, the necessity of which has been fully explained in my former reports.

The Council should no longer defer the purchase of the 30 feet of ground south and adjoining the Central Station for the erection thereon of a patrol barn for the wagon now in service; the barn used at present is daily becoming more unfit for the accommodation of the wagon and horses on account of its poor repair and inconvenient situation; another objection is the high rent paid for the use of the same. If this proposed site is secured a barn can be built, and so arranged and connected with the station as to overcome the necessity of taking prisoners to and from the wagon in full view of the often crowded market.

I beg leave to call your attention to a matter that, if not remedied, promises in the near future to be a source of great annoyance to this department and the city in general. I refer to the discharged prisoners

from the city Workhouse. The Workhouse Trustees have now contracts with some fifteen or twenty neighboring towns, and are negotiating with as many more, for the keeping of their criminals, and no provision is made for their return, when released, to their respective places from which they have been sent.

These criminals, after serving their term, which ranges from thirty days to one year, are "turned up" at the door of the workhouse a pauper, without chance of obtaining employment, and without means or friends in a strange city. What is left for them to do? Simply to beg, steal or starve. The records show that many have found their way back to the institution in a short time for petit larceny, breaches of the peace and the like. I desire to state here that the department is under many obligations to Superintendent Alfred Sawkins for his co-operation with us in disposing of the more dangerous class of criminals released from the institution he is so efficiently managing.

Due notice is given us by Superintendent Sawkins of the release of prisoners whom we know or believe to be thieves or burglars and an officer is detailed to escort the ex-prisoner a safe distance from the city. In this way the dangerous element of our city is prevented from being largely reinforced.

As a remedy for this evil I would respectfully suggest that your Board confer with the Workhouse Trustees with a view of requiring cities having contracts with said trustees to furnish their prisoners, when released, means of transportation to the city from which they have been sentenced. We will see that the plan, if adopted, shall be faithfully carried out.

I would respectfully recommend the establishment in connection with the Department, a "Rogue's Gallery." This is a matter that has been too long neglected in this city. There is no doubt, as experience in other cities have proven, that the cost of establishing and maintaining such an important auxiliary to the police force would be amply counterbalanced by the benefits derived. No police or detective department of any importance can well afford to be without this almost infallible guide to the detection of criminals.

The health of the force for the past year has been poor and particularly so during the latter part. Through illness and the time necessarily spent in the different courts of the city (and frequently officers are subpoenaed by courts of other cities) the numerical strength of the force is very much impaired. Fortunately but one death occurred in the Department during the year, that of Officer Cornelius Welsh, which occurred on the 1st day of September, after a painful illness of several months. The changes made by dismissals, resignations, etc., are given in the accompanying report of the Secretary, to which your attention is respectfully invited.

In conclusion, I desire to commend the entire Department under my command for their prompt obedience and faithful performance of duty, and to the members of your Honorable Board, my hearty thanks for your support.

FINANCE.

Following is a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Police Department for the year ending December 31st, 1886: To overcome a deficiency in the fund to meet the November pay roll the Treasurer advanced \$2,556 50; this amount with \$796.38 paid in error from the Police Fund for other Department expenses, is to be reimbursed accordingly. It will be seen from the statement given in this report that the Police Pension Fund is accumulating in a very gratifying way. Bonds of this Fund to the amount of \$1,500, with some coupons, will mature during the present year, and will, no doubt, be taken up by the city and the money re-invested by the trustees of the fund.

The estimate sent by the Police Board to the Common Council as the estimated expenses for the year was about \$66,000. This amount embraced the hiring of fifteen additional Patrolmen, a patrol wagon, horses, etc. It will be seen from the above statement that the amount available in this Fund will exceed the full estimate of expenses by about \$38,000.

I take the liberty of expressing my belief that a great need in this Department is an increase of Patrolmen. I am convinced that the force as it now stands, is performing its duty in a faithful and efficient manner, and I trust that the increase requested by Chief O'Dwyer will, in some manner be complied with.
