Annual Report of Chief of Police.

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo :

GENTLEMEN :—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1895.

Total number of arrests made during the year.....	4,394
Total number of runs made by patrol wagons	3,005
Total amount of stolen property recovered.....	\$5,300
Total number taken in charge by matrons.....	815
Total number of lodgers and tramps.....	3,875

Matters demanding the attention of this department during the past year were very numerous and on several occasions the capacity of the force was seriously tested.

I am, however, pleased to state that by diligence and much extra duty we have been successful in maintaining thus far with our limited means the public peace and safety.

On account of this limit in the force, I desire to state that much of the residence portion of the City is denied the proper police protection to which it is justly entitled, it is to be hoped that your Honorable Body, seeing this danger to property, will take such action as in your judgment may seem best.

It is evident that the levy allowed by the Common Council and Tax Commission for police purposes will not pay the salaries, etc., of the department.

There were few cases of serious illness or disability of members of the department during the year.

It would be unjust to submit this report without calling your attention to the able and efficient work of the regular and detailed detective force, also, the regular patrolmen. These men with a few exceptions have been faithful in the performance of their duty, and have to a great extent reduced the possibility of burglaries and other crimes. The matrons also have done good work in taking care of the sick people and lost children brought to the station.

Thanking you for the courtesy and kindness extended to me at all times by your Honorable Body.

The City of Toledo is divided into five police precincts, as follows. to-wit:

1st Precinct—All territory bounded by river front, Cherry and Lagrange streets and city limits, and includes the following beats: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9.

2d Precinct—All territory of East Toledo and all territory bounded by Maumee River, Monroe, Huron, Adams, Eleventh, Union and North street, Canton avenue, old canal bed and Beach street, and includes the following beats: 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 22, 23, 41, 42, 43 and 44.

3d Precinct—All territory bounded by Monroe, Erie, Madison, Eleventh, Adams, Twelfth, Wakeman, Bancroft and city limits, and includes the following beats: 10, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 29 and 45.

4th Precinct - All territory bounded by Swan Creek, Wayne street, Brown avenue, Clinton and Frazier streets, Detroit avenue, Lincoln street, Collingwood avenue, Frazier, Nettie, Washington, Ontario, Monroe and Superior streets, and includes the following beats: 26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34.

5th Precinct—All territory bounded by Superior and Mon-

roe streets, Maumee River and Swan Creek, and includes the following beats: 24, 25, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39 and 40.

Each of the above precincts is in charge of a sergeant during the night, according to assignments from headquarters.
