Dear Sir:

Following is a summary of the examination made on you on June 17, 1937.

There is a history of a gun shot wound in September 1922, with recurrent periods of pain in the right thigh and leg since the above injury. These attacks are of short duration and there is numbness in the thigh, leg and foot. There have been other injuries in the form of sprains of the ankles on one or two occasions.

Examination shows a large individual, considerably over weight with slight limp and rather restricted motion in all of the joints, giving the appearance of one considerably slowed up in ordinary activities. There is a scar in the upper third of the right thigh, apparently a through and through bullet wound, the point of entrance somewhat below the exit scar and the course of the projectile, apparently near the sciatic nerve.

The patient bears weight equally on both legs, but with some hesitancy on the right. His movements suggest insecurity of balance. Trendelenberg and patellar reflexes are present, normal and equal. There is some sensory dullness to sharp and dull in the lower right thigh and leg. Active motion in both hips, knees and feet are present and through a fairly normal range of motion.

It is my opinion that the original wound close to the sciatic nerve produced some changes which are still manifest in the form of slight atrophy, some sensory disturbance, and decreased control effort. No detailed physical examination was made. Our opinion was particularly asked for in regard to function which we think is slightly disturbed.
