



All that night and all the next day the detectives watched and waited at the Abbington Manor apartment and outside Yonnie Licavoli's house. But the gang-sters failed to appear at either of the places.

From the underworld and other sources word reached Captain Timiney that Yon-nie Licavoli himself was in New York, had been there on the night of the mur-der. That was to be expected. Whenever his men staged a killing, the gang leader would make certain to be seen in a spot far away

As Timiney's detectives tried to check back at the murder scene, they encoun-tered new difficulties. No one had seen the course of the death car. In fact, the complete ignorance of everyone ques-tioned near the crime scene suggested sharply that people were afraid to talk. Terror had dropped a curtain of absolute silence

On the second night Captain Timiney decided to invade Yonnic Licavoli's home. The house was dark when he and his detectives surrounded it; they tried all the doors and first floor windows and found them locked. At the rear end of the house was a solarium; when the doors failed to open, Captain Timiney used his penknife to pry a pane of glass from one of the windows.

Then he reached inside and unbolted a door within arm's reach.

HE opened the door and stepped on to a sun porch. As he did so, a figure ad-vanced from the darkness within the house. A voice, calm and almost pleasant inquired:

"What's the trouble?"

Here we have a true cycle of gang ter-rorism-the verbal threats, the bombings, the killings, the final taking possession and turning aside of rich profits into new pockets. It was a perfect example of the technique of "muscling in"—a vicious, integral part of the crime annals of modern American cities.

modern American ettes. In her Toledo apartment the mother of Jackie Kennedy read of the mob bombings and murders. To her terrified imagination they seemed to spell out a warning in letters of blood. Each day this Licavoli grew stronger, bolder—she im-plored Jackie to conduct his business oujedly and not arouse his energy's ansar quietly and not arouse his enemy's anger.

Jackie reassured her as best he could. He had not clashed with his gang rivals lately, but he believed this was because Yonnie Licavoli had been busy dominat-ing the numbers racket. Or perhaps it meant that the Sicilians had decided that the Kennedy interests had best be left

alone. Jackie wondered which theory was right, but he didn't let fear disturb him Hs went about his night club business with characteristic enthusiasm, promoting new entertainments, new romances. His mother might worry and his sweet-heart, Louise Bell, might carry the glint of fright in her eyes each time she went out with him. But Jackie saw their alarm as a womanish emotion not to be shared by him.

APTAIN TIMINEY couldn't solve the C Lubitsky-Blatt murders; there were too many obstacles. Not only did fear keep possible witnesses from talking, but there was the pressure of gangland's political power to prevent a real investiga-tion. The Lubitsky-Blatt killings joined tion. The Lubitsky-Blatt knings polyed the Chester Marks killing as unsolved crimes. The recollection of these stark deaths entered the community consciousness, increasing the tension of terror.

Toledo citizens felt something should be done. But what? At that time I be done. But what? At that time I myself was a private citizen practicing law. I dareeay my reactions were nor-mal and average; I was angered by the arrogance of Licavoli outlaw power, keenly conscious of my own helplessness. Yet there was value in these beginnings of public resentment, as we all learned later.

Captain Timiney's campaign did bring one success against gangland-he ruined the unlawful business of the Show Boat by constant raids and he closed its doors. He continued searching for the source of the Licavoli liquor supply, for the place where huge and valuable quantities of whisky were being manufactured for publie consumption.

Timiney and his detectives had tried to check the activities of every known member of the Licavoli mob after the Lubitsky-Blatt murders. This investigation had led them to -



On Jan. 10, 1960 this Department received a long distance telephone call purportedly from the above subject, stating that his conscience was bothering his and he wanted to clear up some past police matters.

He then related that a YOUNIE LICAVOLI did not will one Jack Kennedy in Point Place, Shio, now a part of Toledo, but that one JOS ROSCOS was the murderer. He further related that he believed ROSCOE also killed Louise Bell, in Toledo, a year before the Kennedy willing. Greybach claims to have been an eyo-witness to the Kennedy mirder and stated that he will give a signed statement concerning what he knows about these murders. He further claims that he had been a bertender at Jack Kennedy's bootlegging establishment, The Black Hawk Cafe, at the time of these marders. Subject also claims to be a prother-in-law to former Municipal Judge Nobert Baumgertner, who is currently vacationing somewhere in California.

We would appreciate your Department interviewing this subject and determining if he is of apparent sound mind, and if so, to have him give a signed atstement as to all the particulars and facts he possesses which shows that HOSCOE or sny other person than "Wop" ENGLISH whose correct neme is Sarafino Sinatra, was the assassin of Kennedy.

For your information, both marders of which URABACH speaks were attributed to the YOUNIE LACAVOLI gang which was in operation in Toledo at that time. Kennedy reportedly was a compating bestlegger who refused to pay tribute.

The following facts concerning the above mentioned murders appear in the files of the Toledo Folice Department:

Louise BELLAR.kus. Louise BANER was machine gunned while a passenger in Kennedy's car at 11:40 F.H. on Nov. 30, 1932 at the corner of Jackson " Superior Sts., just one block north of Kennedy's establishment, The Block Hawk Cafe. The assausing, three in number, wore in a car variously described as a tan Ford Hedan or a 12 Ford Tudor, maroon color, having wire wheels. The driver was described

Serrents were obtained for EFRENT JOHETH LASALLE, JOHE GROUE FAI and FEVE CONTADO, all members of the Licewolf Orng. These were later withdrawn, and on Jone 6, 1933 a warrant was obtained for LEO MOCERI, another member of the mob. He was arrested in 1952 in Los Angeles, Californis, returned to Toledo and allowed to plead guilty to Electmeil as by then no evidence was any longer available, to prove his guilt in this marder. LEO MOCERI, also known as LEOMARD MOCERI was a Frother-in-Law of Youmie Licevoli.

Jack Kennedy was later shot and killed on the night of July 7, 1933 at 9:15 to 9:30 FM while walking with a girl friend, Audrey Folls, on Edgewater Drive near 150th St., while his body guard, Kenneth Francis was visiting a house a short distance away.

WOP ENGLISE whose right name is Soratino SINATPA, was identified by two eyewitnesses as being the man who placed Hiss Polls aside and emptied a gun into Kennedy. He was convicted of 1st degree Harder, sentenced to die in the electric chair but had his sentence commuted to LIFE by a former Sovernor just before this Sovernor left Office.

JACOB "Firstop" SULKIS, snother member of the Licevoli Hob was also charged with the murder of Hennedy and given LIFE in prison. It was proved that he had borrowed the murder weapon from one Samuel Stein, a clerk in a pawn shop in the SOO block of Honroe St. that was operated by Louis Igdsloff.

YONNIE LICAVOLI was also sentenced to LIPE in prison on this marder as being the "master mind" who plotted the killing.

There were several other sen with the killer the sight KESSERY was surdered:

JOSEPH ROSCOE alias Vedo was never known to be a member of the Licevoli Geng. His file feflects an association with the old ALVIG KANPIS and HANNY CANPARLE Gangs. He served time as an accessory after the fact in connection with a bank robbery.

I trust these facts will assist you in determining whether Mr. Grabach has any real information to offer.

of friends began to include gentry of criminal tendencies, nobody really knows. Probably it came gradually through protecting night clubs and gambling joints. And then—and then came Yonni Licavoli!

Yonni had started life with Detroit's dread Purple Gang. Now he aspired to become the Al Capone of Toledo. With a formiadble gang of hoodlums at his back, Yonni came to town, offering "protection" to merchants and garage-men and cleaning establishments and milk dealers and everybody else who "needed protection"—or else! In an amazingly short time, Licavoli had very thoroughly "organized" Toledo.

And in the process he "organized" Toledo's most popular about-towner and most successful "fixer" and wire-puller — "Firetop" Sulkin!

No, "Firetop's" many friends didn't realize it at first. Then they heard rumora, and resisted them; it couldn't be possible! Yonni Licavoli's lieutenant? Not "Firetop!" Not the kid who had licked the bigger kid for swearing at a lady! It couldn't be!

But it was. Actually, "Firetop" was Licavoli's most important local contact-man. There were other important gangsters -- "Wop" English, the triggerman; Anthony Rai, "Red" Moran, Yonni's brother, James Licavoli, and so on-but "Firetop" Sulkin, he who paraded with the Old Newsboy's yearly in the annual celebration, west Licavoli's biggreat toehold in scaling and capturing the fortress of Toledo.

And then came the murders. And a strange thing happened. The jury gave the trigger-man, "Wop" English, life imprisonmen. It gave even Yonni Licavoli, the leader, life. But-"Firetop" Sulkin was condemned to death! And he was the only gangster of them all that was.

Hear County Prosecutor Frazier Reams in his closing address:

"Sulkin — the home-town boy who had access to the offices of influential citizens! Sulkin, the cancer on the body of society! He is more guilty of murder than the trigger men!"

The jury took that view. They gave him the death-sentence. He's bragged, since, that he'd never walk that last mile to the chair; and his appeal will shortly be decided. But at least a jury of his fellow-townsmen has expressed its full opinion of "Firetop" Sulkin-the one-time newsboy hero, who let his home town down!
