

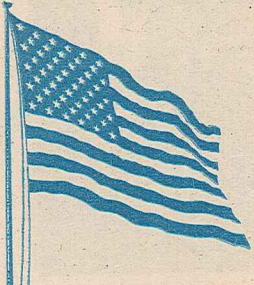

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Wallace May Announce His Candidacy In Chicago

2 Others Also Seeking A.I.P. Nomination

Local AIP sources stated recently that they are convinced Alabama's Governor George Wallace will announce his candidacy for President of the United States at a dinner in Chicago on Jan. 29. Officials said they were certain that Governor Wallace feels the time is right for the announcement, as the deadline for entering primary races is drawing near.

No Running Mate Named

When questioned as to a possible running mate, they said no one yet has been named. The AIP spokesman, who requested to remain unnamed, told Shield

reporters that several men were being considered for the vice president's post. Several Presidential Candidates

"There are at least 3 men seeking the AIP nomination for the presidential office," the Toledo official stated. "We are not a one man party as some members of the news media have tried to proclaim."

When asked if the American Independent Party was strongly behind Governor Wallace, he said that there are at least 3 candidates seeking the nomination and they were all good men who could honorably fulfill the office of president.

Given In Memory of Those Who Have Died; So Others Can Benefit

Who Has To Pay?

A woman was arrested and charged with a Morals Offense in November of 1970. Persons arrested on this charge have to be checked at the Clinic for Venereal disease. She was in custody at the City Jail 7 days. After appearing in court on this charge, she was then transferred to County Jail to serve out a 90 day sentence. At the County Jail, she complained of being ill, and she was taken to the hospital for examination. Later, a Deputy from County Jail called to inform us, that upon examination, this woman had Contagious Hepatitis, and we were told that all persons that had any contact with this individual should take a preventative shot.

After informing the proper officials, we were told to go to the Hospital and get an injection of serum to prevent our catching this disease. This included a number of Police Officers as well as Matrons.

Beng told that Workman's Compensation would pay the cost of this shot, which was \$10.40, every person that needed to have the injection did so. Twelve months later, Workman's Compensation decided they would pay the cost if we had contracted the disease, but would not pay for any preventative medica-

tion. Does this make sense? The claims were then turned over to the City. They have had these statements and information for a number of months, and the persons involved have been getting monthly statements and letters, informing them that unless these claims are paid, they would be placed in the hands of a Collection Agency. Now a few have had notices from this agency.

Now, as individuals, and subject to orders, should we be held responsible for these unpaid claims, and harrassed by a Collection Agency? WHO PAYS?



Federal Government Pays Militant Groups To Conduct Subversive Activities

\$900,000 H.E.W. Grant to Chicago's Blackstone Rangers

"Institutions within the complex make-up of the United States Federal Government support and fund organizations whose only purpose is to overthrow the very government and way of life that allows them to exist." This statement was made to The Shield in November by Gerald W. Kirk, a former under cover operative of the FBI.

Mr. Kirk, a 23-year-old black man, in the mid-60's was asked by the FBI to infiltrate and report on subversive and revolutionary activities while he was a student at the University of Chicago. After a few months, he joined the S.D.S., DuBois Club, and finally the Communist Party.

After intensive training by the Communists, he became a liaison man for the party among all their front groups in the Chicago area. He operated among the "peace" groups, the student groups, and the black militants. After nearly four years of under cover work, Mr. Kirk testified before the House Internal Security Committee in Washington. Now that he is free to speak out, Mr. Kirk is making a nation wide speaking tour to enlighten and warn the American people of the tremendous subversion taking place in the Communist led war against the American way of life.

During his undercover assignment, Mr. Kirk worked with groups promoting Dr. Spock he was an organizer of programs for Stokely Carmichael he worked to arrange War on Poverty grants for black militant groups to build their arsenals. Of course the basic tar-

gets of these groups are the police. Their attacks are physical as well as political. The physical attacks on police by the street revolutionaries is only one phase of the master plan to destroy police. When confrontations between minority groups and police can be agitated, it provides the political wing with the material for the propaganda so necessary for their attack.

The political attack is quite familiar to anyone who even casually reads the daily newspapers or catches an evening newscast on television. The time worn phrases of "police brutality," "inadequately trained officers," "psychologically unfit," and so-on through the thousands of sayings coined by the radical groups are cleverly utilized to broaden the gap between the officer on the street and the public he has dedicated his life to serve. The left wingers will hammer away on the theme of forming a national police force as the only solution to the ills of our form of local independant police agencies.

The whole scheme is very much like the neurosurgeon who carries a blackjack as well as his little black bag, stalking the shadows and hitting people on the head. The victim wakes up in the hospital and ends up paying the doctor \$3,000 for his services. The parallel drawn here is simply, the revolutionaries create a problem then run to the government begging for money to solve it.

This very tactic was used by the black militants in the Chicago area to obtain money from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The plan was to contact the president and vice president of the University of Chicago, Edward H. Lee and Charles U. Daily as they offered their influence to assist these people in their

deadly game. Mr. Kirk was asked by the Blackstone Rangers' representatives, Freddie Tyrone and Peanuts Williams, to accompany them to the university and act as translator. Mr. Kirk explained the language spoken by the street gangs is a very different brand of English than that spoken by a college president. The Rangers knew this and felt that he would be better able to communicate with these men and obtain their objective. In this case the objective was \$900,000.

It was very interesting to note here that President Lee thought the politicians would have to show what would happen if the "poor people" were refused their plea for this money. The Rangers, being very sharp intellectually, went right out and started a riot specializing in killing 8, 9, and 10-year-old black children, then blaming the police, the system, and anyone else they thought would further their cause.

As in any war, both sides lose some members. In order to replace fallen members the Rangers would scare the prospect by telling him stories about the police, saying they were brutal, hated black people, and they were involved in a national conspiracy to kill blacks. This was followed with careful explanations on how their organization was fighting this oppression and would be there to stand behind him if he should ever fall victim to the police.

The scheme worked. The money was paid and the weapons purchased. So on with the war.

To enable the Communists to continue their gains, they must never stop grinding out racist propaganda. It is very important the white American believes that when Elridge Cleaver or one of the other so-called black leaders speak, 25,000,000 black people put a brass ring through their noses, bow to the east, jump up and spin around three times. This psychology has worked very well in Northern Ireland — having everyone believing their issue is a Religious Civil War. In our country we have the continuous pressure for the beginning of a racial civil war.

This interview has barely touched on the high points of Mr. Kirk's speech delivered at the Franklin Park Mall in late November. It is hoped you will become concerned enough to find more information on this very real and serious problem which exists in our nation. It is not anything like a cold which will go away in time. It is go-

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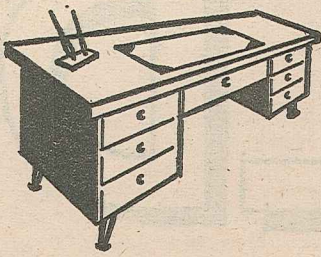

Who Cares Who Pays For It?

The tragic accident last month is still fresh in everyone's mind. Five young people died at the Penn Central and Wenz Road crossing because the bureaucrats can't make up their mind who is going to pay for adequate warning devices at one of the state's most dangerous crossings.

Before the accident a survey was made of the rail road crossings in Ohio to determine their accident potential. As usual the results were filed away in some desk drawer and all but forgotten.

Several years after the survey, tragedy struck. Someone in an obscure office some place remembered that once upon a time a survey was taken. After a little searching the results were found and made public. Someone got nervous and meetings were called, the problem discussed, and again no action. The Shield has but one question to ask. "WHO CARES WHO PAYS FOR IT?" Tax dollars are tax dollars. It matters not if they are federal, state, or local. The money is being paid in by the citizens of this country and what are they getting in return? The President of the United States is planning a trip to nations which are sworn enemies of this country. Back home five youngsters die because there is no money to properly mark a hazard.

Tax dollars are paid to the state to operate the state's business. What do we get in return? Our schools are closed down, the legislators vote themselves a raise. In Toledo five young lives are snuffed out in a split second because the state doesn't have the money to install flashers at a death trap.

Local government take a chunk of our pay check every payday. What value received? Talk about a convention complex which major convention personnel are asked not to use. In our own back yard there are five fresh graves because there is no money to save lives.

The rail companies claim they are broke but we still see firemen riding engines as a safety factor. Five children are in the frozen ground because the rail road can't afford to put up gates which would prevent slaughters such as this. That fireman was a real safety factor, wasn't he?

If each fireman is paid \$10,000 per year then the elimination of only three would provide the \$30,000 needed to install the warning devices. Are the lives of those five young Americans not worth many million times that amount?

Mr. Politician, Mr. Business Executive when are you going to get your priorities in order? Is the President's trip going to prevent another such accident? Are the pay raises in Columbus going to save any lives? Is an unused convention complex going to eliminate these hazards? Think about it Mr. Politician and Mr. Businessman, that is if you can get your mind out of your own wallet long enough.

The families of these children couldn't have cared less who paid for the crossing signals just as no other citizen of this city cares where the money comes from. We are paying our taxes for our protection and the protection of our loved ones. Let someone somewhere get on the ball and start catching up on some past due bills. Overpass fences, rail crossing signal, and the hundred and one other items we have been short changed on for so many years. We don't care where the money comes from or who signs the check. Just get the job done and NOW.

With great energy, the T.P.P.A. leadership teamed together to move forward - unified in the common bond of attaining status and benefits for all our members.

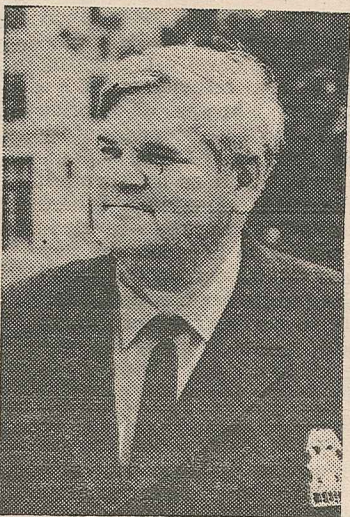

How About Some Help?

On July 1, 1969 Fifty Seven men were added to the ranks of the Toledo Police Department raising the total personnel to 761 men. This increase brought the department in line with what the F.B.I. figures is the correct ratio of policemen to the population they protect. Since that day not one new officer has been added to the department while approximately 70 men have left the department for various reasons. In this same period of time, the population of the city has grown.

These two events have placed a fantastic burden on the officers who now must do the work of a full complement of men. During this period of time Chief Duck has been forced to curtail certain areas of the department to make up the manpower shortage. The Traffic Bureau is now closed between 10:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m., one accident car per shift has been taken off the streets, and the jeep patrol between 8:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. has been reduced.

Now I realize that more units have been added to street coverage between the prime crime hours of 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. but this has been done at the expense of taking men away from other areas of protection.

In case you readers feel adequately protected at all hours of the day, you are not. The criminals have changed their methods of operation to fit the police department's new schedules of added manpower. You may have read in The Blade where serious crime is down during the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m., and this is true. The only sad part of this statement is that it has increased up between the hours of 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. With the shortage of men it is impossible to control crime at all hours of the day. Even with an additional 70 men, it would be hard to fight crime with some of the equipment we must use.

The new idea being considered now in order to increase the manpower problem, the administration is thinking of going to one — man crews in some areas. Along with this possibility the City Administration has hired female workers to free more men for the street from the Record Bureau and dispatcher's office.

After talking to several officers who have seen these women working, they shouldn't continue over six months because of the poor quality of work that is being done. One of the ladies in the dispatcher's office fell asleep at 7:30 a.m. and after being awoken by an officer in charge, quickly fell asleep after his departure. One woman received a call for extension 212, she asked the police office monitoring her if she should plug him into the extension. I sincerely hope that if you call the police and one of these telephone wizards answers your call, please don't be too excited because you have just been robbed, raped, or some other misfortune has happened, because the police will come sooner or later if the call ever reaches the radio room.

Then there is the woman in the detective bureau who's job it is to type up the detective's report on crime. Most of her typed reports have been returned to the detective to re-type because of the number of mistakes she has made. We cannot say that all the ladies the city has hired are like this but the ones that are not producing a higher quality of work should be told to improve or leave. The only problem with this is the city never fires someone whose salary is coming from elsewhere.

Now the administration has become worried about the fact that the A.I.P. might hold their convention here next summer. It's hard to believe the city is worried about the fact trouble will erupt here when they come to town.

It is possible that the administration has awoken to the fact that the department is under strength, the equipment is old and in some cases obsolete, and the communication system belongs in the 1940's. Or is it possible that the administration is worried that it will have to spend some money to improve the Police Department's efficiency to protect the citizens of this city?

Judicial Consistency or Political Favoritism

On Aug. 14, 1971, at 2:30 a.m. a familiar sound crackled over the Police frequency. Unit X at 2212 Glenwood Apt. 2 a man breaking in. The officers working the unit responded to the call in their usual professional manner and shortly apprehended the culprit, in the female's apartment.

Upon the unit's arrival at the scene they were met by the female complainant who stated, "The man broke into my apartment is now in my bedroom." The officers then went to the bedroom and found Mr. Emerson Cole of 1519 Oakwood lying on her bed with his back to them. "We then approached the subject and observed a large bulge under his suit coat. Upon checking the bulge we found a 38 caliber revolver Colt Serial No. 701117, loaded with six rounds of 38 caliber ammunition. Upon further search a large case knife with a four inch blade was found in his right hand front pocket," said the arresting officers. Subject was sleeping at the time first observed and was awakened by the officers during the search. Mr. Cole stated he entered the apartment with a key but a check found that he didn't have a key that would unlock the door. Ann Schmidt, the occupant of the apartment, stated that she had known the subject for some time but was trying to break off the relationship. She stated the subject had threatened her on Aug. 2, 1971, he had never had a key to her apartment and the screen in her bedroom was not ripped previous to his entry.

As the story goes, Mr. Cole, who is the Director of the Ohio Civil Rights Commission, was arrested for Breaking and Entering, and Carrying a Concealed Weapon. Almost six months after the arrest he was finally brought to a preliminary hearing. Seems as though the complainant who originally placed the call for a Burglary in Progress was in fact a female acquaintance of Mr. Cole and now refuses to press charges for Breaking and Entering. Then to add insult to injury our hand picked Judge Gabriel renders a nifty decision that since the Officers searched Mr. Cole while he slept and before the arrest for B&E the search was illegal and therefore the evidence pertaining to Carrying

a Concealed Weapon capable of inflicting fatal injury would not be allowed in his court of law?

We appeal this case to you, Mr. and Mrs. Toledo. You might say a case like this was a miscarriage of justice, but quite honestly appears more on the order of an abortion. What would have happened if one of you had been arrested for toteing a gun? Is this the type of Judge you want protecting your city? Is Mr. Cole any less guilty of Carrying a Concealed Weapon capable of taking a life, just because the officers didn't wake him to be searched?

Is it not fairly obvious that the Old Familiar Fix was on? Is it any wonder crime runs rampant on the streets of Toledo? Even when a potential killer is brought to trial he is turned free by the court, not to mention the 6 months it took just to get him to a preliminary hearing.

You, Mr. and Mrs. Toledo, The Silent Majority, had better wake up. It is your fault Cole went free. You're the people who elect who sits on the bench. Hasn't the Constitution reversed itself? It was originally supposed to protect the innocent, NOT THE GUILTY.

Since this type of atrocity is conveniently overlooked by our local daily (The Blade), in the future The Shield will endeavor to make recommendations to the citizens of our city as to the qualifications of those who aspire to the office of sitting in judgment of others.

In next month's issue of The Shield we shall reprint the text of a U.S. Supreme Court decision which clearly states that a policeman may legally frisk a suspect without arresting him if the policeman's suspicions are aroused by his past experience and the unusual actions of said suspect. This may help some officer in a future similar situation and will show our local Judge Gabriel what the Supreme Court thinks of his feeble decision.

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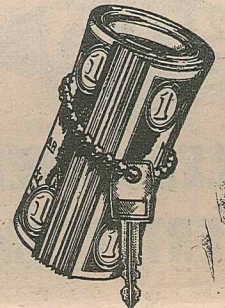
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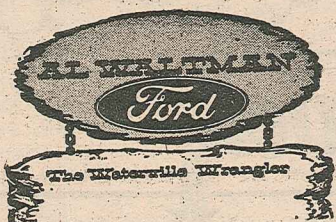


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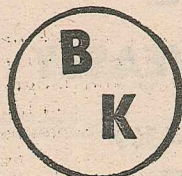
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The Womanly Art Of Self-Defense

Over the past years, I have been called upon to talk to numerous women's groups on the subject of self-defense. It is a much needed art and one on which information is very limited. There is no doubt that we all need to know how to protect ourselves from vicious hoodlums and thugs who are preying on innocent citizens. This is not limited to women—many men are finding themselves at the mercy of these attackers and muggers. I find that a great deal of the victims are elderly persons who may be less able to defend themselves against such attacks. Not only are these persons robbed, but are brutally beaten and often maimed in the process.

What I am about to impart to you is not meant to scare the public but, in fact, make you aware of what is happening and how to protect yourselves from an unpleasant situation. I will try to cover all facets of the problem in this and upcoming issues of The Shield.

Many of our citizens are experiencing attacks in their own homes. What we fail to realize is that the culprit will use any means to gain entry into your home and many will seem legitimate. I recall one outstanding example of this when we began to get reports of women who had been sexually at-

tacked in their own homes. After gathering all of our facts during the investigation, we found a similarity in each case when it was learned that all victims had placed an ad in the local paper advertising furniture for sale. They all recalled talking with a male who had inquired about a couch and made an appointment to come to the home and view the merchandise advertised. When he found the woman home alone, he would attack them at knife point.

It became my job to phone all of the persons having ads in the paper and advise them of the situation and request they call and report any such calls. The man was eventually apprehended but it brought up a point about your safety in your own home.

Never allow a stranger into your home. If you have items for sale, make sure you are not alone when showing them.

Many times you are confronted with the person who comes to your door seeking help or to use your phone. Never let this person into your home. If you feel compelled to help, call the police, and they

can give any help needed, or make the phone call for him.

I can't stress this strongly enough . . . DO NOT LET A STRANGER INTO YOUR HOME.

If you suspect a thief in your home, never interrupt him. He is what is known as a "Sneak Thief" and will become dangerous when they feel they are about to be caught. Dial the Operator and give her your address and tell them what you suspect. Never turn on a light and it is recommended you have a phone at your bedside.

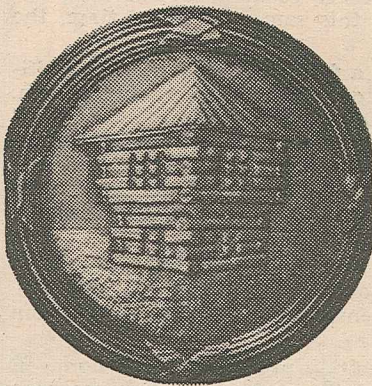
Below are listed some rules to follow to prevent some problems.

- ▶ Keep your doors and windows locked - even windows on upper levels.
- ▶ Basement windows should be strongly secured.
- ▶ If you have moved recently, have locks changed and strong, sturdy locks installed. Safety chains should be installed on doors and kept latched when answering your door.
- ▶ If you live in an apartment where the outer doors are kept locked and released by a buzzer device — use your intercom system and know who you're allowing into the building. This was installed for your protection - use it.
- ▶ Have a flood light installed and keep the grounds lighted at night.
- ▶ Install a remote control system on your garage door and keep the garage well lighted at night.
- ▶ Never hide a house key around the outside of your home. No matter how cleverly hidden you feel this key is - a thief can find it. He knows this and many other hiding places you wouldn't dream of.

Some of this may seem hard-hearted to you but keep in mind, you are protecting yourself. If you can't be safe in your own home where can you be safe?

The Badges And Shields Of The Toledo Police

The Ft. Industry Hat Badge

On July 1, 1909, new hat badges were issued to the department as pictured here. This was the first type of hat badge distinctive to Toledo as it carried a reproduction of Ft. Industry. As the shield issued with them, the hat badges were made in Philadelphia of bronze and heavily nickle plated. The color of those used by the officers is not known but possibly they were gold plated in following with tradition. Patrolmen used this type of hat badge until about December 1925. Sergeants and officers received new hat badges in late 1910.

City Jail Worse Than County Jail

Some of our "wonderful" Municipal Court Judges have decided the city jail is in worse shape than the county jail and that if the county cannot accept women prisoners from the city they will be released after serving several days of their sentence.

It seems that this inspiring statement was prompted by a meeting of the Municipal Judges who were worried about how Judge Young's ruling on the situation at the county jail would affect prisoners held for long term confinement in the city jail. After the Municipal Judges heard of Mr. Miller's intention, they finally decided to do something about the conditions within our city jail. Most observers believed that maybe the judges should be able to order the City Fathers to make a few needed improvements. 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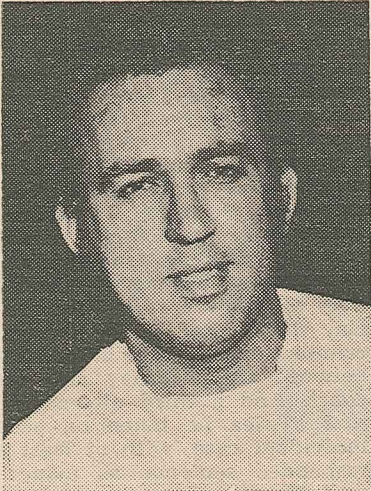

Society And Drugs

Can The Addict Be Helped?

In the past months we have looked into the plight of the addict and all the adverse conditions that are associated with drug addiction. Can anything be done for the individual who has become physically and psychologically dependent on a drug? There are many avenues of approach to helping the addict. Some of these we have gone into in detail, others we have passed over. We have revealed the halfway house type, such as the Family Tree, the individual help given by private physicians, the help given by state institutions, and the help the individual can receive through chemical therapy.

One of the drugs used in the modern day care of drug addicts is methadone. Many of us may think that methadone is a new drug and is the answer to helping the drug addict avoid drugs such as heroin, morphine, and other addictive substances. Mainly methadone is used as a substitute for heroin. The drug itself is not a new drug and has been on the market for many years. The drug was first synthesized by the Germans during World War II. After the war the United States seized the drug and made it available to the pharmaceutical industries here in the United States. It was then, and is also presently, marketed under the trade name of dolophine hydrochloride. Methadone was never really a big item in the drug industries and was never vastly used as part of the physician's armamentarium.

When you look at the drug, it's basically a white crystalline powder and dissolves easily in water. It has an effect similar to that of morphine but has one advantage in that its effect is longer lasting.

In the early 1960's through the work of some physicians in New York, it was found that methadone could be satisfactory substituted for heroin in the hard core addict. This drug became more popular until present day, it is being used widely throughout the United States in clinics specifically run for the hard core addict. This in reality may seem to be the answer to switching the hard core addict from heroin to a substitute drug which does not have the adverse physical effects of heroin. Yet is this the answer? Many think not.

We know from past experience that the heroin addict is not quite similar to the alcoholic. We may say that if switching the heroin addict to methadone is like trying to switch the alcoholic from gin to vodka. Basically those who are against methadone are saying this is the case. You can't substitute one for another that has the same effect and expect the individual to lead a productive life. Whereas in the case of methadone as opposed to alcohol, methadone doesn't have the adverse physical effects and psychological effects as mentioned before and it doesn't produce the deterioration sociologically and psychologically in the individual. It avoids the criminal contact that the addict must expose himself to in order to obtain his illicit drug. This in itself enables him to rejoin the human race.

Another question brought up by those who are opposed to methadone is that the individual is still an addict whereas this is true. The individual is still an addict, it's just that he has switched his addiction from heroin to methadone. It is still necessary to have a withdrawal period of several weeks (about 3 to 4) in order to get off the methadone. A daily dose is also required and it's true it does act as a crutch but far and above the crutch of heroin, methadone is legal. It is readily obtainable at no cost to the addict. Also if we keep in mind that the methadone clinics are being run for those individuals

who have been on heroin for a long time and who have no avenue to begin escaping the addiction other than methadone.

It is not for the individual who is a once in a while heroin experimenter doing it for kicks. This is not the indication for methadone therapy. We must keep in mind it is only for the individual who is a long term hard core addict. This is not the only help they get. In addition to their daily methadone, they receive counseling in avenues of approach for employment, religious counseling, medical care, and above all in addition to all these material needs and emotional needs that are being satisfied by the addict, it is giving the individual a chance whereas before they had none at all.

Another argument put up by clinics is that they say that the addict will come and get the methadone and still shoot the heroin anyway. This is all the more reason why it is necessary to have state, local, and federal guidelines to manipulate and stipulate who will run and who will receive the methadone. There are some people also who feel that methadone, given in large enough doses will block the effect of heroin. An individual who is taking methadone and at the same time is shooting heroin into his vein will have a zero effect from the heroin. Whether this is in fact a true case is yet to be seen, but there are those who have experience in this manner and are readily using it in this way.

Then you would say, what is the cost of running a methadone clinic? In terms of cost we may figure that it runs approximately \$10.00 a year to buy the methadone needed to keep an addict away from heroin. The cost of the methadone is not the problem as far as expense is concerned. The great expense comes in running and developing the program. Approximately \$1,000 per year per addict is needed to keep a program running at this stage of the game. Most of this expense according to current literature now indicates that the cost of running and developing a program is because of the excessive and unrealistic guidelines set up by the federal government. These guidelines set many criteria which are costly and are not practical for the average practicing physician. Lab tests are necessary to run which may or may not be necessary. Documents are necessary to be obtained which only delay the beginning of the therapy for the addict and evidence of current abuse must be documented, also which many times is impossible.

What then, in terms of the cost of the addict, if he were to stay on heroin? The cost to the average addict in the United States is approximately \$100 daily, which means the addict must steal approximately \$400 from the community. If you figure this \$400 times 365 days a year, this comes to \$146,000. It doesn't take much of a mathematician to realize that \$1,000

versus \$146,000 is a small price to pay for maintaining a methadone program.

We may say that methadone is not the answer in the therapy of heroin addiction, but it is something for the addict who is standing in quick sand to hang onto. This is some ray of hope for him that he may yet return to society as a normally functioning individual. This is the chance he may need to begin a new life. Then when something better comes along in terms of therapy, the individual may then be taken off of methadone and started on a newer and better program. Some say that you may have withdrawal with methadone. Yes, this is true; we know that it takes time to withdraw from methadone. But as opposed to heroin, you do not have the excruciating pain on withdrawal that you find with the morphine type alkaloids of which heroin is one.

The object of sending a man to prison is punishment. If conditions are so unbearable, would one think a man would not take a second chance of being returned?

Of course we need reforms. The present facilities are overcrowded and understaffed, but if the United Prisoners Union ever becomes a power behind the prison walls, there can only be more Atticas. Changes in our system must not be dictated by law breakers.

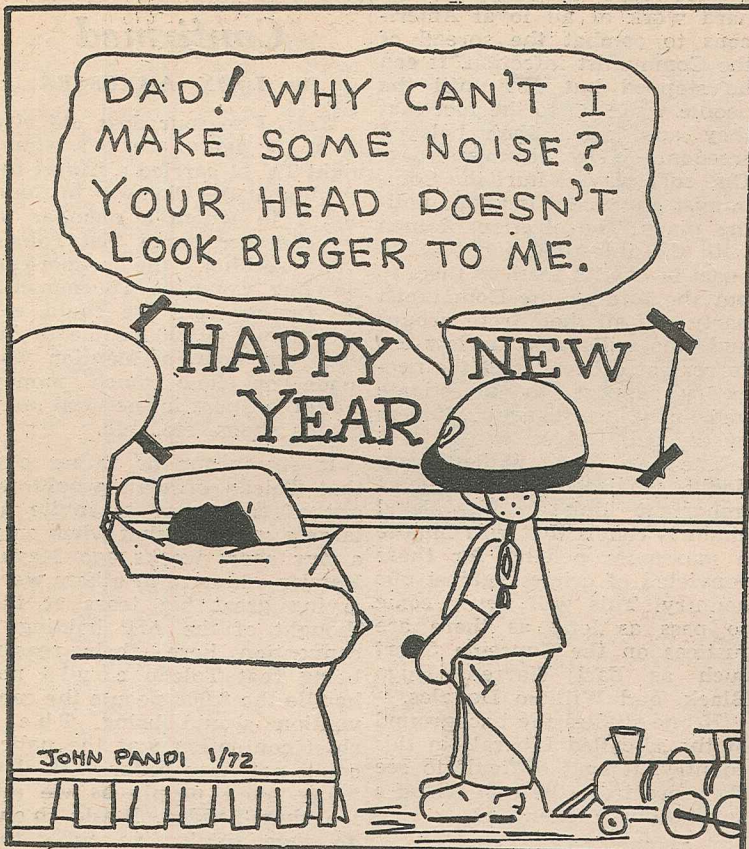

Don't Just Spin Your Wheels; Get The Facts, Then Do Something

This is one way to know your leaders, hear the action and experience the every day problems these fine people are faced with.

It's not an easy job to run a business that's over 50 million dollars a year. Sometimes it takes guts and courage to face

He's A Good Boy Your Honor, He Just Panicked

"Your Honor, my client is a good boy — comes from a fine family. He's never been in any kind of trouble before, other than a few little incidents when he was juvenile. But in the last six months, he's really been trying! And as for the present incident, well, Your Honor, it's just a clear case of panic. Under normal circumstances, Junior would never have pulled such a stunt. If those officers wouldn't have continued to chase him, he would certainly never have had to violate all of those other 16 traffic regulations."

And thus Junior is given the minimum sentence for a DWI charge. And the other 16 citations? "Off docket - included offense." Thus, a typical finding in a "chase case" in TMC.

At first glance, the attorney's argument might seem logical. A young boy (or older one-) realizes he has been drinking, sees the flashing red light behind him, and the chase is on. Granted, his panic reaction is understandable, but far from excusable! When the defendant and his attorney humbly approach the bench, admit their guilt "with a firm purpose of amendment," the true nature of the incident and the circumstances surrounding it are buried beneath the rationalizations of the defense. The fact that a defendant, in one particular incident, almost ran down a small child and his mother is never brought to light. Or the fact that another chase driver drove an elderly woman off the road, causing considerable damage to her car, was likewise suppressed.

Because the attorneys in these cases realize the advantage of preventing the testimony of the officer, they are rarely brought to trial. Thus, the court is presented with only one side of the case. It seems that in cases such as these, there should be some effort made to get both sides of the story. Besides just Junior's traumatic psychological experience emphasis should be placed on the physical danger within which he placed the citizens, and particularly, the officers. Is the defendant, his attorney, and the court really aware of the possible results of a high speed chase at the time of sentencing?

When an officer is shot and murdered, the entire community is enraged. But let an officer be killed or seriously disabled as a result of a senseless chase, and it is written off as an "accident" by the public.

Possibly the worse result of the chase verdicts is the "What do you have to lose" attitude, it encourages.

When a driver is cited for eluding police, resisting arrest, and numerous related incidents, only to have most of them written off docket, and fined on one or two of the initial incidents, it seems that the individual has nothing to lose by fleeing from the police, and

just about everything to gain if he succeeds.

Three alternatives are available as a remedy to the above. First, and most obvious, is a sentencing on each and every chase. If a defendant is pleading guilty, it should not be the result of a bargaining between his attorney and the court. A plea should be demanded on each case. Secondly, the officer should be consulted before any one charge is written off docket. Again, such a negation of the duty of a law enforcement official should not be at the discrimination of the bargaining between the attorney and the court. And a third alternative, that a plea be taken on each individual case, with at least a suspended sentence as mandatory. This would serve two purposes. First, it would somewhat deter further incidents, not just on the part of the defendant, but by other citizens as well, with the defendant serving as an example. Secondly, again, it would force the defendant to either admit his guilt or have a hearing and air all the events surrounding the case. Unlike the first alternative, the defendant would not have any physical punishment, but nonetheless, a finding on each case, whether guilty or not guilty, demonstrating that the officer was acting within the proper scope of his duty when issuing the citations, and that such action, whether in panic or not, is not acceptable or excusable, and will not be tolerated.

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MIAMI BEACH FLORIDA CONVENTION

The Winter Board Meeting of the International Conference of Police Associations was held December 2nd thru 7th, 1971, at The Playboy Plaza Hotel, Miami Beach, Florida. Attending this winter board meeting were over fifty (50) delegates from almost every state in the Union, and also from Canada. These delegates represent over 150,000 Law Enforcement Officers.

This is a brief summary of the meeting and at our next regular meeting of the TPPA there will be a complete detailed report available for reading by all members.

The meeting opened with the pledge of allegiance to both flags of our countries (Canadian and American). The next order of business was to report the figures for income and current cash on hand. This report contained statements that our present income was \$17,822.24, plus \$10,260.27 from the Law Officer Account, and presently the cash on hand in banks is \$114,625.23.

Next was the resignation of our Executive Director and President Royce Givens and Carl Parcel, respectively. The new Executive Director is Robert Gorden from New York. It was recommended by the Vice Presidents and voted and passed by the board that the remainder of the term of president vacated by Carl Parcel should be filled by the immediate past president, Richard Feider of the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association.

It was also recommended that the ICPA change its name to the International Union of Police Associations. This will be voted on at the summer meeting.

Also we are attempting to obtain a federal grant in order that an organization for police officers can be set up nationwide in various sectors of the United States so as to advise all Police Officers on all situations developing in the entire USA.

The Law Enforcement Officers Bill of Rights was reviewed and channelled for proper consideration of Congress. Also a proposed Defense Fund is being developed where as any member of the ICPA may belong on a voluntary basis and would receive assistance from the ICPA defense fund if the situation at hand might conceivably affect other police officers in the ICPA.

We of the TPPA are starting a State Association and expect it to contain over 10,000 members once established. One regulation in belonging to the State Association is membership in the ICPA. The recommended guide lines and policy for membership into the ICPA are as follows:

ICPA Bylaws ARTICLE III

Recommended Guide Lines and Policy for Membership Applications Section I

A. It shall be the policy of the ICPA to accept application for membership from any independent association composed of active or retired police officers providing said independent organizations otherwise qualify.

1. For the sake of interpretation a "Police Officer" shall be defined as: A sworn officer, employed in a full time position with the responsibility commensurate to the position, and including: the power of arrest, twenty-four hours a day, covered by a retirement system, and shall be subject to the discretion of the area Vice President.

Section III
A. Applications for membership must be submitted to the Executive Director. The Executive Director shall then notify the membership committee of the application and submit it accompanied by the area Vice President's recommendations. **Section IV (A), (B), (C), (D):**

Application fees may be accepted by the Executive Director and must be held before deposit subject to the approval of the application by the membership committee as required by Section III.

ARTICLE III SECTION I

Add— Where a member association presently represents the members of a department no other application shall be accepted from that department unless it has been approved by such member association.

Also at the winter meeting there were three resolutions passed which carry strong influence on the Congress of the United States. They are as follows:

RESOLUTION I

Co-Chairman Everett Cooper Resolution Committee

WHEREAS, Senator Taft has gone on record as attempting to get the first \$2400.00 per year wages of a police officer tax exempt, but was defeated by 50 to 46 votes,

Let it hereby be resolved, that a letter of appreciation be sent to Senator Taft and the other 45 Senators of whom voted in our favor.

RESOLUTION II

WHEREAS, Senator Sam J. Ervin, Jr., and Representative Edward I. Koch from 17th District, New York, have gone on record as being opposed to the use of the polygraph examination for government and municipal employees.

Let it hereby be resolved, that the International Conference of Police Associations address a letter of appreciation and support to Senator Ervin and Representative Koch for their valid efforts.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS each year the police function becomes more complex and varied, and demands ever higher levels of skill, training, and judgment and

WHEREAS, the many turbulent social forces at work today require a continuing high level of police performance in every community, in order to provide the quality of service to which every citizen is entitled and

WHEREAS, the merit system of appointment under con-

ditions of equal competition has long been accepted by enlightened administrators as the most satisfactory way to staff the civil services and

WHEREAS, the Federal Model Cities Program specifically provides for the appointment of police officers who have not qualified under the regular procedures of their respective Departments

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE OF POLICE ASSOCIATIONS, in convention assembled at Kansas City, Missouri, this 15th day of October, 1971, that the Federal Model Cities Program, as well as all other experiments and projects that provide for the selective reduction of police standards among any class of applicant whatsoever, be condemned as threatening to diminish the quality and integrity of law enforcement, and therefore as being contrary to the interest of all citizens.

Basically this is a general run down on the winter board meeting, but as previously stated a detailed report is available at our next regular meeting of the TPPA.

Since my election as Vice President of the ICPA it has been amazing to discover the police service, stimulated by mutual cooperation between over 150,000 law enforcement officers. It certainly doesn't require a prophet to realize the potential that this great association has. Within the next two years the ICPA will provide objectives that would be impossible for one association to acquire regardless of its growth and accomplishments. Only through a united effort of all law enforcement officers can one obtain such a goal. We of the TPPA have this vast opportunity simply by being members of such a mother association as the ICPA. Our Motto is self-explanatory: "UNO VOCE."

Don't Open That Door

A summer blight apparently has struck in December. The blight referred to is the high pressure salesmen who seem to take particular delight in victimizing elderly persons and housewives home alone.

In mid December the Shield was informed of the boiler-room operators working the west side of Toledo. Their usual method of operation is to call at a home during the evening hours and once their knock is answered they force their way into a home and then begin a sales pitch for some magazine.

The hawking consists of thinly veiled threats and outright intimidation with the result being a purchase just to get the person out of the house.

The purchase is then followed with a call to the police. In most cases by the time the contracts are signed and the checks issued little can be done to get your money back. The best and only sure cure for this disease is not to catch it in the first place.

Green River Ordinance

A police crew responds to the call of a very frightened lady who has just been victimized by one or more (usually two) of the "salesmen." She explains the situation to the officers and they try to reassure her everything possible will be done to get her check or cash back. Armed with a physical description and the direction the subjects were last seen traveling, the hunt begins.

If the crew is lucky the subjects will be found nearby. A plan of action is discussed and a plan of action decided upon. The subjects are approached and asked who they are and what they are doing in the area. A well rehearsed explanation is recited. The officers then ask for the salesman's permit. At this point the subject very smugly presents all kinds of letters and copies of Supreme Court decisions which very clearly state the Green River Ordinance has been declared unconstitutional and that no action can be taken against them as they have a right to solicit business in whatever manner they choose. The officers then try to run a bluff with them and tell the subjects that a citizen has filed a complaint against them for forceably entering her home. The subjects arrogantly reply, "Let her, it's her word against ours." (This is one reason for two persons coming to the door.)

Now, the handcuffs are firmly in place, on the police. There is nothing more that can be done for the moment. The only hope is that the subjects will run into someone who isn't easily frightened and they will cause enough of a ruckus and in view of a police crew so that an arrest for disturbance can be made or that they stay in the neighborhood late enough

into the night that the courts will sustain a disturbance or nuisance charge due to the late hour.

Helpful Advice

The next question asked of a policeman is "What can be done to stop these people?"

First and foremost, DON'T OPEN THE DOOR. They may have all kinds of rights to solicit but you are under no obligation to buy or to even talk to anyone you don't want to. When a stranger knocks on your door at night or anytime for that matter, find out his business through a chained door or hooked screen. Then very plainly tell him you aren't interested. If the subject persists, then get just as rude as he is and ORDER HIM FROM YOUR PROPERTY. If he refuses to leave, you now have a case for trespassing. Tell him that unless he leaves immediately the police will be summoned and that you will prosecute. THEN DO IT.

All I have said up until now has been directed to a woman home alone. If there is a man in the house or a big teen-aged boy, call him to the door. The sight of a forceful man will in most cases cut short any planned "funny business".

Another sure fire sales stopper is a good sized dog. A Collie, German Shepherd, Doberman, etc., will quickly change the minds of the most persistent salesman, especially if the dog will put on a little act of baring the teeth and a good healthy growl.

If these methods seem somewhat drastic, they are. Remember, these parasites are dangerous and understand only the strongest language. The same can be said for the collectors of some so-called charitable organizations. Many of these will identify themselves as members of church groups soliciting money for a building fund or scholarship funds. In reality the money is going no further than the pockets of the solicitor or into funds which are supporting subversive and treasonable groups.

A good policy to follow when contributing to charity is give only to those which are established and have organized drives which have been broadly advertised. If in doubt DON'T GIVE. CHECK THEM OUT.

Remember, you have worked hard for your money. It is yours to determine how it will be spent. Don't allow some high pressure salesman take it from you. Keep these pointers in mind . . . they work.

Suburban News - Maumee If A Woman Answers . . .

The latest line around the City of Toledo seems to be, "If you call the police and a woman answers don't hang up". This has been true around Maumee for many years. All of the dispatching in Maumee is done by women and they have quite a job. At present there are three full time dispatchers and four part time. They could very well fall into the classification of the unsung heroes of the department. Most people would say that it isn't a bad job to just sit there and talk on the phone and radio once in a while. If this were the case it would be great. The job, however, entails quite a bit more and the way I see it could be broken down into three basic categories.

The first and most widely known is as a radio dispatcher. This alone is more than the average person may realize. What most people don't know is that the Maumee police department is not the only department that they dispatch. She dispatches both the Maumee Police and Fire Departments the Waterville Police and Fire Departments. In addition to this she dispatches the Maumee street, water, sewer, and inspection departments. Beside all of this two way traffic she has to listen to monitors on other departments such as Toledo P.D., Perrysburg, State Patrol, the sheriff etc. This radio traffic alone could keep one person more than busy.

The second classification could be that of telephone operator. All of the police and fire departments listed above have all incoming calls going through the dispatcher's office. In addition to this, when the city offices are closed all calls

that would normally go to the city switchboard are routed through a special phone in the dispatcher's office.

The third part of the job is clerical. Every complaint or accident report that comes into the department has to be numbered and filed. Besides this there have to be index cards made up under the names of all parties involved (this is to aid record checks and finding reports in the future). The exact number of these reports is not known but it numbers in the thousands. The dispatcher also makes record checks for the cars on the road and runs the teletype hooked up with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles and other departments. If this is not enough work when the court is closed (nights, weekends and holidays) the dispatcher acts as a deputy clerk accepting bonds and helping to prepare affidavits.

All of the above work is done for a pay rate which is often less than the rate paid for any one of the duties alone. So, if the next time you call the Maumee Police Department and the phone isn't answered on the first ring try to remember the pleasant sympathetic voice on the other end comes from a woman who is doing the job of two or three. At this time I would like to take the opportunity to wish all of our fine dispatchers and our readers a happy and prosperous New Year.

Any amount of money spent to save a youngster from the pathetic existence of an addict would be money well spent.

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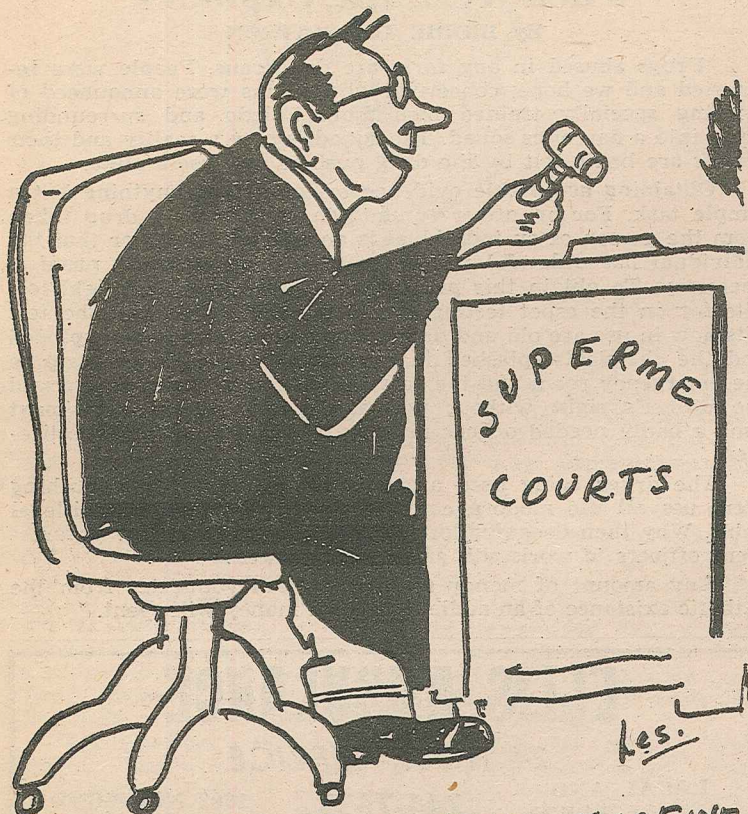

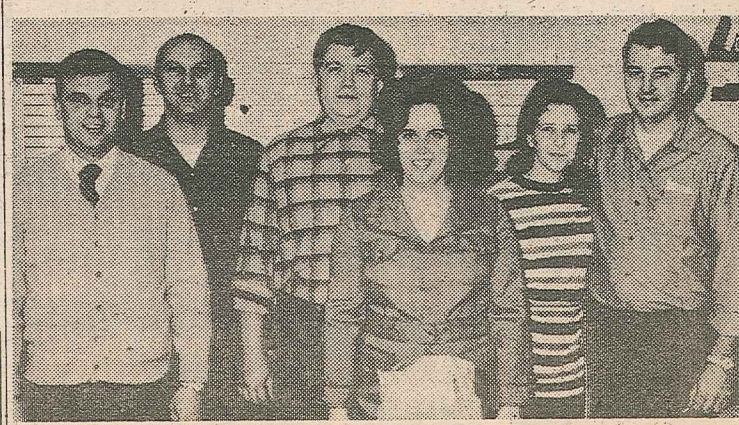

A Slight Miscalculation

It was a hot late August day and the two young officers were still home getting ready to report in for the afternoon shift. The officers had been together for nearly three years and as of the first of September 1, Officer Red was being transferred to another district.

Officer Green was thinking that since he and Officer Red had been together for that length of time and that tonight would be their last tour of duty together, a little celebration after work would be in order. Green called Red on the phone and arrangements were made to take civilian clothes along.

The duty tour that evening was rather routine for that time of year, a lot of calls but nothing very serious. At last "hit-off" time arrived and the evening's celebration was about to begin. Little did they know at this point that before the night was over they would see what the victim of crime feels.

With clothes changed, the partners started out. First with a superb dinner at a north side restaurant, washed down with fine wine, the partners decided to visit some of the night spots along Broadway. (Both officers were from the south side and were more at ease in familiar territory).

The evening was going along pretty much as predicted with some drinking and a little dancing. Finally about 1:30 a.m. it was decided to wrap up the night with a few drinks at Charlie's Bar which is owned by a police officer.

After the 2:30 a.m. "last call" Red and Green stood outside and wondered what to do next. They thought a sandwich and a few cups of coffee at the Little Chef would be in the best interest of everyone concerned. Officer Green's car was the one in use for the evening and with Green at the wheel they started for the coffee shop. After a couple of blocks Green noticed a car which seemed to be following them. Several fast turns around the block confirmed his suspicions. By that time they were eastbound on South Street nearing Langdon. Green said, "I'm going to stop and see what this dude is up to." He pulled to the curb, the car passed and stopped just ahead. Red got out of the car and started walking toward the man. Just at that time Unit 13 drove by and the man got in his car and drove away. Red hopped back in and Green followed the subject's auto. It turned left at Frank Street and stopped in what must have been one of the darkest spots in the city. He got out of the car and with his hands in his pockets started walking back to the officers' vehicle. Red didn't like the way the man was acting and with as little movement as possible

slipped his .38 "snub nose" out of his pocket and held it next to him on the seat. Green must have been suspicious also because he said, "Give me your badge." Red complied with the request but asked, "Where is yours?" Green answered, "It's locked in the trunk with my gun."

By this time the man was at Green's window and Green asked, "What may we do for you, young man?" The subject took one hand out of his pocket and said, "Give me your money." All the while keeping the other hand in his pocket as if he had a weapon. Officer Red then pointed his own weapon at the subject and said, "Don't move."

You can imagine the man's reaction. His eyeballs looked as if they were going to pop right out of his head. Oh, by the way, he didn't move.

Green took the gun from Red's hand and Red got out of the car, walked around to where the man was standing as if he as glued to the spot, placed him under arrest and gave him a thorough frisking. No weapon was found. Green then got out of the car and after returning Red's gun to him got his own from the trunk.

While Green kept the subject covered, Red walked to the police box at South and Broadway and called for a wagon and a tow for the subject's auto. A few minutes later the wagon pulled up and the man was on his way to the 5th Floor Jail. Red and Green then went to the Detective Bureau and related the incident to the duty captain. The officers were advised to place a charge of Assault to Rob against the man. When the subject learned of this he began the usual whining that "he was only kidding" and that he never intended to really rob anyone. Now, isn't that interesting? What would have happened if the two men this "joking fellow" approached had been punch press operators instead of police officers? Does anyone believe he would have been "kidding then?" ment due to their crime. But no one has yet bothered to define what constitutes long term confinement. They also make this brilliant statement: "If the prisoners are refused admittance by Sheriff Metzger they will be returned to the city jail and then released unless conditions are improved."

It seems hardly possible that the judges don't know the stipulations applied to the county jail by Judge Young regarding the number of prisoners allowed in a cell. It is almost impossible for the county jail to act as a detention center for women charged with crimes against the State of Ohio, hold women brought in from other small cities within the county and still have room for the number of women prisoners the city wants to send to them. So now the City Fathers said that if a woman prisoner is sentenced to a long term of confinement she will be sent to the city jail in Columbus, Ohio, to serve her sentence. This lovely idea is going to cost the city \$5.50 per day plus transportation to and from Columbus, Ohio. So now the city has decided that they can afford another expense, that of transportation of the women.

This looks like another idea by our City Fathers to do something without trying to remedy the situation at home. The Administration has said it will cost around \$200,000 yearly to staff an area of the workhouse to hold women prisoners. Yet some months ago when the city released their ideas on the use of funds within the Capital Improvements Fund some mention was made of a building to house the Municipal Court and their offices. If this was constructed the city would have more than enough room to build new detention cells for women prisoners. But as usual the City Fathers have said that other buildings are more important to the City of Toledo than this one.

For the information of the City Fathers - you had better use that Capital Improvements monies for buildings which will protect your 390,000 plus citizens from the headaches of crime than spending your flunk worrying about which conventions you will allow to use the facilities of our city.

It's too bad the Municipal Court Judges cannot force the City Administration to make the improvements which are needed within the city jails. We can give the Municipal Judges credit for trying to force the City into making some moves to improve the jail facilities but they cannot be absolved of all the problems. These men are the ones who feel its necessary to give continuances from week to week on cases which many times leads to confinement even before the trial is started or sentence is passed.

OPEN QUESTION TO THE POWERS THAT BE:

How would you like to have coffee and rolls for breakfast, a cold sandwich for lunch, and a bowl of stew for dinner daily? In case you don't know it, this is the slop the prisoners must eat daily.

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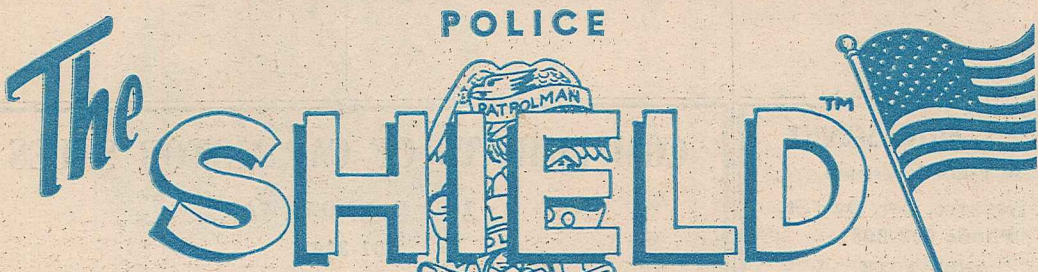
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
