Dear Sir:

I submit to you herewith a report of the work done in the Bureau of Identification & Records for the year ending December 31st, 1924:

1151 New subjects or individuals were registered in the Bureau. Criminal charges were filed against these persons and they were all photographed, measured and finger printed, and their photographs placed in the display gallery.

106 Special subjects or individuals were registered by being photographed, measured and finger printed. These special subjects were principally narcotic violators.

12,570 Photographs of the above subjects were made. This amount being necessary as seven or more photographs of each person are used. In addition to the photographs, seven or more sets of finger prints were taken of each subject.

50 Persons whose photographs were already on file were rephotographed, they having outgrown their old likeness.

10 Persons who had been previously measured were remeasured, for at the time they were first measured they were less than twenty one years of age.

550 Persons whose finger prints were already on file were refinger printed, they having been arrested for another offense than that for which they were originally finger printed. This is done for the reason that some subjects when on trial deny their identity, or previous record.

1,257 Photographs, with finger prints, measurements and general description, were sent to the Department of Justice, Bureau of Criminal Identification, Washington, D.C.

1,257 Photographs, with finger prints, measurements and general description, were sent to the Ohio State Bureau of Criminal Identification, Columbus.

1,151 Photographs, with finger prints, measurements and general description, were sent to the State Reformatory, Ionia, Mich.

- 400 Photographs were furnished to the Detective Bureau for use in the apprehension and identification of criminals.
- 679 Photographs, finger prints, measurements and general descriptions were furnished the Sheriff of Lucas County of subjects held to the Grand Jury of this County from Municipal Court, it being required by law that he have same on file.
- 267 Photographs, with measurements and general description, were furnished investigating officials of the United States Government, Police Departments, Penal Institutions, Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys.
- 514 Sets of finger prints, with photographs, measurements and descriptions, were furnished officials of the United States Government, Police Departments, Penal Institutions, Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys.
- 879 Investigations were made by this Bureau for the Office of the Lucas County Prosecuting Attorney, and of this number it was found that 273 subjects were on file and records furnished.
- 753 Complete records were compiled and furnished officials of the United States Government, Police Departments, Penal Institutions, Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys.
- 2,389 Letters were written and telegrams sent on the above mentioned individuals to prosecuting attorneys, sheriffs, penal institutions and police officials.
- 342 Records of the above subjects were requested from penal institutions.
- 222 Records of the same persons were requested from other police departments and sheriffs.
- 146 Records of the same subjects were requested from the Federal Officials.
- 860 letters, some with photographs attached, were received on criminal subjects other than those whose photographs were on file, all of which were investigated, answered, indexed and filed.
- 720 circulars of persons wanted by other departments and penal institutions, on which no correspondence was necessary, were received, indexed and filed.
- 3,544 Finger prints, photographs, measurements and descriptions were received from the Ohio State Penitentiary and the Michigan Reformatory, all of which were indexed and filed in their proper places.
- 1,146 Letters, received by the Department on subject matters other than criminal, such as missing persons, addresses wanted, relatives notified in case of death, etc, investigated by the Detective Bureau, were also answered and filed.

- 20,163 Index cards, on which appear the name, bertillon measurements and finger print classification if available, general description and other necessary information, were filled in and filed to take care of the aforementioned criminal work
- 1,289 Photographs of subjects already on file were printed.
- 533 Negatives were made of other than human subjects, including dead persons, scenes where murders and burglaries were committed, also finger prints found supposedly of the guilty persons, and other matters pertinent to the records of the Department. Of these, 1400 photographs were made.
- 146 Investigations were also made the scenes of murders and burglaries in an effort to discover finger prints left by the perpetrators, and in numerous cases we were successful.
- 929 Identifications were made on finger prints received, from photographs on which a finger print classification appeared; from bertillon measurements and similar names, the finger prints and photographs being received from other departments.
- 482 Cards were issued to taxicab drivers, each of whom was finger printed, their photographs pasted on the finger print card and on the card which the driver is compelled to carry in his pocket at all times; on which card also appears the print of his right index finger.
- 60 Persons to whom permits to purchase firearms were issued were finger printed and their photographs pasted on said finger print card.
- 1,285 Telephone calls to and from other departments and citizens were also handled by the Bureau.

During the past year we have also issued thousands of circulars and cards on criminals wanted, missing persons, burglaries and stolen automobiles.

In previous years the finger print cards were all filed in their proper place but no photograph was attached. During the past year, all finger print cards, some twelve thousand in number, were drawn from the files, the photographs pasted on the card and the prints refiled in the proper place. While this procedure naturally necessitated a vast amount of work, it is of great assistance in making identifications of subjects on whom we receive a finger print classification only.

I wish to take this opportunity to extend to you my thanks and appreciation for the hearty and sincere assistance and cooperation rendered by you in keeping the Bureau up to its present standard of efficiency. It is a known fact throughout the United States and Canada that the Bureau of Identification & Records of the Toledo Police Department is one of the best and efficient in the Country.

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Detective Paul Ringle, detailed to work with Federal Officers, has been very satisfactory in his services. He made 482 investigations, arrested 116 for violation of Harrison Drug Act, nearly all of which resulted in penitentiary sentences. He also made 187 miscellaneous arrests.

Patrolman J. H. Ford, assigned to cases of missing persons, both local and outside points, has been a valuable asset to this department, as he located 458 persons reported missing, answered 460 complaints, investigated inquiries as requested by letters from outside points to the number of 1086, recovered 5 automobiles, arrested 5 fugitives from justice, and recovered property valued at \$5000.00.

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In regard to the foregoing, I would say that I have made several changes this year in the interest of efficiency, but, on the whole, I am satisfied with the performance of this department, especially when everything is taken into consideration such as the 32-day enforced lay-off which necessitated the re-organization of the department from month to month.

At the present time, this department consists of 3 captains, 17 regular detectives, 14 detailed detectives, and 12 patrolmen assigned to work out of this department in civilian clothes, and although this is an insufficient number to take care of the city properly, I hesitate to ask for additional men, but I would request that the acting captain be made a regular captain as he will take care of the captain's duties at least 12 days of each month.

In order to promote harmony, loyalty, and encouragement among the men in this department, I would request that the following scale of wages be given your consideration; On entering this department and for the first year \$160.00 per month, second year \$165.00, third year \$170.00, fourth year \$175.00, and the fifth year \$185.00, or the pay of a full-fledged regular detective. This, I believe, would be a very good incentive measure.

As you know, our men are called upon to go from one part of the city to another on very short notice which necessitates the use of street cars and coming to the business section to transfer. This is the cause of much lost time, and our outside men are compelled to do this often, and, for this reason, I would request that we be given 10 small cars for the use of these men. With these cars, we could answer virtually all calls on short notice and give them the attention they should have.

Another indispensable detail for the perfecting of our system is a fund of not less than \$1000.00 for the use of following up important clues and making necessary trips out of town.

There are many other ways for the betterment of the Police system, but owing to the large amount of money required, I will not make any further requests at this time, and I sincerely trust that the above will meet with your approval.

Of the 26715 violations there were a total of 13837 paid fines which amounted to the sum of \$15,212.00

Of the above number of violators 9858 were released with a warning, 2236 were tried in Police Court, of which number, 1316 were fined and 109 received jail sentences. There were 13837 paid fines in the Traffic Bureau in which a total \$15,212.00 was collected and deposited with the City Treasurer.

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With the steady increase of traffic on our streets and the resulting increase of accidents it is very evident that more care must be exercised both by the pedestrian and the vehicle driver. The public must realize that accidents can and must be avoided.

While the accident report of the year of 1924 shows that there were 913 more accidents, and that 213 more persons were injured, than in 1923, it also shows that there were 35 persons killed in 1924 as compared to 45 in 1923, a decrease of 10, which I believe is very gratifying to this Department in being able to show a decrease in the number of Fatal accidents, and considering the increase of motor vehicles in 1924 as compared to that of 1923. The records of the Toledo Automobile Club show that there were a total of 65,815 license of all kinds issued in 1924 as compared to 59,841 during the year 1923 or an increase of 5974. This demonstrates conclusively that the auto drivers, in general, are using greater care and caution than formerly. I fully realize that no sane or normal auto driver wants to kill or injure anyone while driving. If people will only bear in mind the fact that 35 persons lost their lives in auto accidents last year in the City of Toledo and most of them in accidents that could have been avoided they will drive a little slower, more carefully and thoughtfully and by so doing assist in no small way in the prevention of the needless loss of human life.

One of the annoyances encountered by the autoists on our streets is the person who is conscious only of himself when on the public highways. Some of the many accidents are rightly attributed to these persons while many of the accidents can be attributed to the thoughtless child running or playing in the streets. While the safety instruction given both in the school and in the home has no doubt helped to lessen the accidents, I believe the only solution is a city-wide education campaign which will arouse all of the people to the seriousness of the situation, and will compel each individual to appreciate his own personal responsibility by doing everything in his power to protect himself and others.

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In commenting on the number of traffic complaints recorded for the year of 1924 as compared to the number of complaints recorded for the year 1923 the records show that there were 26715 violations recorded in the year of 1924 as compared to 10920 violations recorded during the year of 1923 or an increase of 15795 violations. To this record too much credit cannot be given to the motorcycle Patrolmen and the foot Patrolmen for the work they have done during the past year in the enforcement of the traffic ordinances.

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The parking of automobiles in the downtown district has become a very serious problem. Automobile parking divides itself into short-time parking or the temporary stop in front of a store or office while the user transacts his necessary affairs and, long-time parking or leaving the automobile the entire day while the owner transacts his daily business. This latter is more nearly a question of the daily storage of automobiles. The former, while an evil in which a great number of machines are involved is necessary to some extent, but the latter is entirely unnecessary and should not be permitted.

In order to relieve this condition I would suggest a shorter parking time. The shorter time parking measure has been in force on Madison Ave. from Summit St. to Michigan St. for the past six (6) months and has worked out very successfully and has met with the approval of the merchants and the motorists. At the present time there are two Patrolmen detailed on parking duty but on account of the large territory they have to cover, it is not possible to check the cars in the way they should, and for this reason, I wish to recommend, at this time, that a detail of five (5) Patrolmen be made to take care of this work.

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A survey of traffic conditions in the congested district shows that the congestion reaches the peak between the hours of 4:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M. This is the result of the large number of employees of factories and stores reaching the downtown district at this time on the way home, and practically every corner where car lines intersect is a transfer point so because of this influx traffic is materially slowed up. A remedy must be provided. I wish to recommend that all slow moving vehicle traffic be diverted from Summit Street and Superior Street between Monroe Street and Jackson Avenue, Adams Street and Madison Avenue from Summit Street to Michigan Street. My reason for recommending Madison Avenue is on account of the large number of touring cars that use this street during these hours. If this is done there is no question but what it will speed up the movement of traffic, more particularly the street cars and motor vehicles, in the congested district.

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In order to stimulate the movement of traffic in our congested district, I wish to recommend the installation of an electrically controlled traffic signal system.

The electric traffic control system has been installed in a great many other cities and has proven to be the solution in the movement of traffic. I believe it would be advisable to install this system on only one street such as Madison Avenue from Summit Street to Michigan Street. The result of this experiment would determine if this would prove the best system for Toledo.

In commenting on the Electric Go and Stop signal that is installed at Collingwood and Woodruff Avenues, I am safe in saying that it does everything that could be expected in the movement of traffic, both in a safe and speedy manner. It takes the place of a Patrolman who can be used to greater advantage at some other duty. I want, at this time, to recommend that serious consideration be given the placing of more electric go and stop signals in the outlying districts, namely at Sylvania and Jackman., Bancroft and Upton., Bancroft and Monroe., Upton and Monroe., 17th. and Dorr., 17th. and Monroe., 17th. and Jefferson., 17th. and Madison, and, 17th. and Adams. There are a great many other corners that this system could be installed on which would help a great deal in the movement of traffic.

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The work of the sign shop during the past year has been very satisfactory and many things were accomplished in spite of the fact that the enforced lay off lessened the number of men. Much time and labor could be saved in this department by the use of a spray machine for the painting and stencilling of streets. I take this opportunity to recommend that the same be purchased.

The work of the traffic officers, school patrolmen and motorcycle patrolmen working out of the Traffic Bureau is to be commended on the excellent manner in which they have performed their duties. Very few, if any, complaints were made regarding the conduct of these officers. It is extremely gratifying to me as Captain of the Traffic Division of this Department to be able to know that through their cooperation this department has earned the respect of the motorists as well as the public in general.



During the past year the routine work of the Traffic Bureau has increased steadily over the work that was necessary during 1923. This is due to the increase of accidents and traffic complaints recorded by this department.

The accident records in this office are in excellent shape and have proved a valuable asset to the public who have, at numerous times, sought information from these records during the past year.

I want to take this opportunity of thanking all of the men detailed in this bureau for the cooperation and assistance they have afforded me in the past year. I wish, also, to recommend, at this time, that as the accident feature of this work has become such an important factor, the office should be kept open a longer period of time. At the present time the office is open from 8:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. but it is my belief that it should be kept open until 11:00 P.M., after which time few accidents, if any, occur.

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In concluding my report I wish to sincerely thank the morning and evening news-papers, of this city, for the cooperation and publicity they have so generously given during the past year. I am sure that this system of educating the public in the observance of the traffic rules helps to lessen the number of accidents. I wish to ask, at this time, that the news-papers, of this city, continue their good work.

INSPECTION OF BUILDINGS

Regarding the inspection of Sub-Stations, I want to state that owing to the deplorable condition of these buildings, and the inability of the city, thru lack of finance, to remedy this condition, inspection of them during the past year has been but a matter of form. In spite of the fact that my time from January the first to October the twentieth, 1924, was mostly occupied in bringing to completion our Revolver Range at Bay View Park, I have inspected sub-stations at regular intervals, and I can but renew my recommendations of last year:

No. 4 Sub-Station: The construction of a cement floor and wash rack. The removing of partition between the garage occupied by the Auto Patrol and that used by the Speed Car; the wash rack to be constructed in the center of room so as to be available for either car. Uniform lockers to be built along the west wall, so as to leave ample room on the East side for desk, tables and other furniture necessary for the convenience and comfort of the men detailed there. The ceiling of garage facing Bancroft Street to be rebuilt on the same level as the one facing Monroe Street. The parapet wall to be raised to the same level on both fronts and East side of building. The interior to be plastered and painted. If these improvements are carried out, a presentable and up-to-date Police Auto Service Station will be the result.

No. 5 Station: A new cement floor and wash rack to be installed; the installation of this rack will require a drain connecting it with the catch basin in the rear of No. 5 Fire Station, providing the Building Inspector will grant a permit; if not, it will be necessary to run a drain direct to the sewer. Uniform lockers to be built, desk, table and four (4) serviceable chairs should be purchased and the interior repainted.

No. 6 Station: A wash rack should be installed; the walls and ceiling washed; the lockers refinished; a desk, table and four (4) serviceable chairs should be purchased.

Lagrange Station: In the past, efforts have been made to remodel this building into an up-to-date Sub-Station, but without success. However, the future holds promises of this much desired improvement. If undertaken, I recommend the following plan:

Now that the new City Garage is complete, an effort should be made to secure the garage next to the Police Repair Shop on Orange Street. If successful, the present repair shop should be moved to that building. The Carpenter Shop to be moved from Lagrange Station to the room now occupied by the repair shop. If this arrangement can be made, all the Mechanical branches of the Department would be housed in the same building. But, to return to Lagrange Station: The office of Captain of Police, and that of Detectives, along with the office of Lieutenant of Police, should be located in the room now occupied by the Carpenter Shop. If visitors to the station are compelled to ascend to the second floor to interview an Official, we will be going back fifty years in efficient service to the public. The front of this room should be remodeled, and the stairway widened to the extent of five (5) feet; entrance door to the first floor should be placed immediately East of the entrance to the second floor. The first floor entrance to open on corridor running the full length of room. The offices to also open on this corridor. The West wall of offices to be constructed of a plastered base, four (4) feet in height; the balance of partition to be of glass to the ceiling. Toilets to be placed at end of corridor and to the East. Ample room for lockers will be provided on the West side of corridor. Sergeant's office to be located on second floor front. Detective room to the rear of Sergeant's office. Toilets, bath, locker room for Sergeant and Detectives to be at rear. Patrolmen's quarters, Assembly and Locker rooms to be located on West side of second floor. There is ample space for splendid quarters for Patrolmen.

#### INSTRUCTIONS.

In my last two yearly reports I recommended the establishment of Police School of Instruction within the University of Toledo. I again urge the adoption of this innovation. The present method of instructing the men might be carried on indefinitely and never accomplish the desired result, for the reason that only those who desire to advance themselves in the knowledge of Criminal Law take advantage of the instructions I impart. The careless and indifferent number, after

receiving his appointment, concerns himself little about the acquisition of this knowledge for he knows that his tenure of office does not depend on his knowledge of the Criminal Law. If all of the Uniformed Members of this Department were making an honest effort to study and learn the instructions imparted to them, I would have no doubt regarding their knowledge of the Criminal Law of Ohio as laid down in the statutes and confirmed by decisions of the Supreme Court of this State. Neither would I have any fear regarding their conduct toward the public if they heeded the advice so frequently given to be at all times and under all circumstances a man and a gentleman, but, unfortunately, as I have stated above, a large number of the men and patrolmen, give but little time and attention to mastering their profession; they are but serving an apprenticeship during their entire career as a Police Officer. No more convincing proof could be had of this condition than the following:

For the past three years I have been issuing a weekly instruction on the Criminal Law of Ohio. The answers to the questionnaires are based on the authenticated law of Ohio. I urged upon the men to retain and study the answers for by so doing they would acquire an extensive knowledge of this most important work. I sent out duplicate Questionnaires. A large number of the men sent in hap-hazard answers while others requested me to furnish them with a complete set of answers to the number of 120. If Toledo is to have an efficient, intelligent and up-to-date Police Department, it must follow in the footsteps of other cities and provide a School of Instruction, where, after passing a physical examination, applicants may enter and take up the studies that will equip them mentally for the important public service they seek.

If the position of patrolman is worth having it is worth striving for. I do not wish to be misunderstood in this matter. I am not advocating a Department made up of college graduates, for, in my opinion, the young man who has passed through college and received his degree and would be satisfied with position of patrolman, is a self-confessed failure, for he lacks the element necessary for success in any undertaking; ambition. It would be a weak argument against the schooling I advise, to say that hundreds of good men have served in the capacity of patrolman with little or no schooling. To deny this would be to deny the truth, but I content they would have been much more efficient had they possessed the legal knowledge so important to the intelligent discharge of their duty. The ideal type of man to be selected as a recruit for Police Service is the following:

Age, not under 25 years, height, not less than 5 feet 9 inches. One capable of passing a rigid physical examination. They should be selected preferably from the ranks of the skilled mechanics; this class of young men, as a rule, possess intelligence of a high order. Mental application was necessary during their apprenticeship for them to master the difficult problems they encountered in the learning of their trade. A six month's course of instructions in the following branches of study:

Criminal Law	Writing
English	Composition

would equip him with the knowledge so essential for a high-class Police Officer.

I earnestly recommend that such a School of Instruction be inaugurated within the University of Toledo; cost of schooling to be paid by the city.



### UNIFORMS AND INSPECTION OF SAME

During the past year, inspection of Uniform was, to a certain extent, discouraged. You will recall that last Spring you adopted the new style Dress Coat for all members of the Uniform Division, and the issuing of an order to that effect. A protest from a number of the men resulted in the revocation of that order to the extent of permitting all members of the Department to wear the old style Dress Coat, if at all presentable. At the Fall inspection, owing to the fact that we all received a 15% reduction in salary, I was instructed to be lenient with the men regarding their uniform. While I approve of the stand you took on these two occasions, for I know a real hardship would have been imposed upon the manning of the men had I carried out a rigid inspection, yet I also know that discipline in the Department has suffered as a result. The letting down of the bars of authority allowed hostility on the part of many of the men to develop to the extent that a number of them failed to order the garment that I thought necessary, if they were to appear as they should, presentable in the eye of the public. They attributed their failure to comply with my order, to the fact that they were forced to give up \$160.00 of their year's salary to help pay the debt of the city.

The personal appearance of the Uniformed Members of the Police Department, next to the intelligent discharge of their duty, is the most important of all the elements that make up the modern and efficient officers. An intelligent and well-uniformed Department is a most valuable asset to a city; to be well groomed is the officer's first step to success. His personal appearance will make or break him with the public. If, through no fault of his own, he is forced to sacrifice his personal appearance, in order to provide for the innumerable wants of a family, his condition is nothing short of tragic; he feels himself at a disadvantage when detailed at any large gathering of people and humiliated, if, because of his appearance, his superiors refrain from giving him important details. Happily, this condition can be relieved if the City of Toledo will provide the uniforms for its Police Officers. Several of the large cities of the country have realized the great advantage of a well-uniformed and dignified Police Force and are paying for the uniforms of its Officers. A city is judged, and rightly so, by the appearance and conduct of its Public Servants. If they are intelligent, neat in person, and respectful to strangers the impression received is favorable and the city is benefited thereby. There is no class of Public Servants who come in personal contact with the public as frequently as the Police Officer. He should, at all times, be 100% in personal appearance. The fact that many cities are now purchasing uniforms for their officers, police of cities less favored, are imposed upon as a result. Manufacturers of uniforms cloth are now turning out a very inferior article to what was made only a few years back. Realizing that the large cities are supplying uniforms to the police, the manufacturer, concerns himself not at all about quality. One season's wear is about all that can be got out of the present day material. Mineral dye that fails to hold its color when exposed to the sun and weather, and short wool, that offers but little resistance to wear, are the elements that make up the present day uniform material. We are now buying the best uniform goods from the American loom, yet, after a season's wear, the garment is ready for the discard.

When we take into consideration the above, we can readily see the injustice that the city is working upon its Officers. I recommend that an Ordinance be introduced in Council creating the "Uniform Fund" of not less than Seventy (\$70.00) Dollars per man, per year. This amount will do not more than keep the individual member of the uniform rank 100% in personal appearance.

### LIEUTENANTS

I am of the opinion that the practice of Lieutenants remaining at their desks for the greater part of their tour of duty is unwise. The Lieutenant of today will be the Captain of tomorrow. The duty of the Captain is the supervision of his precinct, therefore, the Lieutenant should keep posted and in touch with the outside officers. I recommend that the Lieutenants and Sergeants divide the time at the desk.

### SERGEANTS.

At present the Patrol Sergeant is making no report regarding their visits to patrolmen on duty on the districts. I recommend that a daily report, giving the names of the patrolmen and the number of the district in which they are detailed, be made.

### OPERATORS.

I recommend that additional young patrolmen be instructed in this branch of the service so they may be available in the event that any number of the present force become incapacitated. During the past year the Chief Operator has been compelled on several occasions to work on the board, as a result of which he was unable to carry on his important duty as supervisor.

### RULES GOVERNING REPORTING.

The multiplicity of Rules Governing Reporting only leads to confusion. I recommend the following simplified rules be adopted: Patrolmen detailed on district will report hourly at the time indicated by the Division in which their district is located.

Patrolmen detailed on districts must report on arrival on post.

Patrolmen must report hourly at the proper time and from a different call-box at each report, unless otherwise ordered.

Patrolmen must report when leaving their districts at the termination of their tour of duty.

Patrolmen leaving their districts for special duty must report as follows: When leaving district - upon arrival at scene of special duty - at the termination of the special duty and upon arriving back on their district. This rule must be strictly adhered to, unless the special duty be an emergency, such as fire, riot, etc.

Patrolmen detailed on special duty at roll-call will report as directed by their Lieutenant or Sergeant. If, for instance any reason, patrolmen fail to report as directed above, they will report in writing to their Sergeant setting forth the cause. Failure to make such written report will be considered neglect of duty, subjecting the offender to reprimand by the Chief of Police.

### TRAFFIC CONGESTION.

This is a problem that is given serious thought by Police Officials throughout the country in an effort to find a solution.

I realize that the only solution is the elimination of parking. I also realize that any attempt to prevent parking in the congested district would meet with opposition that would be difficult to overcome. Because of this opposition, legislation along those lines would fail of enactment. Public parking space must be provided by the city. A double deck parking stand could be built on Superior Street between Monroe and Lafayette that would provide parking space for as many cars as are daily parked in the down-town section, between Summit and Michigan, and Monroe and Cherry. If constructed of steel and re-inforced glass, ample light would reach the buildings abutting on that street.

#### THE GUARDING OF PAYROLLS AND BANK FUNDS IN TRANSIT.

Throughout the country, the past year was a banner for the payroll and bank bandit. His gain was enormous and his victims numerous. Our own morning Times, under date of January 3rd, makes a statement that the plunder taken in holdups, robberies, etc., reached the enormous sum of \$2,650,000.00 during the year 1924. The incentive was the ease with which he carried on his depredations. The average bank messenger proves an easy victim when confronted with cold steel, in the hands of a daring robber. The more courageous ones, in many cases, paid with their lives for their fidelity to their trust. I know that Toledo has been remarkably free from this class of felony; but what of the future? What assurance have we that we will remain secure from this menace? None, whatever! There is, however, a sure way by which we can guard against the monetary loss and also safeguard the lives of those whose duty it is to guard large sums of money, in transit.

An effort should be made to interest bankers and heads of large business concerns to contribute toward the purchase of, at least, four armored cars. These cars should be fitted with a safe, having six compartments, equipped with a combination lock. The advantage of these cars is that they would carry, at one time, six different payrolls, or the transfer of funds from as many banks. Each payroll should be placed in a compartment, combination of which is known only to a trusted employee at place of delivery. Give publicity to the fact that money is carried in a safe, securely locked, and it will eliminate even an attempted holdup. The holdup man never attempts a big job unless he is reasonably sure of success. If the car were wrecked the money would still be intact. Thus, you see, every effort of the bandit is frustrated.

I know that private individuals are now rendering a similar service, but such service should never pass from the jurisdiction of the regular organized City Police. The cars should be kept at Police Headquarters and manned by regular, uniformed Police Officers. The cost of maintaining this service would be less than the aggregate Insurance Premium paid for the protection of these funds, or again referring to the billions of dollars of plunder mentioned above, it would only take one tenth of one percent of the amount of plunder to equip the entire nation with these cars.

#### ACHIEVEMENT.


The past year saw the Dedication of the Police Revolver Range at Bay View Park. It is the only Range of its kind in existence, and the outstanding achievement in the history of the Police Department. It is the product of the labor of eighteen members of this Department and the generosity of a large number of public spirited citizens. By providing exceptional facilities for the proper instruction of her police in the art of marksmanship, it places Toledo in the van of her Sister Cities.

This Range will prove to be a college where the future patrolmen, under the proper instruction, will speedily pass thru the grande of marksmen and sharp shooters and be graduated an expert.

I earnestly recommend the purchase of the ammunition necessary to give all members of this Department this training.

# Report of Division of Police for 1924

Arthur D. Hill, Director of Public Safety

Harry Jennings, Chief of Police

The personnel of the Toledo police force included:

Chief of police, 2 inspectors, 6 captains, 6 lieutenants, 14 sergeants, 18 regular detectives, 15 detailed detectives, 299 patrolmen, 4 police-women, superintendent of bureau of identification, assistant superintendent, 4 clerks, secretary to chief, 1 chief operator, police alarm (7 operators detailed to police telegraph divisions), 1 stenographer, 4 matrons, 4 janitors, 3 engineers.

Following are those on the police pension payroll:

One inspector, 3 captains, 2 lieutenants, 1 sergeant, 8 detectives, 23 patrolmen, 1 superintendent of Bureau of I. & R., 14 widows and 7 children.

Following are the main details:

Central Station, 197; second precinct, 55; third precinct, 12; No. 4 Station, 10; No. 5 Station, 6; No. 6 Station, 6; detective bureau, 38; bureau of I. & R., 6; traffic bureau, 27; garage, 9; school detail, 14, and detention home, 7.

Following are the minor details exclusive of officers, identification bureau staff, and regular patrolmen: 4 policewomen, 45 in automobiles, 27 motorcycle squad, 2 mounted on horses, 28 street traffic, 20 school stations, 1 city hall, 7 mechanics, 2 carpenter shop, 5 turnkeys and assistants, 8 vice squad, 5 liquor squad, and others including printer, license and traffic clerks, instructor of police pistol practice, instructor in school and parking duty.

Three were appointed patrolmen; 3 were promoted; no retirements on pension; four died; four were dismissed; 16 resigned; discipline in the form of reprimands, suspension or extra time, was meted out to 28.

### Prohibition

**City and State Charges**

Following is a summary of charges for state and city statute violations in 1924:

State cases, male, 5,146; female, 403; total, 5,549. City cases, male, 8,575; female, 1,266; total, 9,841.

Total number of arrests on city-state charges was 15,390.

Of the 15,390 arrests in 1924, 12,659 were white and 2,767 were colored.

Ages of prisoners and nationality are summarized in complete detailed report which is on file.

**Motors**

Motor maintenance including fuel and repairs, amounted to \$21,870 in 1924. This included 7 patrols, 34 touring cars, one motor boat, 31 motorcycles and 10 vehicles privately owned but used in police service. Upkeep cost for individual cars and motorcycles may be found in detailed report on file.

**Stolen Property Recovered by Police**

The police recovered stolen property to the value of \$76,275.86 in 1924, which was a \$2,329.61 decrease over the previous year. Automobiles valued at \$1,754,952 were recovered.

**Bureau of Identification and Records**

Eleven hundred fifty-one new subjects or individuals were registered. Many thousands of photographs and many new measurements of criminals were made.

**Accident Summary**

Total accidents reported, 4,256; injuries to children, 375; adults, 17 years or over, 821; fatalities, 35; non-injury accidents, 3,170.

There were 26,715 traffic violations reported in 1924, an increase of 15,795 over the previous year, according to Traffic Captain O'Reilly. Following were the main items:

Overtime parking, 5,442; no lights, 4,069; parking in safety zone, 2,478; speeding, 164; driving while intoxicated, 155; reckless driving, 105. The remaining unclassified number were for other traffic violations and numbered 4,699.

with warning; 13,837 fined by bureau; 2,236 tried in court, of which 109 were given jail sentences, 1,316 fined and 920 dismissed.

Captain O'Reilly points out that the accident increase in 1924 was less than the gain in automobile registration which, he believes, indicates better obeying of the law. The traffic captain condemns the long parking of automobiles on downtown streets and recommends detailing five patrolmen to check up this kind of violation.

He also recommends installation of automatic traffic signals at nine intersections.

**License Bureau**

This bureau issued 2,761 licences during the year. For complete report on license collections see City Journal of April 4, 1925. Eleven soft drink and poolroom licenses were disapproved.

In 1924, \$15,212 in traffic fines was collected through this bureau, which represented payment in 13,911 cases, of which 12,970 were for \$1.

**Bureau of Safety and Prevention**

Patrolman Charles Roth, detailed to this work, reported that he gave 429 lectures before school children, Parent-Teacher Clubs and other organizations. He conducted the police orchestra 30 times and gave three concerts.

**Vice Squad**

The vice squad under Captain Schultz made 1,551 arrests in 1924, against 1,422 in 1923.
