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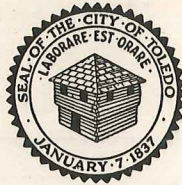

Sir:

The 1949 Annual Report of Police Activities is herewith presented for your inspection and analysis.

In explaining the various activities and functions, statistical comparisons, maps and charts have been used where ever possible.

Comparing the 1949 Offenses with Pre-War averages, for Toledo, indicates that crime has increased each year for each classification, excepting auto thefts, which group has shown steady decreases. Larceny decreased in 1947 but increased steadily in 1948 and in 1949. Robbery was below average in 1947 and 1948 and this, too, showed a marked increase in 1949. Compared with National known totals, all crime which to some extent is preventable by the police, has increased. Toledo's increases are comparable to the National average increases and are within satisfactory bounds.

Public Relations program conducted in approximately 90 public and parochial schools of the city, involving some 500 lectures, to about 60,000 students was accomplished between February & June.

About 30 other talks & lectures were given to professional, educational, service and religious groups.

The second revision of the book entitled "Manual of Laws and Ordinances" was brought up to date. This involves about 180 pages and will replace the manual now carried by police officers; estimated cost, \$450.00.

Produced for teaching purposes in the academy is the book entitled, "The Police, Society & You."

Built and replaced all bases for the silhouette targets on the Zig-Zag range of the combat course. Six tons of stone screenings were added to the surface of the foot-trails.

The rodeo driving range on the combat course which is 7/10 of a mile in length was graded and covered with screening. This work done by the City Street Department.

Training material data, from the Police Academy, were exchanged with 40 other municipal jurisdictions.

Visitations to hospitalized members of the Department were made several times weekly, as well as to members confined to their homes.

JAILS

Complete registration of 9099 men was effected during the year, along with the customary routine surveillance during their time of incarceration and physical handling to and from court. Procedures remained the same as in previous years.

Attached is the Annual Report covering the activities of the Division of Traffic for the year 1949.

Every effort has been made to make this report comprehensive, and understandable. Where possible, comparisons have been made with previous years so as to permit comparison and to show the actual services performed.

Pertinent remarks by the way of explanation have been inserted in this report with reference to certain items in the various tabulations, and charts, as an aid to the reader where the item referred to is of more than general interest in the traffic field as related to the more general police problems.

This report shows a slight increase in total number of traffic accidents, but we would like to call your attention to the fact that there were fourteen less persons killed in 1949 than during 1948. I believe this was caused by more than one factor, but I believe the main factor in reducing accidents is rigid enforcement of all Traffic Laws. We have in operation at this time a Radar Car which I believe will aid greatly in the reduction of Traffic Accidents for 1950.

Permit me to take this opportunity of thanking you and others of the Official Family for the splendid cooperation and assistance accorded the Traffic Division during 1949. We are conscious and appreciative of those efforts and interest which has aided us in a successful administration of the Traffic Bureau.
