Annual Report of Chief of Police.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT, }
TOLEDO, OHIO, January 1, 1893. }

To the Hon. Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1893.

The numerical strength of the force at the present time is 116.

The year just closed is a credit to the department.

The absence of crimes of the grave sort has been remarkable. Burglars and pickpockets have found it neither profitable nor safe to ply their vocations here. It was thought that during the World's Fair a great number of crooks would pass through this city on their way to the fair. Such may have been the case, but the ever watchful eye of the department has been on the alert and the department as a whole has done good work.

The conduct of the officers and patrolmen, as a rule, has been most excellent.

It has been the aim of the officers in control to discharge the duties devolving upon them without due officiousness or the assumption of arbitrary power, at the same time having due regard for the maintenance of good order and the fair enforcement of law and ordinances.

With the completion of the new sub-station it relieves the Central Station of parts of the Seventh and Second wards; also the First and Sixth wards. I would respectfully recommend two more sub-stations. This would greatly add and strengthen the department.

The condition of the Central and sub-station is everything which could be desired. The buildings are kept clean, a fact that reflects much credit upon the janitor and the officers in charge.

I might add in connection that the female ward at the Central Station has been carefully attended to, though the matron's duties at times are very disagreeable.

I will call the attention to the fact that aside from the strictly criminal business, as detailed in the accompanying statement, the police have performed an unusually large amount of miscellaneous business during the past year. Lost children have been found and returned to their homes, fires attended, lost property recovered and returned, stolen goods restored, street lights looked after, sick and injured persons taken home and to the hospital, suspicious characters warned out of the city and compelled to leave, and many other duties have been performed for the good of the public and the safety and protection of society.

I would also recommend the need of a police surgeon.

The need of a police surgeon is constantly increasing; one to examine applicants, sick or disabled, and to attend to sick and injured persons confined in the station. In departments where police surgeons are connected the number of cases of sickness among the members is much smaller than previous to such official inspection.

The work of the detective department has been in good hands, said department having worked night and day when required. They have rendered valuable services and I am convinced that this department is in the hands of good officers.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 3,943.

Total number of runs made by patrol wagons was 2,311.

Total number of stolen property recovered was \$4,900.

Total number taken in charge by the matrons was 472.

In conclusion I am indebted to every member of the department, particularly the commanding officers, for their valuable services, and hope that the new year will, as it closes, show as good a record as the one the work of which we now review.
