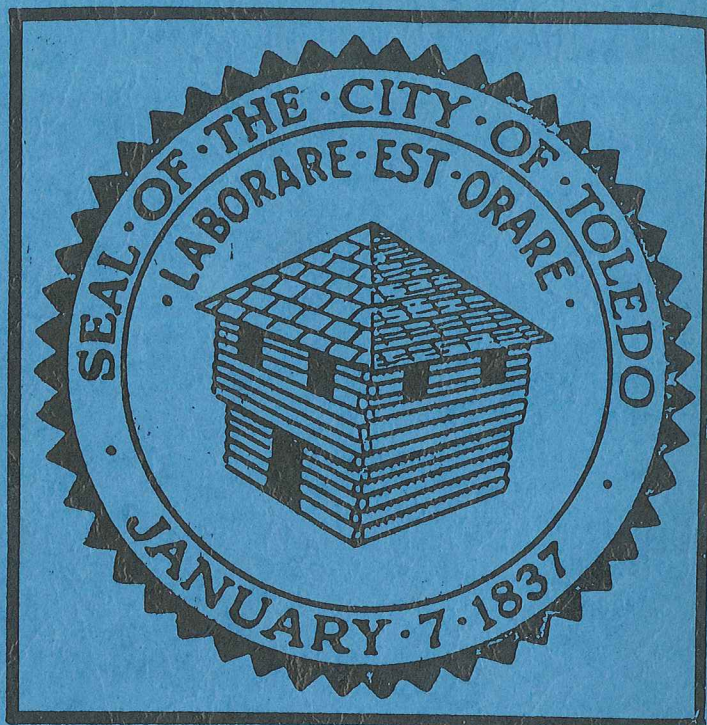

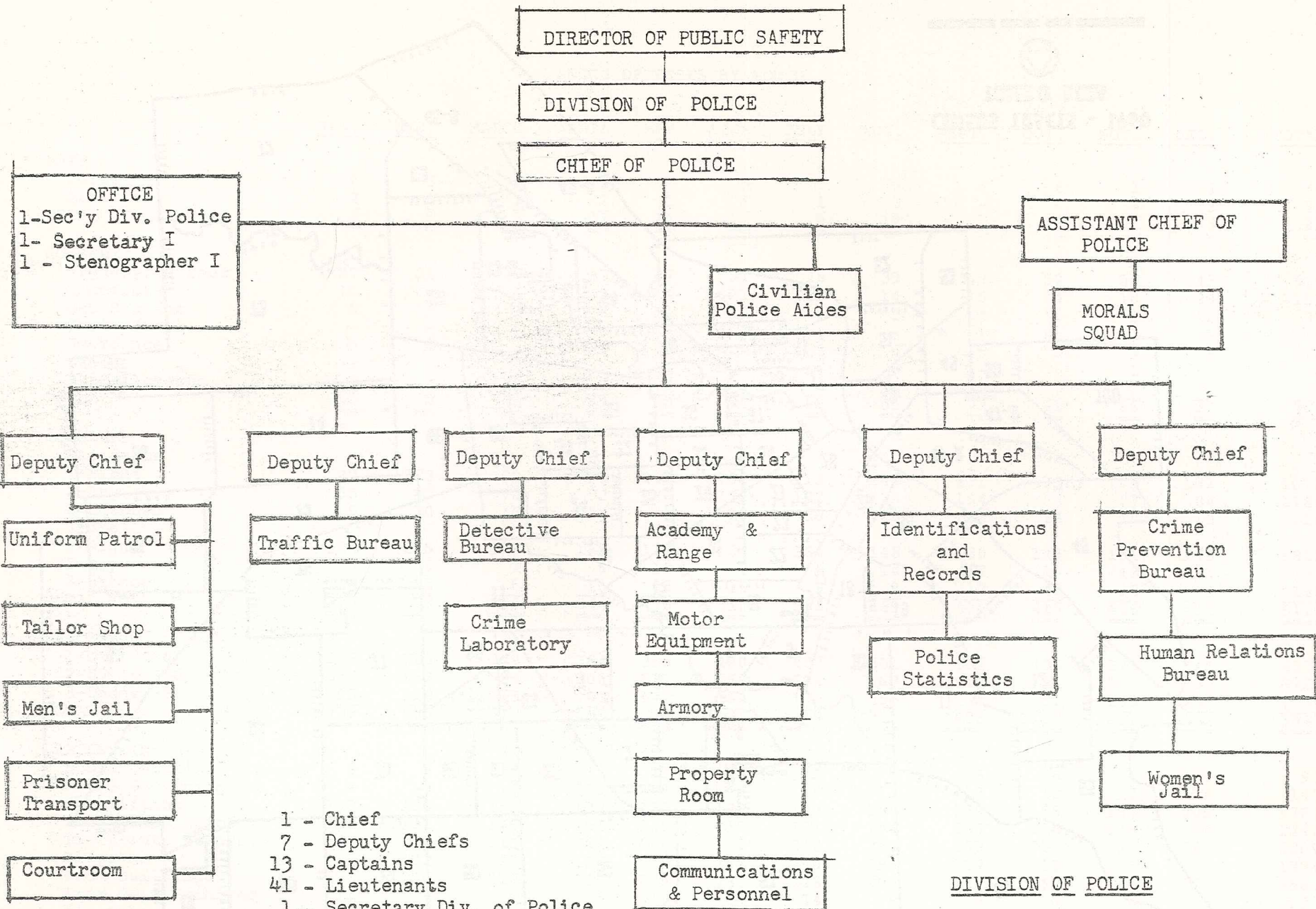

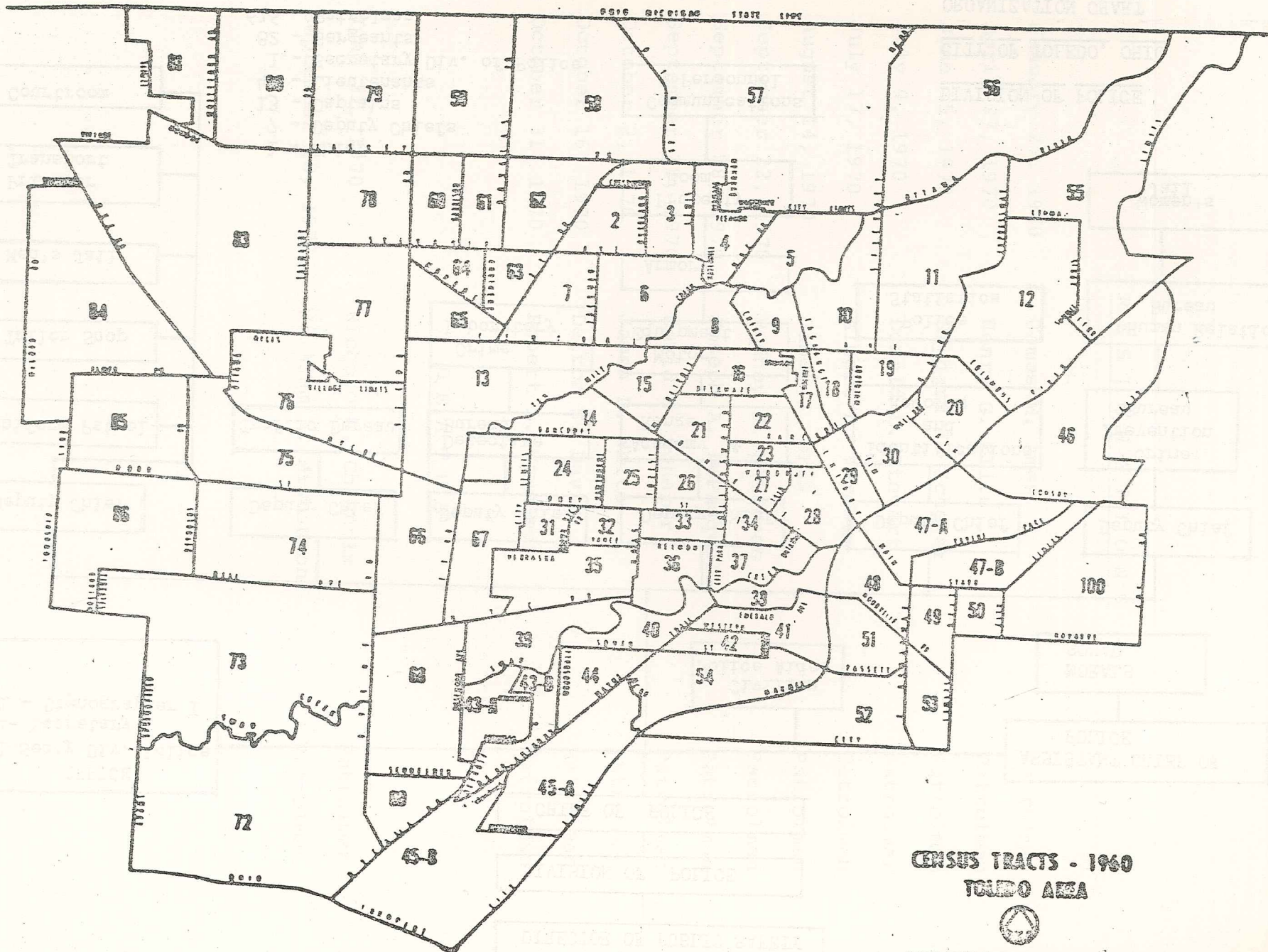

TOLEDO POLICE ACADEMY

STAFF

The Staff of the Toledo Police Academy participated in a variety of training and public service activities. Although no recruit class was conducted during the course of the year, training activities were focused upon in-service and police aide recruit training, public relations activities and service to area police divisions was provided.

The academy staff participated in planning sessions with the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments wherein solving the area wide police training problems was of major concern.

The academy staff also functioned as advisory counsel to the University of Toledo - Criminal Justice Technology Program. Assistance was rendered in the selection of faculty and textbooks.

RESEARCH AND PLANNING

The Police Academy Staff, working in cooperation with the city architect, was able to complete preliminary drawings and approximate cost estimates for the proposed firearms training facility.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Academy Staff participated in a wide variety of public relations and technical service activities in an effort to further develop in the citizens of the community goodwill, confidence, trust, and support of their police division. Appearances were made at public meetings, service, civic and church organizations. Many of the talks and lectures presented were supplemented by films.

An academy staff member participated in the making of a film entitled "Social Services" which Bowling Green State University made under a U.S. Grant. This film portrayed specialized activities of police officers. For example - Fingerprint identification; Burglary investigation, Narcotics investigation; Crime Laboratory duties and Hip-Skip Traffic investigation.

POLICE APPLICANT INVESTIGATIONS

The academy staff conducted character and background investigations of thirty-five men who passed the initial Civil Service Examination for Patrolman. Investigations were made for women applicants for the position of Policewoman and for the position of jail matron. These investigations are designed to focus upon the honesty, sobriety, integrity, responsibility, and temperament of the applicants.

POLICE AIDES

The Police Academy provided facilities and instructional material for the training of six police aides during the year of 1970.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING

The academy staff conducted four sessions of in-service carbine training for division command officers from the rank of captain to sergeant.

Two members of the academy staff attended a two week Accident Investigation Course, conducted by the Northwestern Traffic Institute, at the University of Toledo.

The facilities of the academy were utilized for thirty-one sessions of Detective In-Service Training, coordinated by the Deputy Chief in charge of the Detective Bureau.

LENDING LIBRARY

Twenty-seven new volumes of police publications were purchased and added to the Academy Lending Library. Plans call for replacement of dated texts, to keep abreast of the changing conditions in the police field and to provide our officers with current material for study and research.

TRAINING FILMS

The academy purchased a film entitled, "Self-Defense" which is extensively used in conjunction with public talks by academy personnel concerning "Self-Defense" for women. Training films were made available to various bureau speakers and to area police agencies to be used for training or public relations purposes.
