To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1894.

The constantly improving discipline and zealous work of the force has materially resulted in its increased efficiency, which has won us the confidence and support of all good citizens. It has been my aim and chief desire to have the moral and law-abiding citizens indorse my actions. The law-breakers and violators of the law we expect to criticise us. The police officer who does his duty fearlessly and without partiality will always have the support of his superior officers and the citizens at large. It is not expected the lawless element will sound the praises of the Department, but on the contrary ridicule them.

The sub-station in East Toledo, when completed, will lighten the work to both horses and men, and the Board could not have purchased a better piece of property for a sub-station. Officer Jas. W. Hall, who served the department faithfully for twenty-two years, is in charge of the tramp room in East Toledo. No better man could be found to fill the place.

The conduct of the officers and patrolmen, as a rule, has

been most excellent. The detective department has done good work, having worked night and day when required.

Since the Board appointed Dr. John D. Howe to act as police surgeon to look after patrolmen not reporting for duty, the cases of reporting sick has been less than previous to such official inspection.

In conclusion, I am indebted to officers and patrolmen for their valuable services.

POLICE PRECINCTS.

The City of Toledo is divided into five police precincts, as follows, to-wit:

1st Precinct—All territory bounded by river front, Cherry and Lagrange streets and city limits, and includes the following beats: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9.

2d Precinct—All territory of East Toledo and all territory bounded by Maumee River, Monroe, Huron, Adams, Eleventh, Union and North street, Canton avenue, old canal bed and

Beach street, and includes the following beats: 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 22, 23, 41, 42, 43 and 44.

3d Precinct—All territory bounded by Monroe, Erie, Madison, Eleventh, Adams, Twelfth, Wakeman, Bancroft and city limits, and includes the following beats: 10, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 29 and 45.

4th Precinct—All territory bounded by Swan Creek, Wayne street, Brown avenue, Clinton and Frazier streets, Detroit avenue, Lincoln street, Collingwood avenue, Frazier, Nettie, Washington, Ontario, Monroe and Superior streets, and includes the following beats: 26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34.

5th Precinct—All territory bounded by Superior and Monroe streets, Maumee River and Swan Creek, and includes the following beats: 24, 25, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39 and 40.

Each of the above precincts is in charge of a sergeant during the night, according to assignments from headquarters.
