To the Honorable City Council, of Toledo, Ohio:

GENTLEMEN.—In accordance with established custom and the requirements of the law, we present to you the Twelfth Annual Report of the condition of the Police Department, the changes that have occurred therein, the cost of maintenance, and other interesting particulars.

We are pleased to be able to report that we have no complaints to make against the conduct, discipline, or efficiency of the Police Force as a body, believing as we do that the force has never been in better condition than at the present time. Individual complaints against certain officers have been occasionally made, but in this respect the record of 1879 compares favorably with that of previous years.

We have found it necessary to make several changes in the Rules and Regulations governing the Police Force, all of which we have reason to believe, have been met with popular favor.

The proceedings of our Board have been transacted in a harmonious and business-like manner, and only one meeting has been missed,

owing to the lack of a quorum. No change in the composition of the Board has occurred.

This brief statement of facts, together with the comprehensive reports of the Secretary, which is hereto annexed, and a statement from William P. Scott, Chief of Police, will, we believe, be sufficient to give your Honorable Body a correct idea of the standing of the department.

REPORT
OF
SUPERINTENDENT OF POLICE.

TOLEDO, OHIO, *January 1st, 1880.*

To the Honorable Members of the Police Board:

By appointment from your Honorable Board, I assumed command of the department on the 18th day of September, 1879. My long association with the department as a subordinate gives me confidence that I have their support, and I may safely promise an administration acceptable to our superiors and to the public. Strict obedience to orders and harmony of action, I insist upon, and I bear willing testimony to the faithful and cheerful performance of the duties entrusted to the department; and I express the hope that the future will be marked by as good service as has characterized the work of the past.

For full information of all the affairs of the department, I respectfully refer you to the Secretary's report. It seems to contain everything necessary to show a complete outline of the condition of the Police Department. It is neat and full, and a careful examination of it will satisfy you all of that officer's ability and efficiency, which is realized and appreciated by you all, as it is by me.

I take great pleasure in congratulating Sergeants O'Sullivan and O'Dwyer, Roundsmen Hugh and Robinson, also Acting Detective McMahon, and the members of the police force, for the effective service done. The department is deserving of great credit for having done so much with a force so small in numbers.

In conclusion, please allow me to heartily thank you all, the members of the Police Board, for the suggestions you have given me from time to time, and the courteous treatment that I have received at your hands.

REPORT

OF THE

SECRETARY OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS.

TOLEDO, OHIO, *January 1st, 1880.*

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners of Toledo:

GENTLEMEN,—I take pleasure in presenting to you, in accordance with the specified duties of my office, a report of the affairs of the Police Department for the year 1879, including a large amount of statistical information relative to the condition of the department, financially and otherwise, which, it is hoped, will prove interesting and satisfactory.

The police force, with respect to numbers, remains the same as at the beginning of the year, though in *personnel* it has undergone several important changes. The first that is worthy of special mention was caused by the Bridge street double tragedy of August 23rd, 1879, in which Sergeant J. J. Nohl committed suicide, after having killed Ross Saulsbury while in the heat of passion at Saulsbury's refusal to retract certain statements reflecting upon Nohl, contained in a letter that Saulsbury had published in the *Morning Commercial*. The vacancy in the force occasioned by this startling event, was filled by the promotion of Roundsman Edward O'Dwyer to the position of second Sergeant.

On the 18th day of September another important change occurred. By the action of your Honorable Board, Roundsman William P. Scott, whose efficiency, shrewdness and courage as a member of the force were

recognized by all who had watched his career, was elevated to the position of Chief Officer and Acting Superintendent to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of the respected ex-Chief, Captain J. C. Purdy.

The vacant positions occasioned by the promotion of ex Roundsmen O'Dwyer and Scott were filled by ex-Patrolmen Henry Hugh and Charles Robinson.

Several changes occurred among the patrolmen, and two new station house officers were appointed—a night turnkey and a janitor. In the former position, George W. Kirk succeeded Aurora Vandusen, and in the latter Patrick Stark succeeded Andrew Johnson. Both are giving entire satisfaction in the performance of their respective duties. In addition to the Nohl suicide, one death occurred during the year, that of Officer Henry Herbert. There was comparatively little sickness. The changes that were made by dismissal and suspension will be found recorded in one of the tables annexed.

It is generally admitted by the citizens that the police force has done good service during the year 1879, and it is a fact worthy of comment and congratulation that in the past year fewer complaints with respect to negligence or inefficiency on the part of police officers appeared in the public papers than for several previous years. The only wonder seems to be (and this is freely expressed by visitors to the city) that such a vast extent of territory is so effectually covered by the small force of men employed.

If I might be granted the liberty, I would respectfully suggest that your Honorable Board should endeavor to impress upon the City Council the advisability of doing something toward counteracting the effect of the largely increased prices of food, clothing, house-rents, etc., by advancing the salaries of members of the force, and thus enable them to present a more creditable and uniform appearance to the public, and also to provide more liberally for the comfort of their families. While Toledo is rated as a city of the first class, there are many second and third class cities that allow their policemen much higher rates of wages than are paid here.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 2795, against 3120 in the year 1878, a decrease of 325. But while the arrests do not

foot up to such a large figure in 1879 as in the preceding year, the number of days' imprisonment to which the arrested persons were sentenced was greater last year than in 1878, being 18,372 days, against 15,550, an increase of 2820. Of the 18,372 days' confinement served, 14,200 were put in at the Work-house, and 4172 in the County Jail.

Tabulated statistics with relation to the persons arrested, their ages, nationality, social condition, religious belief, etc., will be found attached hereto, and also a list of persons that were bound over by the Police Court for trial in the courts of Lucas County and sent to the Ohio Penitentiary—their names, the crimes of which they were convicted, and their terms of servitude.

The aggregate amount of fines assessed during the year, both in City and State cases, was \$17,400.14, against \$17,586.65 in 1878, a decrease of \$186.51. The amounts collected were, in 1878, \$4369.72; in 1879, \$4710.14, an increase of \$350.42.

It is pleasing to note as a sign of the improvement of the times, the falling off in the number of nights' lodging asked for and granted to indigent persons during the past year, as compared with 1878. Last year, 4650 nights' accommodation was obtained by males, and 135 by females; total, 4785. In 1878, 5329, a decrease of 544. In both years the greatest number of nights' lodging was granted in the month of March, and the smallest in August.

It will be seen from the financial report attached, that the moneys received from the tax duplicate of December, 1878; June, 1879, and December, 1879, for the maintenance of the police force, amounted in the aggregate to \$34,501.05, against receipts of \$30,324 in 1878, an increase of \$4176.17. Disbursements during the year, \$25,381.64; in 1878, \$23,685.79; increase, \$1695.85.

In conclusion, I beg to thank the members of your Honorable Board, individually and collectively, for the courtesy and consideration which has been invariably shown me, both personally and as Secretary of the Board.
