To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1900.

Total number of arrests during the year	3,885
Total number of runs made by patrol wagon	2,488
Total amount of stolen property recovered	\$6,200
Total number taken in charge by matrons	952

The above will be a showing and a credit both to the Department and the City of Toledo. We can point with credit at the work of our Department. The city is growing every year, and we should have the required amount of patrolmen as required by law. The only obstacle in the way is the lack of funds. I hope the time will come when the Common Council will see the necessity to make the necessary appropriation to properly maintain this department. The men in the department should also receive more compensation for their work. Other cities of like size pay patrolmen one thousand dollars per year. Patrolmen in this city receive but eight hundred dollars. The same exists in the Detectives' Department and others. This Board must take notice of the fact that an officer's life is in danger at all times. We certainly have made a creditable showing with the force and the money provided for this department.
