Jake Chandler was killed on February 9, 1945 while trying to save one of his comrades. He received the Silver Star and Purple Heart posthumously. Officer Chandler is the only known person to have been killed in war while a member of the Toledo Police Department.

"The conversation turned to Dr. Steinberg, who died recently and who, before he became a dentist was a city policeman. He (Steinberg) was talking on the corner of Madison Avenue and Superior Street with two other rookie patrolmen, Jake Chandler, the former Scott athlete, and John Dowling. Suddenly Jake pointed and shouted, 'That car just ran a red light.' He took off on foot after the auto, caught up with it opposite the Commodore Perry Hotel, signaled the driver to the curb, and gave him a ticket."




"Outstanding leadership discovered among junior officers as well, and the names of both enlisted and commissioned are still mentioned almost with reverence by veterans of the 92nd Division. Among them were Captain Charles f. Gandy, Lieutenant John Birdsong, Lieutenant Ralph Skinner, Lieutenant Frank Whisonant, Lieutenant Jake Chandler, Staff sergeant Oscar Simpson, Private Jake McInnis, all of whom won the Silver Star, some posthumously."

"On 30 August the first German prisoners captured by black infantryman in Europe were seized by a twenty-two man combat patrol from Company F. led by Lieutenant Jake Chandler and joined by Captain Charles F. Gandy. The heavily armed patrol crossed the Arno and boldly entered the village of Calcinaia, where it destroyed a machine gun position, returning then safely with two prisoners."

Jake Chandler is buried in the Florence American Cemetery Plot H Row 13 Grave 17 Florence, Italy


