To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1899.

Total number of arrests made during the year	3,365
Total number of runs made by patrol wagons.	2,418
Total amount of stolen property recovered	\$4,961
Total number taken in charge by matrons	932

Much can and could be said in favor of our Police Department; the only great obstacle in the way is the lack of funds. We should at least have thirty additional patrolmen to properly patrol the City. We have one hundred patrolmen all told; this gives us about eighty men for street duty, the remainder being detailed as detectives, men to equip the patrol wagons, and door men. We can point with credit at the work of our department. We have as yet never requested outside Cities for assistance in sending us some of their detectives when we have large gatherings or conventions, as is done in other Cities. We have looked after and protected our citizens and strangers without any additional cost to the City. This department should be one of the best equipped in the country, and to make a showing we must have the material to operate with. I hope, the time will come, when the Common Council will see the necessity of apropriating the necessary amount of money to properly run the department. Thanking your honorable body for past favors.
