To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1897.

Total number of arrests made during the year.....	4,496
Total number of runs made by patrol wagons.....	3,085
Total amount of stolen property recovered.....	\$5,370
Total number taken in charge by matrons.....	1,018

Considering the large number of conventions, etc., held in the city, Toledo has maintained its customary reputation for peace and good order during the past year.

On account of lack of funds the Department is crippled. We should at least have fifty more patrolmen. Due credit must be given the entire Department for their efficient work. The Committee on Discipline and the Board in general deserve much credit in bringing the Department to its present standing. When men know that no favors will be shown and that each and every one must do his duty, then we will have a Department excelled by none. The Central Station should be renovated or sold. It is much too small to properly accommodate prisoners, women and children. The Police Station being the dumping ground for the sick, injured, lost children, homeless families, etc., we also should have a city ambulance and hospital.
