


**CENSUS TRACTS - 1960

3. UNIT 23 ADDED... new OVERLAY district added, to cover parts of Districts # 7, 10, 11 and 12.




POLICE DISTRICTS FOR SELECTIVE ENFORCEMENT UNITS



MISSING PERSONS

The Bureau of Missing Persons was established as a part of the Crime Prevention Bureau in September, 1937. The responsibility for co-ordinating and investigating reports made to the Division of Police is made the primary duty of one member of the Crime Prevention Bureau with the assistance, in some instances, of other Crime Prevention Bureau Members.

Approximately two-thirds of the missing persons reported are children; the younger ones under seven years are usually located the same day they are reported missing.

The older children, in some instances, remain away from home for a few days to a week and then return home voluntarily.

Adults present a different problem; however, most of those reported missing return home and resume their responsibilities.

TOLEDO POLICE ACADEMY

STAFF

The assignment of another lieutenant as a full time instructor has materially benefited the teaching program. The more years of street experience that can be incorporated into training is bound to have far-reaching effects upon the cadet officer.

RESEARCH

Thousands of words have been written concerning the effect of recent court rulings on the enforcement of law. Our efforts are directed toward being able to understand and to pass on this knowledge which is essential, that the rights of the citizen is not trammeled nor the protection of society neglected. This necessitates many hours of reading from numerous sources of material available.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Probably no phase of police work is more worthy of comment than that carried out by the officers called upon to restore in the eyes of the public the true police image. Forty-eight hours were involved in thirty public appearances. These covered groups from junior high to adults. There were 3,218 persons in attendance. Beyond this there was one radio and one television appearance. Time was given to advance the police work as a career through high school career day.

CHARACTER INVESTIGATIONS

Two hundred and fourteen character investigations were conducted by the Academy Staff. Eighty-three were applicants for positions in the Police Division and one hundred thirty-one were for the Fire Division.

CADET CLASSES

The twenty-eighth class, consisting of fifty men, was started on January 13, 1967, and they graduated on April 22, 1967. The twenty-ninth class began on September 1, 1967, and the graduation was held on December 9, 1967. There were fifty-five men in this class.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING

A special course in "Crowd and Mob Control" was held from March 7, 1967, to March 30, 1967. This consisted of eight, two hour sessions. There were 2,468 man hours of training received by 216 officers, 106 of whom attended all sessions.

FIREARMS TRAINING

The regular firearms training program once again began on May 1, 1967. Due to the difficulties of street service in July, the range facilities were maintained open into November.

TRAINING FILM

The Toledo Bar Association made it possible, through its foundation, for the Academy to purchase a training film entitled, "The Offs Against".

The Kemper Insurance Company presented the Academy two films. One is entitled, "The Thin Blue Line, and the other "The Dangerous Years".

ACADEMY LIBRARY

There were one hundred eighty books borrowed from the loaning library. All this is indicative of the men's desire to improve their knowledge.

Two hundred and twenty-four officers received instruction in the Academy's first library course for police officers.

On December 13, 1967, and February 1, 1968, and the third session January 13, 1968, and April 23, 1968, the academy unit class began its second year of study.
