To the Honorable Common Council, City of Toledo:

GENTLEMEN:—In accordance with the requirements of section 1996 of the Revised Statutes of Ohio, we respectfully transmit herewith the annual report of the police department of Toledo for the year ending December 31st, 1891:

We desire only to take the necessary space in this report to call the attention of your Honorable Body, and the public to the urgent necessity for an increase of the force.

The creditable record made by the department for years past is maintained only by faithful and efficient work supported by skillful management and the enforcement of the strictest discipline.

We submit that sixty men for regular night and day patrol duty is much too small a number to guard and protect the large area and population comprising the city of Toledo. The service of the balance of the force is required for various special duties.

It is hoped your early attention will be given to the matter of providing means for a considerable enlargement of the force.

Your attention is also called to the accompanying report of the Chief of Police in which we heartily concur.

Annual Report of Chief of Police.

HEADQUARTERS POLICE DEPARTMENT,)
TOLEDO, OHIO, January 1st, 1892. }

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners, City of Toledo :

GENTLEMEN :—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1891.

Matters demanding the attention of this department during the past year were very numerous and on several occasions the capacity of the force was seriously tested.

I am pleased, however, to be able to state that, by diligence and much extra duty exacted from the entire force we have been successful in maintaining, thus far, with our limited means, the public peace and safety.

On account of this limit in the force I desire to state that much of the resident portion of the city is denied the police protection to which it is justly entitled, and it is to be hoped that your Honorable Body, seeing this danger to property, will take such action as in your judgment may seem best.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 4,460, being 194 arrests more than was made the previous year.

The value of property reported stolen during 1891 was \$6,033, \$1,495 more than the previous year, but the per cent. of property recovered, as will be seen by referring to the accompanying statement, compares very favorably with previous years.

The patrol wagon made 2391 runs during the year, an increase of 158 runs as compared with the year 1890.

The expenditures for the maintenance of the department was \$75,490.32, a figure that speaks much for the economical management of affairs.

It is evident that the levy of 1½ mills, allowed by the Tax Commission for police purposes will not meet any unusual expenses, and I suggest that an effort be made for some special legislation in favor of the police fund to meet demands of the department that are indispensable.

The purchase of the patrol barn property should be consummated, before the option is expired, and the building thereon raised two stories. With this addition to the station the whole force could be assembled (as is some times necessary) with some order, and it would also furnish office room that is much needed.

There were few cases of serious illness or disability of members of the department during the year, but influenza, which was prevalent during the latter months, seriously affected the service and made an average daily absence in the force of about four men. I call attention to this fact that it may be taken into consideration in estimating the numerical strength of the force, and to further justify the demands made for an increase.

During the past year second hand and junk dealers were obliged under the law (Sec. 4413 R. S) to report their purchases, similar to pawn brokers, and at the present time there are thirty-two such dealers making almost daily reports. This work is strictly looked after by the detective force and it has aided much in the apprehension of thieves and the recovery of stolen property.

It would probably be unjust to submit this report without calling your attention to the able and efficient work of the regular and detailed detective force of our city. These men have been faithful in the performance of their duty, and have to a great extent reduced the possibility of burglaries and other crimes against which the patrol force would find it impossible to cope.

I beg to acknowledge the courtesy and kindness extended to me at all times by your Honorable Board.

POLICE PRECINCTS.

The City of Toledo is divided into five police precincts as follows, to-wit:

1st Precinct—All territory bounded by river front, Cherry and Lagrange streets and city limits, and includes the following beats: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9.

2d Precinct—All territory of East Toledo and all territory bounded by Maumee River, Monroe, Huron, Adams, 11th, Union and North sts., Canton ave., old canal bed and Beach st., and includes the following beats: 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 22, 23, 41, 42, 43 and 44.

3d Precinct—All territory bounded by Monroe, Erie, Madison, 11th, Adams, 12th, Wakeman, Bancroft and city limits, and includes the following beats: 10, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 29 and 45.

4th Precinct—All territory bounded by Swan Creek, Wayne st., Brown ave., Clinton and Frazier sts., Detroit ave., Lincoln st., Collingwood ave., Frazier, Nettie, Washington, Ontario, Monroe, and Superior sts., and includes the following beats: 26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34.

5th Precinct—All territory bounded by Superior and Monroe sts., Maumee River and Swan Creek, and includes the following beats: 24, 25, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39 and 40.

Each of the above precincts is in charge of a sergeant during the night, according to assignments from headquarters.
